Fruits, fish worth Tk 50 cr perish due to lack of preservation facilities

SYLHET, Jan 23: In absence of preservation, processing and transportation facilities perishable goods like seasonal fruits and fish worth Tk 50 crore are damaged in Sylhet division every year, reports UNB.

Jackfruits, pineapples, lemon and banana grow plenty in the frontier areas of Moulvibazar, Sylhet and Sunamganj and Srimongal.

Kulaura, Boroekha, Srimongal, Kamalganj, Rajnagar of Moulvibazar district are famous for jackfruits, pineapple, lemon and banana production.

Though these fruits grows on

over 20,000 acres of hilly land in greater Sylhet in the Bangla months of Joistha and Ashar but a huge quantum of these perish due to lack of adequate transport facilities.

Local growers said fruits worth over crores of taka could be saved from destruction if processing plants are established and smooth transportation facilities developed in the region.

On the other hand, the region is rich with fish resources, as vast tracts of land in the division are haor, baor and jolmohals (water bodies). But fish worth

over Tk 40 crore are damaged every year due to lack of processing and preserving facilities, local traders said.

There are over 2,000 jolmohals (water bodies) and over 25,000 ponds in the division.

There are also water bodies on over 60,000 acres of land in Sunamganj alone, suitable for fish production.

Official sources said the annual average production of fish in these water bodies is 70,000 to 80,000 tons.

The poor fishermen, traders and growers are forced to sell the

fish at throwaway prices in absence of freezing facilities.

Besides, due to bad communication network and absence of marketing facilities the local fishermen and traders are deprived of huge income every year.

The government can earn at least Tk 25 crore every year by exporting fish abroad with the expansion of preservation, transportation and marketing facilities, local leaders said.

At present there are only four fish processing plants in Sunamganj and Habiganj districts in private sector.

Annual Botanical Conference opens Speakers put accent on saving of medicinal plants

CHITTAGONG, Jan 23: Speakers at a conference have expressed concern over fast depletion of medicinal plants in the country and suggested restrictions be imposed on harvesting of the plants from natural reserves.

They said the medicinal plants should be cultivated instead of collecting from the wilds.

The speakers were addressing the inaugural session of Annual Botanical Conference-2000 on 'Floral Diversity of Bangladesh and its Conservation' on Saturday at the auditorium of Research Centre for Mathematical and Physical Science (RCMPS), Chittagong University.

They also called for mass awareness among people to conserve the plants.

Professor MA Aziz Khan, founder of the Department of Botany and former vice chancellor of Chittagong University, inaugurated the two-day conference.

Presided over by Chittagong University Vice Chancellor

Professor Abdul Mannan, the inaugural session was addressed, among others, by CU Pro-VC Professor Abu Yousuf, CU Science Faculty Professor M Nurul Mostafa, President of Bangladesh Botanical Society (BBS) Professor M Arshad Ali, BBS Secretary General Professor Abul Bashar and Secretary of the Conference Organising Committee Professor M K Pasha.

In his keynote paper, Professor M Salar Khan, Honorary Advisor of Bangladesh National Herbarium, said it is unfortunate that when we are realising the importance of floral diversity, which is under severe threat, the number of plant taxonomists in the country is decreasing. Potentials of lower plants are not known enough compared to those of higher plants, he added.

It is high time we conducted survey on lower group of plants. Utilising the indigenous knowledge base, efforts should be made to increase the use of the diversity for food, medicine and other purposes."

Guest birds not safe in Jamuna shoals

SIRAJGANJ, Jan 23: Indiscriminate hunting of guest birds is continuing along Kazipur shoal area, Chalan beel, a water body, and Chowhali shoal area.

Like previous years thousands of guest birds have started arriving in those areas since the beginning of winter this year. Migratory birds, our flying guests in the winter have been crowding the shoal lands along Jumuna river side, Kazipur shoal, Chalan beel and Chowhali shoal area.

These migratory birds coming from the Siberian region due to severe cold are taking shelter in these areas in search of comparatively warmer places.

The migratory birds, which are seen in the areas are of various species. Besides, professional as well as amateur bird hunters are rushing to these places, where the migratory birds are taking shelter sensing their presence in a bid to kill those. Some of the hunters also catch the birds and sell them in the open markets and on different footpaths of the district.

There are different ways of hunting the birds. Some hunters use guns and some other cages to catch the birds. They also apply a number of other methods to net the guests.

The hunters do not bother to obey the government ban on hunting migratory birds. There is a law in the country for punishment to the illegal bird hunters.

But hoodwinking wholesale hunting of the guest birds is continuing in the region due to lack of strict enforcement of law. On the other hand, the local administration is maintaining silence regarding indiscriminate hunting of the guest birds. If this trend continues unabated, the migratory birds would stop com-

ing in the country which would harms the ecological balance, fear weather experts.

According to the naturalists, the migratory birds come to these areas during the winter season flying from the ice-fields in Siberia, thousands of kilometers north of here, to escape the biting cold. While making a day long trip this correspondent saw that the areas had turned into a heavenly abode of guest birds. Some of the migratory birds had been seen plying cheerfully on the sandy fields, which have emerged along the river and some had been catching small fishes from water.

The scene attracts lots of traveller and local people. Talking to this correspondent, the local people have alleged that natural movement of the guest birds is being hindered by the bird hunters. They have also complained that a section of professional bird hunters catch the guest birds daily for selling them at the local hats and bazaars despite the government ban on it. They underlined the need for intervention of law enforcing agencies to ensure the safe stay of the guest birds in their temporary winter home.

The birds hunting has turned into a trade for some unscrupulous people in the region. Anwar Hossain along with professor of an American university and his brother remained engaged in a dreadful clash between the people of shoal areas when they had gone for hunting guest birds.

They were caught by the people and mercilessly beaten up and later handed over them to police. A murder case has been lodged with Kazipur PS against the hunters but police dismissed the case in exchange of money.

Rivals' clash leaves 20 injured

SUNAMGANJ, Jan 23: At least 20 people of Bhatitahipur village received bullet wounds in a gunfight between two rival groups at Tahirpur upazila headquarters on Saturday, reports UNB.

The clash ensured as a sequel to Friday's toll collection between the people of Bhatitahipur and the armed youths of five villages of Uzantahipur, Birnagar, Borodol, Kamarkandi, Dhutma and Chiksa. On Friday night a gunfight started over collection of tolls from the Tahirpur bazaar between the two groups. The armed youths of five villages again attacked the bazaar at 5 pm and ransacked and looted several shops of the bazaar leaving 20 people injured. Five of the injured, one of them seriously, were admitted to the Sadar hospital. Riot police have been deployed in the area to avert any further clash.

Engineer rescued from jungle

BANDARBAN, Jan 23: The Security forces have rescued Engineer Aminul Islam from a jungle of Rowangchari Upazila in Bandarban district on Sunday with the help of police and local tribal leaders, reports BSS.

He was abducted by armed tribal terrorists from work site of a bridge on Taracha canal at gunpoint on January 18. The kidnappers demanded Taka 10 lakh as ransom. According to police sources, acting on a tip-off nine troops of security forces and police raided the vast area of Rowangchari Upazila and rescued him from the jungle of Baghmaria area of the upazila. Local tribal leaders helped the forces in this connection.

25 more hurt in rivals' clash

NARAYANGNAJ, Jan 23: At least 25 people were injured, seven of them critically, in a clash between two rival groups in Ziarat area in Araihazar upazila on Monday, reports UNB.

Police said the trouble ensued when the supporters of Anar Ali and Zahid groups locked in the clash over sowing paddy seeds in a disputed field. Seven of the injured, identified as Kafuddin, 70, Rasheda Begum, 40, Kazim Ali, 35, Abdul Ali, 45, Abdul Karim, 26, Abdur Rahim, 35, and Suraiya Begum, 35, were admitted to Araihazar Health Complex in critical condition. Police arrested seven people in connection with the clash. A case was filed with the police in this regard.

Foodgrains distributed

MEHEREPUR, Jan 23: A total of 500 metric tons of foodgrains was distributed among the flood affected family members of three upazilas including Meherpur Municipality through 36,000 VGF cards, reports BSS.

According to an official source of the total 50 per cent of foodgrains rice and the rest 50 per cent wheat. Meanwhile, 11,000 VGF cards were issued in Meherpur Sadar, 9,000 VGF cards in Gangi upazila, 10,000 VGF cards in Mujib Nagar upazila and 6,000 cards in Meherpur Municipality.

Warm clothes distributed

DINAJPUR, Jan 23: Warm clothes were distributed among 275 poor families in 11 unions of Birganj upazila as government assistance, reports UNB.

The unions are Shibrampur, Palashbari, Shatgram, Paltapur, Sujalpur, Nijpara, Mohammadpur, Bhognagar, Satar, Mohanpur and Maricha. Besides, winter clothes were distributed among 55 distressed families of freedom fighters in the upazila. Local UP chairman and members distributed the clothes in presence of UNO Mahbub-ul-Alam and PIO Abdus Salam.

850 arrested

DINAJPUR, Jan 23: Some 850 people including wanted accused were arrested from different parts of Birganj upazila during the last year, reports UNB.

Of the total, 795 were wanted criminals while 55 were arrested under section 54. All of them were sent to jail. Besides, some 154 cases were filed on various charges including murder, robbery, snatching and rape in the upazila during the same period. Of them, 26 were filed under Women and Child Repression Act.

20 injured in clash

SUNAMGANJ, Jan 23: At least 20 people were injured, two of them seriously, in a clash between two rival groups in Tahirpur upazila on Friday, reports UNB.

The seriously injured Rezaul, 22, was admitted to Sadar hospital while Ranju, 32, to Sylhet Osmani Medical College Hospital. Police said the two groups, one led by Tahirpur UP member Borhan Uddin and another by Shafiqul Islam of Bhati Tahirpur, clashed with each other following a previous enmity. Local ASP Abdur Rahim visited the spot on Saturday.

150 kutch houses gutted

NILPHAMARI, Jan 23: A devastating fire gutted some 150 kutch houses of 60 families at Hazipara in Sadar upazila on Saturday evening, reports UNB.

Fire Service sources said the fire, originated from a kitchen, also burnt 350 maunds of paddy into ashes. Local fire fighters rushed to the spot and with the help of local people extinguished the flame after three hours' frantic effort.

BANDARBAN, Jan 23: Bandarban Army Regional Headquarters has donated a generator to Bandarban Press Club on January 18, reports BSS.

Bandarban Army Region Commander Brigadier General AKM Rafiqul Islam PSC handed over the generator to the members of Bandarban Press Club at Bandarban Army Brigade Sadar Headquarters as the newsmen were facing difficulties to send news at the time of load-shedding.

Poultry farming suffers setback


RAJSHAHARI, Jan 23: Poultry farming is suffering a setback due to numerous reasons, reports BSS.

According to the local people, there is no cold storage here for storage of eggs. Besides, there is hardly any treatment facilities for poultry birds. There are about 1,800 poultry farms in the district, but for want of a cold storage, eggs and broiled chickens can not be preserved. Owners of the poultry farms in absence of cold storage can not preserve so many eggs for long and they are compelled to sell those at throwaway prices. Moreover, the marketing facilities for eggs are not up to the requirement. As a result, poultry farming is being affected.

Workshop concludes

KHAGRACHARI, Jan 23: The four daylong training workshop on 'Essential Service Package' ended here in the Press Club auditorium on Friday last, reports BSS.

Organised by Bangladesh Red Crescent Society (BDRCS) the training workshop was held under the CHT development programme for health workers of three hill districts. 1,850 poultry farms in 2 districts face closure threat

COX'S BAZAR, Jan 23: Some 1,850 poultry farms in 12 upazilas of Cox's Bazar and Bandarban districts are on verge of closure due to scarcity of chicks and their price hike.

Farm owners and livestock office sources said, the rapidly flourished poultry farms in the two districts are now facing acute shortage of chicks in the local hatcheries that caused sharp rise in their prices.

A large number of owners in both the districts are running the farms with smuggled Indian 'sick' chicks bought with higher price.

Acute shortage of chicks has already left about 150 poultry farms closed, local people said.

In last four years, a large number of unemployed youths of the districts were engaged in poultry farming and set up about 2,000 farms.

There were 500 to 3,000 local chicks in each farm and the death rate was only 5 per cent.

The shortage of local chicks started in July 2,000.

Local farm owners urged the concerned authorities to provide

its increasing price have left the farmers to depend on rice, wheat, straw, bran, oil cake and maize which are too costly.

Hundreds of cattles, die due to malnutrition and lack of proper treatment facilities.

Various diseases like khura, worm, infection, ringworm and diarrhoea take a heavy toll on animals causing severe financial loss to the farmers.

Acute shortage of fodder and essential livestock drugs is also hindering the growth of dairy farms in the districts.

Taking advantage, a large number of dairy farms were established in Cox's Bazar and Bandarban but most owners did not receive any training in this regard.

Police said they rescued the girl following the confessional statement of Fahima Aktar, 22, and Mojibar Rahim, 18, who were arrested in connection with the abduction.

Identity of the victim could not be known. Local people spotted the body and on receipt of information police recovered it. The body was sent to Faridpur Medical College Hospital for autopsy. A case was lodged with Nagarkanda police in this connection.

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
