## WC budg slashed KOREA APAN

The World Cup has become the latest casualty of Japan's economic slump after organisers said they were slicing 22 million dollars (15.4 million pounds) off the budget for the 2002 event.

The draft budget, wich initially totalled 63.4 billion yen (370 million pounds) when it was compiled last year. will be slashed to 60.7 billion yen as a result of Japan's economic downturn said a spokesman for JAWOC, the Japanese organising committee

He also said JAWOC has asked the 10 Japanese municipalities which will be hosting

the matches to donate 100 million yen each to the budget.

While the spokesman said on Wednesday the donations would not be used specifically to make up for any shortfall in revenue in other areas, he did admit that things were tough given the country's apparent slide back towards recession.

"Obviously, we need funding to avoid running the event in red ink." he said.

The Asahi Shimbun daily reported on Wednesday that JAWOC was forced to ask the local governments for contributions because donations from other groups, such as businesses, were unlikely to meet expected targets.

The paper said many of the 10 municipalities were likely to be upset at the request, as they had already been asked in December to contribute an additional 100 million ven.

"Some local governments may say 'why again?', but we think they will all agree to pay in the end," the spokesman said

The new draft budget is expected to be approved by JAWOC's board, which will meet on Friday.

PERU OUTCLASS CHILE In Lima, Peru outclassed their old rivals Chile to win a passionate South American World Cup qualifier 3-1 despite missing a hatful of chances

Peru created more than 20 clearcut openings but their old failing in front of goal kept them waiting until the last 20 minutes for victory in an enthralling clash between the two neighbours.

Goals by Flavio Maestri, Andres Mendoza and Claudio Pizarro eventually won the match and virtually ended Chile's hopes of reaching the 2002 World Cup finals.

Chile dropped to eighth place in the South American group with 10 points from 11 games. Peru went above Chile and Bolivia with 11 points, but their own chances remained very faint after poor earlier results.

# Woodgate, Bowyer lied ?

Two Leeds United footballers on trial for serious assault launched a "cowardly attack" on a lone Asian student then lied to police to avoid the consequences, a court has heard

Jonathan Woodgate, Lee Bowyer and their "partners in crime" battered Sarfraz Najeib unconscious in January last year then concocted false accounts for police and the jury during their six-week trial, prosecutors said.

A third player, Michael Duberry, who is charged with conspiring to pervert the course of justice, showed real courage by telling the court that Woodgate had said on the night of the attack that he had "been in a fight with some Asians", chief prosecutor Nicholas Campbell said in his closing speech

But he said even Duberry had failed to tell the whole truth and that the others had told a "pack of lies" and changed their stories after reading eye-witness accounts.

"They have concealed evidence from investigating authorities...they have all lied and accounts have been changed and tailored to suit...the evidence they had to confront," Campbell said.

"They have shown themselves to be cowards, not only in that it was a cowardly attack but also in their unwillingness to do anything to face up to the consequences of their actions," he added.

Witnesses who told the jury of their horror when they saw the savage attack had acted in stark

contrast to the defendants by choosing to help police, often at great personal cost, Campbell said.

"These witnesses are courageous people. How very different is the case of these five defendants,' he said.

Woodgate, Bowver and two friends, Paul Clifford and Neale Caveney, could face jail if they are convicted of grievous bodily harm with intent and of affray. They all deny the charges.

Troubled Germany hero Oliver Bierhoff, who will have to sit on the bench when his country play Greece on Wednesday, might never wear the captain's armband on the international stage again.

Coach Rudi Voeller confirmed on Tuesday that the AC Milan striker would start the group nine match in Athens as a substitute.

Voeller insisted he was still counting on the 32-year-old for the future, but many saw the signs that an era was drawing to a close when Bierhoff did not return to the pitch after halftime of the match against Albania on Saturday.

After missing an early chance, the man who so often lifted Germany out of tight spots looked completely lost.

for the second half of a game a lacklustre German side won 2-1, courtesy of a late goal from newcomer Miroslav Klose.

Bierhoff, who has now gone 365 painful minutes without a goal for his country, had come on only for the last 25 minutes of Germany's previous game, a 1-0 defeat to France in a friendly last month.

After that match, in wich he was again disappointing, his performance was harshly criticised by former Germany captain and coach Franz Beckenbauer

In the build-up to the game against Albania, Bierhoff said he felt Voeller did not give him the kind of support former

Germany coach Berti Vogts had for his captain, Juergen Klinsmann, said when faced with a similar crisis.

But against Albania, Bierhoff failed to do enough to convince Voeller that he was the right man to lead the side.


Real Madrid have extended the contract of coach Vicente Del Bosque until June 2003.
