

# Avoid turning truth into falsehood & vice versa

Police has to share both praise & blame: President

**UNB, Dhaka**

President Shahabuddin Ahmed yesterday said the role of police in the advancement of democracy in the country is both appreciated and criticised in many ways.

"Just as correct measures are appreciated, likewise your wrong steps are also criticised. The appreciation or the criticism is for the entire police force," said the President when senior police officials went to meet him at Bangabhaban on the occasion of Police Week 2001.

He asked the members of the police force not to feel embarrassed over baseless criticism. With the establishment of truth, he said the goodwill and prestige of police as well as dignity of the government and the country are established.

"The so-called success of turning truth into falsehood and falsehood into truth is temporary and it creates disbelief and fear in public mind. None of this is desirable for the traditional police force," the President reminded.

He also asked the senior police officials to ensure that the helplessness of people, who come to police for protection, must not in any way escape the attention of the on-duty officers.

He said: "You'll have to perform your duty with honesty, integrity and sincerity. You'll have to set examples to imbue these qualities into the field level officers."

"You should remember that the common man take police as their friends. They come to you for help and security when they fall in serious trouble," President Shahabuddin said urging the members of the police force to dedicate themselves in the service of the people by earning their love.

The President mentioned the steps taken to modernise and expand the police force and said perhaps, the infrastructural facilities are not enough. "But you will have to keep in mind the limitation of resources and will have to ensure security of life and property of the citizens by tackling the problems."

"The prerequisite for economic development is the improvement of law and order. Failure in this sector

# Sit-in around Sectt Feb 18

Khaleda asks govt to hand over power to caretaker admn

The four-party opposition alliance yesterday announced sit-in demonstration around the Bangladesh Secretariat on February 18 to press the government to resign.

Leader of the Opposition in Parliament Khaleda Zia announced it at a joint public meeting at Bandarban Stadium in the afternoon.

She once again asked the government to hand over power to a caretaker administration for holding general elections.

District BNP president Mamaching presided over the meeting also addressed by the chiefs of two other components Jamaat chief Matiur Rahman Nizami and IOJ

chairman Shaikhul Hadit Maulana Azizul Huq. Jatiya party's secretary general, Najir Rahman Manjur, represented Rawshan Ershad as she has gone to the United States.

Khaleda, also the former prime minister, castigated the ruling party for what she said destroying every institution and sector through naked politicising. "The President also could not escape politicisation," she said.

Portraying a frustrating situation of the country on social, economic and political fronts during the four-and-a-half-year rule of Awami League, she assured the people that next government of the four-party alliance would salvage the country from prevailing "grave" situation.

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## More judges to be appointed, PM tells JS

UNB, Dhaka

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said more judges would be appointed in the High Court in phases to fill up the vacant posts as well as for new benches in the Supreme Court.

The judges would be appointed as early as possible, she told Parliament replying to Tahura Ali of Awami League.

Defending appointment of more judges, Hasina said as many as 120,280 cases were pending before the High Court Division and 5,160 cases before the Appellate Division till December last year.

In reply to a question from Dr Rustam Ali Farazi of Jatiya Party, she said without active support of the people irrespective of political affiliation, it is difficult for the law enforcers to stamp out terrorism successfully.

She, however, said despite limitation of money and manpower, the government is determined to take legal action against the terrorists.

Hasina told the House that since police operation began in southwestern districts in April 1999, some 1,010 terrorists have been arrested while 2,755 others had surrendered. Some 158 police camps were set up in the area with 1,650 police, 2,240 ansars and five battalions of BDR.

# Hartal scare grips Chittagong again

A day's shutdown causes Tk 288cr loss

A hartal scare has gripped the port city and it is the talk of the town now.

The city experienced over 1200 hours of shutdown enforced by political parties in the last two years, causing a loss of about Tk 288 crore a day, sources concerned said.

Even the first month (January) of the current year saw 84 hours' shutdown.

In the meantime, the 11-party alliance has called a day-long

countrywide hartal tomorrow (February 1).

People are making frequent telephone calls to newspaper offices here, asking about hartal programmes so that they can schedule or reschedule their work.

President of Tea Traders Association of Bangladesh (TTAB) Feroze Ahmed while talking to this correspondent said, "We are worried as frequent hartals create dislocation in shipment of tea against export orders. This has

become a major impediment to export business and is causing loss of market. Businessmen and the country incur huge loss."

"Buying tea from weekly tea auction here for export has really become difficult for us due to hartal", Feroze said.

Former vice-president of BGMEA Mahbub Ali said, "Shipment of huge exportable readymade garments get stuck up due to hartal. Foreign buyers lose confidence as we can not ensure timely shipment.

"The hartal spree since the beginning of the year will force many foreign buyers to look for suppliers in other countries", Mahbub said.

Another prominent businessman, Nader Khan, said, "Hartals are causing disruption in our business activities. We are very much scared. Our politicians must be sensible if they want investments and a better future for the port city."

Booksellers compel students

PM urges political parties

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in Parliament yesterday sought help from political parties in halting the use of illegal firearms that poses threat to peace in social life.

She attributed the "killing of Bangabandhu, protection to his killers and patronisation of terrorists by political parties, which do not believe in democracy," to the esca-

lation of the use of illegal arms in the country.

"Basically, the politics of arms and its unauthorised use started with the assassination of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman in 1975," said the Prime Minister responding to a question of Dr Rustam Ali Farazi (Jatiya Party-Pirojpur).

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Home Ministry report on blast at CPB rally

# No probe but 11-pt suggestions

The high-powered home ministry body formed earlier to probe the January 20 bomb explosions in the city submitted its report to the government yesterday with a 11-point recommendation to avert recurrence of such incidents.

But it did not look into the motive behind the incidents and who were responsible for those because this might influence the CID investigation, a member of the committee said.

Seven persons died in the bomb explosions, one at a rally of the Communist Party of Bangladesh (CPB) at the Paltan Maidan and the other at the Bangabandhu Avenue nearby.

The report said both police and political parties should take "serious steps" to avert bomb attack or

violence at public rallies.

"There is already a tradition in the country to inform police. But from now on, this should be mandatory for political parties. Besides, political parties must tell police about the expected turnover at their rallies so that police can take necessary security measures," the committee recommended.

The three-member Committee was headed by Additional Secretary Afjar Uddin.

It said, there should be specific guidelines for police to follow while providing security in a political programme because explosion of bomb in such programme is a new

trend.

Police personnel should also be briefed when assigned for such duties. They should submit report on their return, the report said.

It also noted that due to ignorance and lack of proper training, the police personnel did not come forward to help CPB leaders after the explosion. "They do not even

know that besides maintaining law and order, they have other responsibilities," it said.

Police also do not have any equipment to detect bombs. They should be properly equipped, the report said.

In addition, there should be a system to identify participants in big

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# 'Maintain WHO air standard to save life & money'

Every year some 3,500 lives can be saved and economic benefits ranging between 60 and 70 million US dollars reaped, if the World Health Organisation (WHO) air standard is maintained in the country, observed speakers at the launching ceremony of 'Urban Transport and Environmental Improvement Study'.

Communications Minister Anwar Hossain attended the function as chief guest.

The Tk 3.75 crore study, jointly

financed by the government and the Asian Development Bank (ADB), comprise six components, which includes development of an action plan to introduce clean fuel based on natural gas. The Bangladesh Road Transport Corporation (BRTC) is conducting the study.

Road and Highways Division Secretary Syed Rezaul Hayat, ADB Resident Representative Phiphit Supahapiphat and BRTC Chairman Azmal Chowdhury addressed the inaugural session at the IDB Bhaban conference yesterday. Dr. Armando Ballofet, leader of the

study team, presented the background briefing on the project.

The communications minister said city-dwellers are exposed to health hazards due to environment degradation through different types of pollution.

Hossain expressed concern over unrestricted movement of vehicles with two-stroke engines that largely contribute to air pollution in the city. He called for political consensus coupled with effective intervention by the authorities concerned to keep the air-polluting vehicles off the road.
