## Bi-cameral parliament Continuation of reserved seats needed to ensure good governance Speakers tell workshop in city

Speakers at a workshop yesterday underscored the need for bicameral parliament to ensure good governance in the country and suggested that the tenure of parlia-

ment should be reduced. Zakeria Shirazi, Joint Editor of the Daily Independent, in his keynote paper, said a sound political system obviously is a prerequisite for good governance. Democracy may not be an ideal system of government it has many limitations, he added.

He observed that the five-year tenure of parliament is too long.

This long tenure tends to make the ruling party irresponsible and the opposition parties desperate,"

Shirazi said. He said if general election is held at shorter intervals, political activities will be more parliamentcentred and election-oriented and the tendency to settle matters in the streets will decline.

Plainclothes policemen at the gate rescued Abdullah, but the attackers managed to escape.

The victim told The Daily Star that those who assaulted him shouted at him saying "beat the Inqilab man".

It said a comprehensive internal inquiry by the BBC World Service into an interview by him that appeared in the daily Janakantha in February resulted in his removal.

"The inquiry found no evidence to back up the inferences which some readers may have drawn from the article but judged that his conduct during the interview amounted to a failure of editorial judgement that compromises effective stewardship of the Bengali section."

The BBC stresses that the objectivity of his broadcast work has not been brought into question.

However, his comments in the interview on the politics of Bangladesh and the Bangladeshi Prime Minister were not those expected of a section head of a BBC World Service language section.

The three Senior Producers of the Section will, each in turn, be Acting Head of the Bengali Section until permanent head is appointed, said the BBC World Service release.

In severely affected municipali ties, water samples of handpumped tubewells will also be tested and required manpower including NGO workers will be trained up to implement mitigation programmes, they said.

Geo-hydrologists and geochemists, when contacted, said the level of other metallic substances like fluoride, boron, magnesium etc in ground water should also be tested along with arsenic.

"Excess level of fluoride has been found in ground water in some areas of Narayanganj district. Such excess level of metallic substances may be found in many areas of the country, if tested. So it will be wise to go for testing other parameters in drinking water", said a geo-hydrologist seeking anonymity.

There are 224 municipalities in the country and 100 of those have pipeline system to supply water.

confinement is totally "illogical and illegal" as the way the army man was brought into the civil administration was not valid.

"For the sake of argument though, we consider his confinement as legal, but he was taken on police remand for seven days whereas police kept Mohiuddin 9 days in their custody and confessional statement was made at the end of nine days."

As the confession of the Mohiuddin was made during his two days "illegal" confinement, so according to section 30 of evidence act his confessional statement was not lawful. "It was not given willfully even though it was not true," Khan Saifur argued.

Browsing the confessional statements of seven accused, including Farook Rahman, Taheruddin Thakur, Jobaida Rashid, Sheikh Yusuf Ali and Abu Musa Majumdar, the defense lawyer contended that their statements could not ascertain as to what the actual motives behind the incident on August 15, 1975

"Sometimes it appears that the incident was a mutiny, to oust the government, to realise proclamation from Bangabandhu ousting BAKSAL, to hold Bangabandhu some civil persons and three army 2 murdered some civil persons and three army men," Khan Saifur said.

"So it was difficult to determine as to which cause actually was behind the incident that can be tried in the civil court.'
