

Bangladesh Cricket Board yesterday named a 14-member squad for the GrameenPhone Second Under-17 Asia Cup. The ten-nation meet will start in the city from February 15.

Nafees Iqbal, who led Bangladesh in the first edition held in Pakistan last year, has been retained as the captain while Mohammad Ashraful has been named as his deputy.

Penciled in Group B for the first round, Bangladesh will take on Nepal in the opening match at the Bangabandhu National Stadium. Last year's runners-up Pakistan, Kuwait and Singapore make up the group.

Defending champions Sri Lanka head the other group which also features India, Oman, UAE and Malaysia.
