Guyana's Cricket Board will not support any call for a boycott of the first Test between West Indies and South Africa if Guyanese Carl Hooper is not appointed captain of the national side.

Media in the Caribbean have been awash with rumours that Guyanese fans would stay away from the first Test at Bourda next month if Hooper was not appointed in place of Jimmy Adams. who captained West Indies in their 5-0 series defeat in Australia.

Board spokesman Terrence Holder told the Caribbean news agency CANA: "We certainly do not support any call for a boycott of the game in the event that Hooper is not named captain."

Holder said the Guvana Board expected the West Indies Cricket Board (WICB) to select the team in the best interest of West Indies



Sir Donald Bradman not only broke cricket's records, he also foot speed and sheer talent, debroke most of its rules.

The Australian, who died on Sunday aged 92, was an unorthodox player whose secrets are still being unravelled more than half a century after he tucked his bat under his arm and walked off the field for the last time.


