

India-SL Test venues fixed

India's three-Test series in Sri Lanka this August will be played at the southern port town of Galle, Kandy and Colombo, an Indian cricket board official said on Wednesday.

India, who begin a 50-day tour of Sri Lanka on July 15, will take part in a triangular one-day series also involving New Zealand ahead of the Tests.

Afghan cricket team arrives in Pakistan

The first-ever Afghan cricket team arrived here Tuesday on a week-long tour and said the visit was aimed at taking gradual steps into international cricket.

"We are here on a tour of goodwill and aim to take gradual steps in international cricket," team captain Allahdad Noori said.

All 17 members of the novice team are bearded and will play their matches in trousers, which they are not allowed to do at home, cricket officials said.

The headline Taliban militia which rules most of the Afghanistan has barred Afghans from wearing trousers in line with its puritanical interpretation of Islamic Sharia law.

"We want to tell the world that Afghans can also play sports," Noori said.

War-battered Afghanistan is isolated in the world and is under the United Nations sanctions for its refusal to hand over indicted terrorist Osama bin Laden.

The millionaire Saudi dissident is wanted by United States over the 1998 twin bombing of its embassies in East Africa.

Noori said the Taliban was not against sports.

"Islam remains the first priority but ever since Taliban have taken control, cricket has become popular in Afghanistan," he said.

A Pakistan club football team was treated shabbily by Taliban when it visited the militia's headquarters in the southern Afghan city of Kandahar last year.

Players were arrested for playing in shorts and their heads were shaved.

The Afghanistan team, invited here by the Pakistan Cricket Board, will play two matches each in Peshawar and Rawalpindi.

The first match will be against the Peshawar under-19 on Thursday.

The International Cricket Council (ICC) last year donated cricket kits to Afghanistan when the ICC development manager for Asia, Nasimul Ghani, visited Kabul.

Russian schoolboy makes Wisden

After 138 years, cricket's bible Wisden has added a Russian to its books.

Alexei Korobkin, a 17-year-old schoolboy from St Petersburg, earned a mention by taking figures of six for 24 at Dover College in a match against the XI Club. Both clubs are in Kent.

His achievement was more remarkable given it was just his second season.

Korobkin was mentioned in the Wisden almanac as one of the most outstanding schoolboys of the year. He was Dover's leading bowler for the 2000 season, taking 13 wickets in 59 overs.

Korobkin said he wanted to take cricket to Russia when he finished school. He named England fast bowler Darren Gough as his hero.

"It's a remarkable achievement because Alexei never had the opportunity to play cricket at home in Russia," said Wisden managing editor Hugh Chevallier. "He has done very well."

Dover College headmaster Howard Blackett said the school was very proud of Korobkin.

Al Temyat Asia's best

Troussier first foreign Coach of the Year

Saudi Arabian midfielder Nawaf Al Temyat has been named Asian Player of the Year for 2000, the Asian Football Confederation (AFC) announced at a ceremony on Wednesday.

Al Temyat, who plays for Asian Club and Asian Super Cup champions Al Hilal, was chosen ahead of Japanese players Hiroshi Nanami and Ryuzo Morioka and South Korea's Lee Dong-gook.

"In the name of God the most gracious, the most merciful, I thank God for my success," said Al Temyat via a videolink from Paris, where he is recovering after surgery to repair a damaged knee ligament.

"I thank the AFC and all those who nominated me for this award, which I consider the most important of my career."

"I dedicate this award to Saudi Arabia, my father, God, rest his soul, and my mother, may God preserve her."

"I also dedicate this award to all who have helped me in my sporting career, including administrators, coaching staff and players in Al Hilal's team."

Al Temyat, who is the first Saudi to win the award since

Saeed Owairan in 1994, was highly influential in Al Hilal's victory over defending champions Jubilo Iwata of Japan in the final of the Asian Club Championship last year.

That victory qualified the club for the Asian Super Cup, in which they beat Asian Cup Winners' Cup holders Shimizu S-Pulse of Japan over two games, with Al Temyat voted MVP in both legs.

He also helped his country reach the Asian Cup final in Lebanon last October.

The knee injury he picked up in April is likely to rule him out of action until the end of the year.

Al-Hilal won the Team of the Year award.

Meanwhile, Japan national team coach Philippe Troussier was named Coach of the Year, the first non-Asian to receive the award.

The Frenchman led Japan to their Asian Cup triumph in Lebanon last October, and to the quarter-finals of the Olympic Games in Sydney.

"It's a great honour to receive this award from the AFC," said Troussier. "This represents great recognition for me and I consider it an invitation to join a small circle of people within the Asian football family."

"This award represents the results of the national team of Japan and I have to share this honour with my players, my staff and all of the coaches in Japan, as well as the supporters and those who have backed me."

Troussier, who succeeded Takeshi Okada as Japan coach in 1998, won the award ahead of Thailand's English coach Peter Withe, Saudi Arabia's Nassir Al Johar and Iraq's Adnan Hamad.

Japan also won the National Team of the Year, while Ryoichi Maeda was named Asian Youth Player of the Year.

Lamb defends Pak itinerary

England cricket official Tim Lamb has denied the forthcoming two-Test series with Pakistan is a bad reflection on the tourists.

The Chief Executive of the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) has hit back at media comment regarding the length of Pakistan's current tour.

"It is completely wrong to suggest that the ECB's decision to host two Test Matches against Pakistan this summer reflects poorly on the tourists," said Lamb.

"Our original plan for this summer was to play a six Test Ashes series against Australia only."

"However, following our new broadcasting deal with Channel Four and Sky in 1998, we agreed to expand the international match programme to seven Test matches per summer and introduce a triangular one-day tournament, The NatWest Series."

"This enabled us to extend an invitation to another international side and the Pakistan Cricket Board readily accepted our offer to play two Tests this summer and take part in the NatWest Series."

"It would not have made cricketing or commercial sense for us to play a seven-Test series against one country and we firmly believe that the current international match programme is in tune with what cricket fans want."

"It should also be stressed that Pakistan's tour this year was originally intended to be an additional tour over and above the visit Pakistan were due to make here in 2004 under the previous touring programme."

This has now been overtaken by the new ICC Test Cricket World Championship whereby each country has to play each other twice home and away during a five-year period and, as a consequence, Pakistan will now not tour here in 2004.

"I can reassure Pakistan supporters that the ECB has the utmost respect for their team's ability. They are one of the most exciting sides to watch in world cricket and we will be looking to play a minimum of three Test matches and possibly four when Pakistan are next due to tour here again in 2006."

Hingis rolls on

Top-seeded Swiss Martina Hingis said Tuesday she is now her own woman after arriving in Berlin minus her mother and former coach Melanie Molitor and swiftly despatching Tathiana Garbin of Italy 6-2, 6-3 to reach the third round of the 1.2 million-dollar German Open.

Hingis arrived in Germany with hitting partner David Taylor after dispensing with her mother's services for the second time in less than two years but didn't allow the issue to bother her as she swept through her match in just 52-min despite a rather lacklustre showing.

"The first 'break with mum' came after Hingis lost to Steffi Graf in the 1999 Roland Garros final, whereupon she memorably threw a tantrum and then crashed out of Wimbledon in the opening round, humbled in straight sets by Jelena Dokic."

But Hingis maintains this latest move to flee the nest is all part of growing up and taking responsibility for her own life.

While Tuesday's performance was not one to have main rival Venus Williams quaking in her boots it was a sufficiently comfortable afternoon's work by Hingis, who won this tournament two years ago.

Despite tournament wins in Sydney, Doha and Dubai, 2001 has not been a good Hingis vintage with Jennifer Capriati ousting her in the Australian Open final and again in the final at Charleston.

Her North American season brought additional defeats by Kim Clijsters, Venus Williams and Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario to leave the 20-year-old with plenty to ponder as she prepares to break her duck at Roland Garros in three weeks time.

On Tuesday, Garbin, ranked 56 in the world, was a suitable lamb for the slaughter as in her two previous encounters with Hingis - who is gunning for her 39th singles title - she had managed to win just two games in total.

Once again the 23-year-old Italian floundered in the face of Hingis' superior positional sense and all-round claycourt guile.

Aussies at work

The Australians may not have arrived for the Ashes yet, but Surrey found their progress in Division One of the English County Championship barred by a couple of early arrivals from down under.

Alex Tudor struck early against Northamptonshire at Wantage Road - removing Mal Loye - but that was to be the champions' only success of the opening session.

Michael Hussey, from Western Australia, and the Sydney-born Jeff Cook batted positively to take the home side to 127 for one at lunch, on the opening day Wednesday. Hussey was on 53 and Cook 50.

Muttiah Muralitharan took two wickets for Lancashire to check Leicestershire's good start at Grace

Road. Vince Wells (34) and Darren Maddy (44) hurried to an opening stand of 70, but once Wells fell to Glen Chapple the home side struggled.

Muralitharan removed Ben Smith and Aftab Habib, for a duck, to leave Leicestershire on 120 for four at lunch.

Marcus Trescothick suffered a rare failure, making only 12 against Yorkshire.

The England opener has hit four hundreds this season but never got going at Headingley before he drove a return catch to Ryan Sidebottom.

Chris Silverwood had Piran Holloway caught behind as Somerset reached lunch on 99 for two, with captain Jamie Cox unbeaten on 23.

Division Two Durham were struggling at Edg-

baston. They were 102 for five at lunch after Warwickshire's seamers had enjoyed a rewarding morning.

Vasbert Drakes led the way with three wickets and with Melvyn Bett and Alan Richardson claiming one apiece, Durham lost half their side for 58.

Paul Collingwood's undefeated 35 helped the visitors mount something of a recovery.

Hampshire endured an even worse morning. They struggled to 79 for six at lunch against Worcestershire at the Rose Bowl.

Alamgir Sheriyyar took three wickets, while there were a couple for Stuart Lampitt.

South African seamer Greg Smith took two early wickets to leave Sussex 15 for two against Nottinghamshire.

Bas Zuiderant and Matthew Yardy repaired the early damage, but Smith struck again on the stroke of lunch - removing Yardy for 35 - to leave the home side 107 for three at lunch, with Zuiderant on 36.

At Bristol, Middlesex's Simon Cook took three quick wickets to leave Gloucestershire 58 for three.

Kim Barnett and Ian Harvey denied the visitors any further success to leave Gloucestershire 124 for three at the interval.

Paul Grayson enjoyed himself at the expense of the Cambridge UCC attack.

The Essex opener rushed to a century from 79 balls and went on to reach 114 not out at lunch.

With Paul Prichard unbeaten on 90, Essex were 212 without loss at lunch from only 39 overs.

Mission millionaire

Australia will have its first millionaire cricketer under a new pay agreement announced on Wednesday.

The Australian cricket team will become the best-paid sporting team in Australia, the best-paid cricket team in the world, Australian Cricket Board (ACB) chief executive Malcolm Speed said.

One Australian player would earn 1 million Australian dollars (520,000 US) a year during the life of a new four-year agreement with the board, Speed told a news conference.

"In the course of this agreement we will have our first million-dollar cricketer," he said.

"The cricket pie has grown significantly. There's more money there to be spread across the players, there's more money to be spread across the state associations...and the business of running

Australian cricket."

The ACB announced a list of 25 contracted players for the 2001-02 season on May 1.

The players would be ranked one to 25 by the selectors and the number one player would stand the best chance of topping the million-dollar mark.

Speed said the chairman of selectors Trevor Hohns would speak to the players next week about their rankings.

"I'm not going to guess who the first one-million-dollar player will be," Speed said.

"There's an additional allowance for captain and vice-captain. It's now a reasonably significant sum."

Speed said an ACB-contracted player could have earned a maximum of 625,000 dollars during the 2000-01 season but this was projected to rise to 1.162 million dollars in 2004-05.

But players who accept overseas contracts will be required to forego 12.5 per cent of their retainer.

Australia's Shane Warne and Glenn McGrath, both boasting more than 300 Test wickets, played English county cricket last year.

Australian Cricketers' Association (ACA) chief executive Tim May said the pay rise was a fitting reward for the team.

"We think one million dollars per annum for a player is just reward for their efforts and their sacrifices," he said.

"It's a global sport and these guys are the best in the world."

Speed said Australian administrators were keen to retain cricket's position as the first-choice sport for top young athletes in the country.

Australia are also World Cup holders in rugby league and rugby union while Australian Rules football is another popular sport.

Wallabies captain John Eales, Kangaroos rugby league skipper Brad Fittler and top Australian Rules players are reported to earn just over 500,000 dollars.

Australian cricket revenue has risen by almost 50 per cent in the past four years and the ACB projects it will climb from 78 million dollars to 108 million dollars by 2002-03.

ACB public affairs manager Brendan McClements said the most lucrative of these included Indian and English television rights which the ACB sells when hosting tours.

Speed said one-quarter of the revenue each year would be allocated to player payments.

Fifty-five per cent of player payments would go to the ACB's contracted players through retainers, match fees, tour and other payments.

The other 45 per cent would go to state-contracted players.

The highest-paid state player stands to earn 140,000 dollars in 2004-05 compared to 89,000 in 2000-01.
