Only a needless run out of Matthew Bell for 28, ending an 1-110, 5-189 opening stand with Mark Bowler Richardson of 91 in 128 minutes. stopped New Zealand going into day five with all wickets intact.

It left them with 103 overs to score the remaining 326 runs and grab an unlikely win. It would top the 406 for four India scored against the West Indies 15 years ago as the highest successful Test run chase.

The New Zealand record was set against Pakistan in Christchurch in 1994, when Bryan Young and Shane Thomson centuries assisted a successful pursuit of

New Zealand's big task was set by a majestic 149 not out by Younis Khan -- his third Test century in just his 10th match -- which helped Pakistan declare at tea on 336 for five.

Then New Zealand's new opening combination of Richardson and Bell recovered from double failures in the first innings to confidently add 91 in the first 29 overs.

In a terrible mix-up when Richardson called Bell through, Bell hesitated and was beaten by a throw to the bowler's end by centimetres.

Third umpire Brent Bowden gave him out after a promising 128 minute, 74-ball innings. Richardson was unaffected, confidently reaching his fifth Test 50 off 102 balls that included eight fours.

He will resume his innings Monday with nightwatchman Paul Wiseman. Pakistan's batsmen showed up the inexperience of New Zealand's four frontline bowlers, who total just 20 caps among them.

England cricket stars Michael Atherton and Alec Stewart have called for a radical overhaul of international umpiring following the illtempered opening two Tests of their Sri Lankan tour.

"The situation has got so far out of hand during this series that the ICC will have to act to prevent serious damage to the game," the former England captain said.

Atherton said although increased technology had highlighted umpiring errors, he was in no doubt umpiring standards had declined during his career "to the point where some games, such as the two in this series, have become

farcical.' The England opener - involved in a furious exchange with Sri Lanka's Kumar Sangakkura during the second Test in Kandy - said a panel of well-paid neutral umpires should be set up to handle inter-

national cricket matches. "Umpires need to be as prepared and professional as the players and put under the same scrutiny by their employers...those who have a bad run of games should be dropped as any player would be," Atherton wrote.

Atherton's team-mate and fellow former England captain Stewart said two neutral umpires should be appointed immediately to handle next week's potentially explosive third Test in Colombo.



England coach refused British passport!

Duncan Fletcher, the coach of the England cricket team for the past 18 months, has been refused a British passport, he told the Sunday Telegraph.

The Zimbabwe-born coach said he had been informed by immigration officials that he does

not meet nationality rules. Despite protesting that mounting tensions under President Robert Mugabe's regime had prompted him to emigrate, and having British grandparents, he

was told he had failed to qualify. Hetcher moved his wife. Marina, and daughter Nicola to Cape Lown. South Africa, but has spent barely nine weeks with them since taking on the England job 18 months ago.

"I applied the first time 10 years ago but was turned down. I didn't push it then but I tried really hard recently and was refused again," he told the paper.

"I am determined to get a British passport and it does seem strange, with my background, and now having this job as coach of the national team, that my application hasn't been accepted."

A Home Office spokesman said he could not comment on individual cases.
