Hyundai Electronics suffers huge non-operating losses

Troubled microchip giant Hyundai Electronics Industries Co. on Wednesday announced huge nonoperating losses for last year, prompting gloomy forecasts for its 2001 prospects.

Hyundai Therionics Industries (HLI) said sales rose from six trillion won in 1999 to 8.9 trillion won last year, with operating profits up sharply from 646 billion won to 1.5 trillion won.

LatAm seen open to Americas free trade, but wary

Latin America is open to the idea of hemispheric free trade, Canada's ambassadors to the region said yesterday, but the upcoming Summit of the Americas in Quebec City must offer assurances it will not be crushed by the economic powerhouse of North America.

At a news briefing in Quebec City attended by 11 of the ambassadors, the consensus was that people and businesses in Latin America fear the prospect of being tion. swamped by a free trade agreement that is meant to erase trade barriers by 2005 from Ellesmere Island in the Canadian Arctic to Tierra del Fuega at the southern tip of South America.

"There are concerns about how they can compete and they will lobby for special measures for transition," said Sandelle Scrimshaw, the Canadian ambassador to Barbados.

The heads of 34 elected governments - every nation in the hemisphere except Cuba - will gather in Quebec City April 20-22 for the third Summit of the Americas and receive a first draft of a pact to create a Free Trade Area of the Americas (FTAA).

Leaders are also expected to restate their commitment to the free

trade deal as the road to greater prosperity and will launch social programmes to improve health, education and communications, organisers said.

Bruno Picard, Canada's ambassador to the Dominican Re- likes. public, said it is clear that smaller Latin American economies would need time to make the move to free trade and that any agreement should include economic programmes to assist in the transi-

"We have to do that to avoid too great a shock," Picard told the press briefing.



The euro dipped under 93 US cents in Asia Wednesday after a rise in German unemployment revived doubts about the European economy's ability to overtake growth in the slowing United

"The market continued the euro selling trend following the currency's drop in overseas markets," said Fuji Bank dealer Hideyuki Tsukamoto.

The euro slipped to 0.9290-93 dollars at 5:00 pm (0800 GMT) in Tokyo, compared with 0.9309 dollars in New York and 0.9372-74 dollars in Tokyo Tuesday after-

"A string of potentially weakerthan-expected releases from Germany is likely to send the euro weaker," the bank said in a report. Germany is scheduled to release this week its December manufacturing and industrial production figures.

Market watchers were awaiting fourth-quarter US productivity figures on Wednesday for the next clue to the state of the world's biggest economy, traders said.

Hun Sen to ask Russia to write off debts

Cambodian Prime Minister Hui Sen said Wednesday he would ask Moscow to write off Phnom Penh's debts during a planned trip to Russia later this year.

"I will go to Russia in August or September. While there I plan to ask President Putin to cancel Cambodia's debt," Hun Sen said, without elaborating on the size of the debt.

"If they helped us in the past they should finish the job. We should not forget the goodness of

Hun Sen made the announcement while attending an investment forum in Phnom Penh.

The Soviet Union was Vietnam's main financial backer and ally during its occupation of Cambodia which began with an invasion in 1979 to oust the brutal Khmer Rouge regime and lasted a

The Vietnamese installed a puppet government which included Hun Sen as a young foreign

believed to have borrowed millions of dollars from Moscow, but those cash flows dried up with the collapse of the Soviet Union.


