

Implement Mujib-Indira Treaty on enclaves

Delhi urged to allow free movement of Bangladeshis

Bangladesh has requested India to consider construction of fly over or underpass to ensure free movement of Bangladeshis at Dahagram and Angarpota enclaves through the Tin Bigha corridor connecting the mainland.

Replies to Haji Mohammad Selim (Awami League-Dhaka), Foreign Minister Abdus Samad Azad admitted in Parliament yesterday that controlled movement allowing Bangladeshis to use the corridor every

alternate hour during daytime is "not consistent" with the Mujib-Indira Land Boundary Treaty.

He said Bangladesh demanded full implementation of the treaty of 1974, allowing 24-hour movement through the Tin Bigha corridor. The Indian government has shown positive indication to the Bangladesh's plea, he added.

"This problem can be resolved through free and continuous movement of Bangladesh citizens through the Tin Bigha corridor," Azad told the House.

Agargaon slum: Drug dealers preparing for showdown

After Saturday's clash, a tense situation is now prevailing at the 'BNP slum' at Agargaon in the city as armed fractions of drug dealers are preparing for confrontation, sources said.

The four armed gangs clashed several times in the past over control of the slum for drug trade in and around the area.

Eight people were killed as drug

traders clashed with police during several operations there in the last two years.

The slum under Mohammadpur thana area is the biggest one in the city. It is the "main problem" in the city and it is not possible to control the area unless the slum is demolished, police say.

Sources claimed that drugs worth about Tk 20 lakh are sold every day in about 50 spots in the

JCD activists M A Hamid, Shahed, Shakawat, Hasan Ullah, Belayet Hossain Bhulu, Kamrul Islam, Rafiqul Alam, Moazzem Hug Tuhin and Asif were implicated in the case, police said. None was arrested so far.

Having spent about two crore taka from the Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) funds for construction and repair of two small link roads in Rayer Bazar area, Commissioner of Ward-47 Sadek Khan has arbitrarily named the roads after him and his late uncle, Hashem Khan.

A large sign boards put up on one road reads "In the name of Allah, Dhaka City Corporation, Ward No. 47. Sadek Khan Road". Another signboard reads, "Hashem Khan Road. From Sher-e-Bangla Road to flood protection embankment".

The Chief Executive Officer of the Dhaka City Corporation told The Daily Star that his office did

not give permission to anyone in the area to name a road after the ward commissioner. He said it was an offence to name a road without permission from the DCC. In case of changing the name of a road, he said, one has to obtain permission from the ministry concerned.

The roads were built by filling up the low-lying area inside the flood protection embankment near Rayer Bazar about two years ago. Over the last two years, an unspecified sum of money was

spent for the maintenance of the road, particularly after the rainy seasons. This year the earthen road has been widened.

When Sadek Khan was contacted, he said it was the demand of the people of the area to name the roads after him and his uncle. He said it was the people who put up the signboards.

Last year, the same ward commissioner

Mild quake rocks Karnataka

Three days after a massive earthquake devastated western India, several parts of a southern state were rocked yesterday by mild tremor, causing minor damage and triggering widespread panic.

The magnitude 4.3 quake hit parts of Karnataka state including its capital, Bangalore, at 8.08 am (0238 gm), the Bangalore Meteorological Center said. It said its epicenter was about 35 kilometers (21 miles) south

a Bangalore, which is known for its computer and software industry.

Residents said panic-stricken people rushed into the open as windows rattled and rumbling noises were heard. Police and fire brigade control were flooded with calls from people. Residents said they felt the quake for 30 seconds,

but the Meteorological Center put the duration of the quake at two seconds.

United News of India news agency said some buildings includ-

ing schools developed minor cracks. Authorities closed schools and colleges in Bangalore after rumors spread that an earthquake would occur again in midmorning.

The area is 1,375 kilometres (850 miles) southeast of Bhuj, the town near the epicenter of Friday's 7.9 magnitude quake in Gujarat state that killed thousands. A magnitude 4 earthquake is capable of causing moderate damage.
