## 2 corruption cases Charges framed against former air chief Altat Hossain

The Special Court for Dhaka Division yesterday framed charges against former Air Force Chief Air Vice Martial Altat Hossain Chowdhury in two corruption cases.

The judge, Mohammad Fazlul Karim fixed February 28 and March 13 for hearing the two cases.

The accused pleaded not guilty and demanded justice before the court after hearing the charges brought against him.

In the first case, the accused was charged with misusing his official position to ply to his village by helicopter in 1994 that cost the government Tk 12,54,822.25. He had done it to

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## JBIC governor arrives tomorrow

Governor of Japan Bank for International Cooperation (JBIC) Hiroshi Yasuda will arrive in Dhaka tomorrow on a five-day visit to Bangladesh, reports UNB.

During his stay in Bangladesh, Yasuda will meet Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and Finance Minister Shah AMS Kibria.

He will visit the Bangabandhu Bridge and Chittagong International Airport as well as the Grameen Bank centres to see the projects financed by JBIC.

JBIC, a government financial institution, combines and enhances functions of the Overseas Economic Cooperation Fund, Japan (OECF) and The Export-Import Bank of Japan (JEXIM) with a mandate to execute Japan's external economic policy and economic cooperation in an efficient and effective manner.

Bangladesh is one of the largest ODA loan recipient countries, administered by JBIC. Some of the major projects completed with JBIC loan include Jamuna Multipurpose Bridge and Chittagong International Airport.

Other important projects under the current and future JBIC financing include Paksey and Rupsa Bridge Projects, Rural Electrification and Infrastructure Development Projects, and Greater Dhaka Telecom Project that constitutes about 45 per cent of total telecommunication capacity of the greater Dhaka area have been financed by JBIC.

The JBIC governor, who will be accompanied by its senior officials, will leave Dhaka on January 30, according to a JBIC press release.

## Students, police clash at Sylhet Shahjalal varsity: 30 injured

Academic activities suspended: Situation tense as students refuse to vacate halls

SYLHET, Jan 24: At least 30 people including three policemen were injured in a clash between police and students on the campus of Shahjalal University of Science and Technology today.

The situation became tense at 7 am when police released Vice Chancellor and nine members of the academic council who were confined in the administrative building by the agitating students since yesterday afternoon. The students confined the VC and nine others in the building and locked its main gate to press home their four-point demand. One of the demands is that students securing 60 marks in semester examinations, will have to be placed in the first division.

The agitating students in a procession went to the VC's official residence on the campus at about 12:45 pm and tried to talk with him. As VC refused to talk, the students became furious and some of them started hurling brickbats at on-duty policemen and on the VC's house.

Police resorted to lathicharge to disperse the stu-

dents, resulting in a clash between the two sides.

The students ransacked university library and caused extensive damage to the administrative building.

Later, they held a protest rally on the campus and called for an indefinite strike at the varsity.

After the incident, the authorities at an emergency meeting, have decided to suspend all academic activities and asked the students to vacate the halls by 10 tonight.

The students announced that they would not leave the campus. They also demanded immediate resignation of the Vice-Chancellor for not accepting the genuine demands of the common students.

The academic council in its meeting yesterday constituted a committee with the departmental heads and deans of the faculties to resolve the issue in consultation with other varsities.

The students rejected it and reiterated their demands.

## JCD representatives' meet ends in chaos

A day-long representatives' meeting of Jatiyatobadi Chhatra Dal (JCD) ended yesterday amidst indiscipline and chaos.

More than 3,000 representatives from 84 district, thana and degree college units from all over the country attended the meeting, held at the Institution of Engineers, Bangladesh (IEB) auditorium.

While planned to be a closed-door session, the doors of the auditorium remained open throughout the discussion and a large number of representatives stayed outside. Sources said there was no proper registration system.

Some 200 representatives addressed the meeting and most of them gave routine speech and vowed to intensify the current out-governments movement while asking the parent party to announce tougher action programmes immediately.

During the meeting, different

factions of the JCD exchanged heated words, scuffled and made indecent remarks about each other. Dhaka University general secretary Mustafizul Islam Mamun had a scuffle with Narayanjani district unit general secretary Mosharrif Hossain in the morning.

Many JCD leaders in their speeches blamed local MPs for interfering in formation of district, college and thana unit committees. A leader from Rajshahi alleged that local MPs did not inquire about the well-being of the student body, but recommend that their followers be included in different committees when the JCD organise its annual conference to prepare new committees.

As a result, the leader said opportunists and non-students get maximum number of posts in

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## FEMA sees 3 major obstacles to holding fair polls

Terrorist activities, influence of black money and lack of sincerity of political parties will be the major obstacles to holding the next general elections in a free and fair manner.

Concerted efforts by the media, election monitors and the civil society are needed to keep the polls process free from these to ensure a fair election, senior journalists said at a discussion meeting organised by FEMA yesterday.

A good number of columnists took part in the discussion held at the Jatiya Press Club and moderated by the FEMA Chairperson Abul Ahsan.

FEMA (Fair Election Monitoring Alliance) will arrange such discussions with political leaders also.

Abul Ahsan said incidents of election-day rigging "significantly reduced" in recent years but pre-polls manipulations increased, jeopardizing fairness of polls.

The manipulations include intimidation; posting, promotion and transfer of officials with "clear political motives" and putting political opponents behind the bar, said

Abul Ahsan, a bureaucrat turned polls monitor.

It is difficult for a caretaker administration to neutralise all these pre-polls manipulations during its three-month tenure, he said.

Senior journalist ABM Musa said terrorists operate under the patronization of political parties. "So, once a party government resigns, the terrorists, arrested or not, go into hibernation."

An effective mechanism is needed to keep black money holders away from the election process. A greater sense of responsibility among major political parties can ensure fair polls, he added.

The discussants also proposed that to ensure transparency in election expenditure, donations to political parties by businessmen should be made public.

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## Police interrogating arrested Rohingya separatists

CHITTAGONG, Jan 24: Police at Cox's Bazar are interrogating the two arrested Rohingya separatist leaders.

Police said efforts are on to unearth clues to their alleged involvement in arms trade and other activities.

Police arrested Salim Ullah, chief of military staff of Arakan Rohingya National Organisation (ARNO) and his aide Nur Mohammad after raiding their headquarters in Chandgao residential area in the city on Sunday night.

They were placed on remand for interrogation, police said.

Police sealed the two houses at Chandgao, suspected to have been used by ARNO as its headquarters.

Police said they had recovered a picture of Salim Ullah with Libyan leader Moammer Gaddafi and other documents.

Police are also looking for other leaders of ARNO, an alliance of extremists fundamentalists groups of Myanmar fighting for the independence of Arakan state from Myanmar.

## Bangabandhu murder Steps to expunge proceedings against Mohiuddin sought

A demand for justice notice has been given seeking 'appropriate measure for expunging' the criminal prosecution and eventual criminal proceedings against Lt Col (rtd) Mohiuddin Ahmed, one of the accused in Bangabandhu Murder Case, now in death row at Dhaka Central Jail.

To justify this, the notice given by Advocate Khan Saifur Rahman on behalf of Mohiuddin's wife cited certain provisions of Fourth Schedule of the Constitution.

Mohiuddin, is one of the 15 former military officers sentenced to death by trial court on November 8, 1998 for killing Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and his family members at his residence on August 15, 1975.

## Gano Forum tells rally in city Bomb blast at CPB rally an attack on democracy

Leaders of Gano Forum at a rally at Paltan Maidan in the city yesterday strongly condemned the government for its failure to ensure security to people, particularly those at the CPB rally on Saturday.

They said Saturday's bomb explosion took place at the rally at Paltan Maidan as the government failed in its duty to take security measure. Four persons were killed and about 50 injured in the bomb explosion.

"It was an attack not only on innocent people but also on democracy and the Constitution which guarantees the fundamental right to hold public meetings," Gano Forum President Dr Kamal Hossain told the rally. "It was an attack on

national security". Security was tightened at Gano Forum's rally yesterday. Prior to the rally, a police team with a dog squad checked the field and also the dais.

Expressing grave concern at the failure of the Home Minister, Dr. Kamal said law and order is deteriorating in the country and people have no security of life and property.

Incidents of violence, terrorism, murder and extortion have become rampant.

"Why (Home Minister) Mohammad Nasim will not resign when a number of police officers have been suspended for failure in their duties?"

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## Blast at rally Cops give their statements to probe body

Seven people were killed and more than 50 others injured in two separate bomb explosions at CPB's Paltan Maidan rally and at Bangabandhu Avenue on Saturday.
