Crucial bills may feature in next JS session

The ensuing 22nd session of the current Jatiya Sangsad, presumed to be the concluding one, is likely to pass a number of politically important bills relating to Awami League's 1996 election pledges, parliament sources

The session beginning on March 29 is learnt to be a short-lived one

Five of the bills are on the following crucial issues: Separation of the judiciary from the executive, autonomy for state run radio and television, appointment of an Ombudsman, repeal of the Vested Proper Act and amendment to the Upazila Parisad Bill.

The bills now being prepared by ministries concerned will be passed hurriedly before the next general election so that All can capitalise on its pledge made before the 1996 election, sources concerned said.

The Business Advisory Committee is expected to sit immediately for allocation of business for the session.

Following the Prime Minister's announcement for an early general election by mid-June, officials at the Parliament Secretariat, taking the ensuing session to be the concluding one, have geared up work to complete the government agendas ahead of the session

They indicated that the session would be short-lived with "huge businesses."

Law, Justice and Parliamentary Affairs Ministry has sent the crucial Vested Property (Hand over) Bill 2001 to the Parliament Secretariat. Once the bill is passed, the Vested Property Act will be repealed, aiming at handover of the huge property to their real owners.

Apart from these bills, the House would also transact the long pending Constitution (Fourteenth Amendment) Bill 2000, which require two-thirds majority for its passage. It seeks retention of 30 parliamentary seat reserved for women

The Eighth Parliament will have no reserved seat for women if the bill lapses due to absence of the main opposition in the next session. The ruling Awami League alone has not enough strength in the House to pass the bill that requires constitutional amendment. Another bill seeking setting up of a board to ease

traffic congestion in the city will also be transected. The Ministry of Communications has prepared the draft of the Greater Dhaka Transportation Coordination Board Bill Six other pending bills to be dealt with are: Bank Company (Amendment) Bill, Public Demand Recovery

(Amendment) Bill, Bangladesh Institute of Parliamentary

Parents blame police for death of abducted schoolboy

The life of 11-year-old Munna murdered by a gang of abductors, could be saved had police played their due role to rescue him, parents and relatives of the schoolboy claimed at a press conference in the city yesterday.

They appealed to Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina to ensure exemplary punishment to the killers.

Kamrul Hasan Munna, a meritorious student of Class-V at AK High School and College at Dhania in the city, was abducted from his aunt's marriage ceremony at Ekuiripara under Keraniganj thana on January

His decomposed body packed in sack was found in a pond in the locality on March 4.

The body bore marks of injury and veins of his hands and legs were cut. The body was recovered blindfolded. The injuries showed that the he was tortured to death

Munna's uncle M Shamsul Had said at the press conference at the National Press Club that he had filed a general dairy (GD) with Keranigani thana on January 9. Later Munna's father Mohammad Mia Chan filed a case with the same thana on January 14 under the Women and Children Repression Act.

Police arrested four persons Mamun, Ibrahim, Ismail and Bablu from Ekuiripara for their alleged involvement in the incident. Mamun and Ibrahim were placed on remanded for interrogation but two others were not.

The victim's father claimed that Bablu, who masterminded the incident was, released on bail. "Bablu along with three others -- Arif, Ripon and Akhter -- came to my petrol pump and demanded of me

Constitutional amendment must for new CHT voter list

CEC tells Regional Council team

The Election Commission yesterday said that constitutional amendment is a must for enlisting only permanent residents as CHT voters.

"Amendments to the Constitution and other rules are needed for a single voter list comprising only permanent residents for all elections in the hill tracts. For this, cooperation is needed from various organs of the government and people," said Chief Election Commissioner M A

The CEC made the observations about the contentious issue when a five-member delegation of the CHT Regional Council met with him at his office. CHTRO

member Goutam Chakma led the delegation including Nurul Alam, K S Mong Marma, Zafar Ahmad and M Yusuf, as other members.

The delegation placed before the Election Commission a three-point charter of demands:

1) Cancellation of the CHT voter list prepared in May-June 2000. 2) Preparing a fresh voter list with only permanent CHT residents for all elections a) A voter list as per Hill District Council Act and b) Using this voter list in national and local polls and 3) Enactment of necessary laws for using the voter list comprising only permanent

BNP to go for wildcat movement if govt delays resignation

The BNP-led opposition alliance plans to take a hardline from its March 21 public meeting in the capital if the government did not resign immediately to pave the way for a general election in May.

"We are now closely observing the development in regard to the government's commitment to hold the election before June 12. We will definitely go for wildcat movement if the government deviates from its words," said a top BNP leader, requesting anonymity.

He said the people would take it seriously if the prime minister refuses to resign immediately, because she herself had commit ted early elections while being in the holy city of Madina The BNP leader said confusion

has already been created in the minds of the people, as the head of the government is yet to make a clear-cut announcement as to when her government will relinquish power although it has been a few days since her return from

The policy makers of the BNP and its allies, according to him, are holding regular meetings, both formal and informal, to work out a strategy lest the government should not make any clear-cut

the areas The Khasia and Garo leaders, however, remained firm on their earlier demand that if the government go ahead with the plan at all, they should develop it in the reserved forest land and not in the Khasia and Garo villages

The four-year project poses such threats as entertainment for tourists, preservation of rare forest animals and plants, and construction of buildings for offices and schools in the remoter hills

The tourist garden better known as 'Eco-park' threatens to evict upwards of one thousand tribal families from their ancestral lands, who have been living in the hills for centuries with betel leaf and nut being their main livelihood. Even worse is that most of the

people in the hills who have ownership of rental agreement (lease) of high land for living have been told to leave the project area
