Trial of Jail Killing Case resumes today By Court Correspondent

The trial of the Jail Killing Case will resume today in the Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court. Dhaka. court sources said. The Special Court adjacent to

the Dhaka Central Jail will begin the trial at about 9.30 am. Earlier, the court summoned

the then DIG (Prison) Abdul Awal, the complainant of the case to appear before the court.

The court framed charges against 21 accused, including 13 absconders in the case.

Four national leaders Syed Nazrul Islam, Tajuddin Ahmed, A H M Quamruzzaman and Captain Mansur Ali were killed inside the Dhaka Central Jail on November 3 in 1975.

Eight of the 21 accused including Taheruddin Thakur are now in the custody

One of the four people who were critically injured in Saturday's bomb blast near the Awami League office at Bangabandhu Avenue, died at the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) yesterday afternoon.

Hospital sources identified the dead as Milon, 25, son of Abdul Latif of village south Mohakhali in Munsiganj sadar upazila.

The investigation committee, formed by the home ministry, recorded the statement of CPB President Monzurul Ahsan Khan yesterday morning. According to sources. Monzurul's statement provided a few new clues that the investigators are now scrutinis

ing. Meanwhile, the CPB has started its own investigation into the bomb blast.
