Vettori back to Kiwi fold

WELLINGTON, Jan 24: New Zealand left-arm spinner Daniel Vettori is back in the New Zealand squad for the first two of five scheduled limited-overs internationals against Sri Lanka, New Zealand Cricket said on Wednesday, reports Reuters.

Vettori has been out of the team for four months with a stress injury to his back, sustained on the tour of Zimbabwe and South Africa.

But the bad news for the Black Caps was all-rounder Chris Cairns had given up his battle to be fit for any New Zealand matches this summer and decided to undergo knee surgery which would keep him out of international cricket for six months.

Cairns, ruled out of New Zealand's recent tour of South Africa because of his troublesome right knee, made a comeback for the first one-day international against Zimbabwe but could bowl only three overs.

Cairns expects to be fit for New Zealand's September tour of Pakistan.

Chairman of selectors Sir Richard Hadlee said, "Daniel Vettori has assured the selection panel that he is 100 per cent fit, ready and very keen to Joining Vettori with a recall




