## **EU to send** big mission Hostages freed unharmed to monitor elections

### UNB, Dhaka

European Union is sending a big mission to Bangladesh shortly to monitor the entire process of upcoming general elections, likely in June, right from the announcement of the poll schedule European Commission Head of

Delegation in Dhaka Antonio De Souza Menezes disclosed that a high-power contingent of 66 election observers drawn from all the 15 member states would monitor the polls

The Election Observation Mission (EUEOM) members will start arriving as soon as the countdown begins with the announcement.

Ambassador Menezes said EU is sending the big army of election observers at the request of the Bangladesh Election Commission the government and the opposition SEE PAGE 11 COL 7

Abductors escape after brief gunbattle with troops

Army troops rescued the three Europeans in a lightning raid at the kidnappers' hideout at Daijjyapara, 38 km north-west of Rangamati, in the early hours of yesterday after a brief exchange of fire.

"We are fine," said Danish engineer Torben Mikkelsen, 38, at Kashkhali army camp where he, fellow Danish Nils Hulgaard, 63, and Briton Tim Selby were taken by troops for a check-up and rest before being flown to Dhaka by helicopter.

Those were the only words for newsmen from the three freed after 29 days. They appeared cheerful

## Chronology of kidnap crisis **OUR CORRESPONDENT, Chittagong**

February 16: Six to seven tribal gunmen kidnap Torben Mikkelsen and Nils Hulgaard of Denmark, and Tim Selby, all working for CAMPSAX on a Denmark-aided road development project, from a place known as Satero Miler Matha at Gunjapara in Naniarchar Upazila at around 5:00pm. The three Europeans were on their way back from a survey in a pickup.

Dave Weston, a British consultant, and Mohammad Mustafa, the driver of the pickup, are allowed to go with a letter written in Bengali demanding a Tk nine crore ransom for the release of the hostages. Weston informs Rangamati police of the incident at around 8:00pm

February 17: Police and army personnel cordon off the Kalapahar area, where the hostages are believed to have kept the hostages.

February 18: The authorities communicate with the abductors through local UP chairmen and leaders working as intermediaries. The abductors, in a note, demand withdrawal of army cordon as a SEE PAGE 11 COL 3

## Freed hostages kept away from newsmen

The three Europeans freed from abductors were barred from talking to newsmen since they were flown to Dhaka at around noon yesterday.

They were kept at the Combined Military Hospital (CMH) till writing of the report at about 10 pm, eight hours after doctors certified that they were physically fit to move to some guesthouse or hotel for rest, sources

They were surrounded by officers of Bangladesh army and diplomats of the two countries, joined by foreign ministry officials at 7 pm. Only press photographers were given a chance to take quick snaps of

the freed Europeans nearly half an hour after a military chopper carrying them landed at the Tejgaon airport.

The British High Commissioner and the Danish Charge d'affaires talked to them for nearly half an hour inside the helicopter after it landed. Three other military choppers accompanied the helicopter carrying the freed Europeans.

Newsmen waiting at the airport for long were at first told that they could talk briefly with them. However, it was denied later and they were whisked to the CMH in a microbus under a military escort. The microbus reached the CMH at 1:05 pm.

The freed hostages - Danes Torben Mikkelsen and Nils Hulgrad and Briton Tim Selby -- were immediately lodged in VIP cabins on the third floor of the CMH where they underwent a thorough check-up by army doctors, sources said.

The check-up was completed within an hour of their arrival there. CMH doctors under Brigadier General Salam, Commandant of the SEE PAGE 11 COL 1

The government and the Election Commission (EC) are now in a face to face position over the "complicated" issue of enrolment of nearly 2.5 million expatriate Bangladeshis in the fresh voter list ahead of the next general election

The government wants amendment to the existing law to enrol expatriates in the voter list, but the EC discourages such move as it may jeopardise the entire election process.

Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) M A Syed identified many impediments and said the EC would be over burdened if expatriates are included in the list.

The CEC and a section of EC officials termed the issue a complicated one. Inclusion of expatriates in the list may multiply risks in holding a free and fair election while many voters in the country are often deprived of their franchise, they said.

"We would go by the cross section of opinions on the issue," Law Minister Abdul Matin Khasru told The Daily Star. The ministries and constitutional

bodies concerned are giving opinions on legal matters to avoid complication and a decision will be taken considering the reality, he said.

Earlier, the government asked the ministries of foreign affairs, labour and manpower, home affairs, the Election Commission and the Law Commission to submit reports with their suggestions on the issue.

Only the Law Commission submitted its report with a positive note, the law minister said. "The government considers the issue positively and is hopeful of creating a scope for their enrolment in the voters' list," Khasru added

On the other hand, the CEC said the EC, with 74 million voters in the country, has to work under pressure. "It will be very difficult to handle the additional voters if expatriates, scattered across the globe, are included in the list."

He said the neighboring countries like India, Sri Lanka and others have no such provision. "With the existing practice, we should not go for such a provision," he added

Earlier, the government constituted a high-powered Cabinet Committee headed by the law minister to examine the prospect of inclusion of expatriates in the voter list

Soon after the EC launched a project on May 15 last year to prepare a fresh voter list, expatriate Bangladeshis, specially those in European countries, raised the demand for their enrolment in the voters list. They submitted memoranda to the Prime Minister and the CEC.

In several statements home and abroad, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina assured overseas Bangladeshis that they would be enrolled in the fresh voter list

The law minister also expressed his optimism in this regard in parliament. Official sources said the law ministry is working on a draft amendment to the existing law in this regard.

Existing laws permit an eligible Bangladeshi residing within the geographical boundary during election to cast his or her vote. Government SEE PAGE 11 COL 6

## Road accidents in Gazipur, Comilla kill 19

At least 19 people were killed and 39 others injured in separate road accidents in Gazipur and Comilla districts yesterday.

Of them, 11 were killed in Gazipur while the rest in Comilla, police and witnesses said

In Gazipur, 11 people were killed and 36 injured when Dhaka-bound bus from Panchagarh skidded off the road and fell into a roadside ditch at Sutrapur in Kaliakoir Upazila at around 6 in the morning, killing 10 passen gers on the spot and injuring 36 others. Another died on way to hospital.

Of the dead, seven were identified as Golam Quddus, 50, Kanchan, 36, Wahed Ali, 35, Jahangir, 30, Chittaranjan 30, Jasimuddin, 25, and Kader, 22. The identity of four others could not be known till filing of this report last night.

The injured were admitted to different hospitals and clinics in Gazipur, Kaliakoir and Dhaka. Our Correspondent from Comilla reports: Eight people including two children were killed and three injured when a microbus collided with a truck on Dhaka-Chittagong highway at Baro Gobindapur in Chandina Upazila yesterday morning.
