Dipu granted ad-interim bail, freed

The Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's Court, Dhaka yesterday granted adinterim bail to Dipu Chowdhury, main accused in the Taraj Uddin murder case.

Dipu is the son of State Minister for Shipping Moffazal Hossain Chowdhury Maya.

The Second Additional Chief Metropolitan Magistrate Mohammad Abdur Razzak set the bail at Tk one lakh with two quarantors. One of the guarantors was required to be either the local ward commissioner or the complainant of the case while the other an engaged lawyer. As per the requirements, complainant of the case Nurul Islam and Advocate Abul Kalam Azad signed the bail bond as guarantors.

Dipu's lawyer Advocate Rezaur Rahman submitted the bail petition stating that the accused was falsely

Abductors for talks but insist on security

After three days, the authorities succeded in making a contact with the abductors through tribal go-between.

The people, who had travelled into the deep forest, returned to Bethchari at around 9:00pm on Sunday to tell the authorities that they had talked to the abductors

but did neither see the spot nor the hostages They said abductors would like to sit and talk but they insisted that authorities should ensure their security during the mediation process.

Sources also said that the people, sent into the forests, had walked for about two hours before reaching a village. They said the abductors met the two tribal gobetweens about an hour later.

Meanwhile, security has been stepped up in Rangamati town after an anonymous caller rang up the police in the morning and threatened to bomb residential hotels where hosts of foreign and local journalists are staying to cover the hostage drama.

Plainclothes and armed security men have been posted at every hotel and other important installations.

The hostage drama might take a positive turn soon as the tribal intermediaries yesterday made a second empt to establish a direct dialogue with the abductors. Sources said the intermediaries were hopeful that

the abductors would sit down with the mediators and chalk out a "way" to release the hostages The Chief of Army Staff Lt. General Haroonur Rashid

today flew to Bethchari army camp and held a meeting with Minister for CHT Affairs Kalparanjan Chakma. Talking to the reporters the Chief of Army Staff reiter ated the government's stand and said that the security

cordon would not be lifted. The authorities are now using new sources, reportedly relatives of one of the abductors, to reach the

Foreign experts on hostage crisis were seen today heading for the Bethchari area at around 3.30pm. Sources said the foreign experts would now try to set up a direct dialogue with abductors. They would also like to send fresh supply of ration, particularly re-hydration medicines. But intermediaries quoted abductors saying all the three hostages were in reasonable health

Authorities still hopeful of a negotiated end

Eleven days into the hostage crisis without much of a progress, the authorities are still hopeful of negotiated resolution towards securing release of the three Europeans held hostage by an armed group of tribals in the jungles of Chittagong Hill Tracts since February 16.

"We are hopeful about a negotiated end to the hostage issue." a highly placed source told The Daily Star vesterday.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina had given specific instructions against use of force before she left for Cairo to attend the D-8 summit, the source added.

Asked on the ransom demand the source said during the negotiation it would definitely come up. But SEE PAGE 11 COL 4

Mubarak assures duty-free access of Bangladeshi goods

President Hosni Mubarak yesterday assured necessary steps for dutyfree access of Bangladeshi exports including jute and tea, to the Egyptian market.

The assurance was given during a meeting with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina at the Presidential Palace in the morning

Hasina emphasised that "current volume of trade and economic collaboration does not match with full potential." She called for diversification of trade and economic ties.

The two-way trade between Dhaka and Cairo is roughly around 10 million US dollar, with the balance a little inclined towards

Bid to manipulate cases?

Iqbal will be quizzed, says DC DB

Police will interrogate Awami League (AL) lawmaker HBM Iqbal over the February 13 incident at Malibagh in the city in which four persons were killed in firing, a top police official said.

However, investigation into the incident is going on very slowly.

Sources in the underworld and political quarters have alleged that a section of the police is trying to manipulate the cases filed in this regard

Police have so far arrested in this connection only one person who is not even an accused in the cases. The actual culprits including those photographed by the press are still

The sources alleged that a section of the police has reached an 'understanding' with Liaqat-- leader of the underworld Five Star group -in a bid to pass on the blame of the three killings to Liaqat's opponent, Seven Star group.

Four cases were filed in connec-

tion with the incident which left three persons killed at Malibagh and one police constable at the adjacent Police Lines. Of the four cases, one was filed by a cousin of Liaqat, accusing Seven Star group as the main culprit.

Authorities now moving with 'extra caution'

The authorities have taken a go-slow approach towards resolving the hostage crisis in the Chittagong Hill Tracts after the diplomatic community in the country voiced concern over the possibility of military intervention, sources said.

The extra caution was much too apparent yesterday, as the authorities and security agencies continued their efforts to secure release of the three European consultants --Torben Mikkelsen and Nils Hulggard of Denmark, and Tim Selby of Great Britain -- on the eleventh day of the hostage drama.

The Don rests

Sir Donald Bradman, the greatest batsman in Test cricket history and Australia's most revered sporting figure, has died in Adelaide. He was 92.

The Director of the Bradman Foundation, Richard Mulvaney, said Bradman died peacefully in his sleep on Sunday with his family by his side.

"Sir Donald Bradman died yesterday morning, peacefully at his home, after a short illness with pneumonia," Mulvaney said.

Bradman is survived by his son John and his daughter Shirley. His wife Jessie died of cancer, aged 88. in September 1997.

When news of Bradman's death broke this morning Australian television and radio interrupted their regular programmes to announce his

passing. Australia's cricket-loving Prime Minister John Howard immediately took time out from his visit to New Zealand to pay a tribute to Bradman, saying his death would



be deeply felt by the whole coun-

Howard said Bradman was not iust a great cricketer but also a man who had brought hope to millions of Australians during the despair of the Great Depression and Second World War.

"He was a dominant Australian personality in a way that I don't think any other person has been in the last 100 years," Howard told

Hailstorm lashes 3 **UZs of Sylhet:** 2 killed, 50 hurt

UNB, Sylhet

A hailstorm accompanied by heavy rains lashed three upazilas of the Sylhet district in the early hours of vesterday leaving two women dead and over 50 people injured.

The dead were identified as Begum, 43, and Mariam Bibi, 34, of Kanaighat upazila. They were killed in house collapse.

Local people said the storm hit Kanaighat and Goainghat upazilas at about 5:30am. Several hundred thatched houses and standing crops on vast tracts of land were also damaged in the storm.

Local MP Hafiz Ahmed Majumder visited the spot.

A hailstorm also hit Chhattak upazila at about 1am and damaged chemicals and property worth over Tk 5.5 crore of Sylhet Pulp and Paper Mill yesterday.

Mill sources said the storm accompanied by heavy ice balls damaged the asbestos-roofed factory building, pulp-warehouse, chemical godown, office building and staff quarters of the mills.

Over 150 families became home less and were passing their days under open sky.
