

Khaleda demands
Launch
combing
operation
under caretaker
govt, not now

UNB, Dhaka

Opposition leader Khaleda Zia has demanded a combing operation to curb terrorism once the caretaker government takes over, not under this partisan administration.

"This government during last five years has staged farce in the name of combing operation. It has arrested opposition leaders and workers instead of nabbing real culprits," she said in a statement yesterday.

As a result, the BNP chief observed, the actual offenders have been desperately carrying out killings, rape, plunder, extortion, grabbing and attack and oppression.

She alleged terrorists were not caught because they are leaders and workers of the ruling party or relatives of the party men.

"As a result, there is no rule of law in the country at all," Khaleda Zia said, adding that every citizen is afraid of their life and property and dignity.

Drive to arrest criminals in 4 cities begins today

Police in four metropolitan cities of the country will begin a drive today to arrest criminals and recover arms, sources said.

The drive will continue up to June 28 in the cities of Dhaka, Chittagong, Khulna and Rajshahi.

It would be a part of the regular combing operation. However, this drive would have a special focus on arresting most wanted criminals having arrest warrants.

Police would be reinforced by Ansars. "There would not be any additional police reinforcement in the drive," said a high official.

UNB adds, the newly appointed RMP Commissioner has ordered a combing operation in the city from today to arrest criminals wanted in

Dacoits kill
businessman,
loot
wholesale shop
in Chittagong

Dacoits killed a businessman and looted a wholesale shop at Dohazari Bazar under Chondanishtha in the district in the early hours of yesterday.

The victim was identified as Mohammad Ali, 30. A gang of dacoits entered shop through ventilators and strangled Mohammad Ali when he was asleep.

They also looted Tk 50 thousand in cash and 12 tolas of gold ornament from iron safe of the shop. Ali got married last year.

Protesting the incident, the local businessmen went on a strike. They also decided to continue the strike till 2 pm today demanding immediate arrest of the killers of Ali who hailed from nearby Patiya upazila.

Bangladesh tops list of UN peacekeepers

M ANWAR HAQ, from New York

died and 56 were injured during peacekeeping operations.

Hedi Annabi told newsmen that the current cost of the UN peacekeeping operations was in the neighbourhood of 2.4 billion US dollars.

Responding to several questions, Hedi Annabi said the United Nations despite the increasing size of its peacekeeping operations, did not consider setting up a standing UN army as it would involve huge costs and members did not find it "practically feasible."

"We never think of having a standing UN army. What we have is a standby army."

"We have a list of countries who are willing to participate in peacekeeping operations and request participation in all missions from them," Hedi Annabi said.

He also pointed out that although developed countries contributed most of the costs of peacekeeping operations, they themselves were unwilling to participate physically. So far, 89 countries contributed troops in various peacekeeping operations.

Regarding Australia's participation in East Timor's operations, he said, it happened as Australia itself was agreeable to participate and Indonesia extended its consent.

"Peacekeepers are only sent after consent is received from all sides involved in a conflict resolution," he said.

3 Rakhaín youths arrested: Bullets recovered

Bangladesh Rifles detained two Rakhaín youths along with 473 live bullets from a bus on Teknaf Highway on Thursday.

Sources said BDR men searched a Cox's Bazar-bound bus at about 8 pm and seized the ammunition from Mongcating, 25, and Ray Aug, 22, of Boudhia Mandir and Rice Bazar Road in the town. The bullets were found wrapped around their waist.

Police later arrested another Rakhaín youth, Mong Chen Ching, 20, following their confessional statement.

Dhaka's ban on rice import Mixed reaction among Indian exporters

Bangladesh's decision to ban import of rice from India has caused mixed reaction among exporters here with one section saying it might hit the proposed target of export of three million tonnes while others ruling out cause for worry on account of this.

Exports of ordinary variety of Indian rice are not meant for Bangladesh only because a major chunk of it goes to Russia, Mauritius and Madagascar, says S S Kumar, vice president of L T Overseas.

According to him, Bangladesh had exported more rice than what it required. Besides, Bangladesh expects a good paddy crop this year and therefore the ban on Indian rice import is nothing 'surprising', Kumar says.

However, an official of a multinational trading house says Dhaka's decision would affect the overall rice export target. He points out that although Indian non-basmati rice was not competitive from the point

Bangladesh largely imports raw short-grained rice from India along with some parboiled quality. Since October last year, ten to twelve thousand tonnes of rice were delivered from India to Bangladesh as against orders for nearly 25,000 tonnes, Kumar says.

Daewoo likely to deliver frigate to Bangladesh next week

Daewoo Shipbuilding and Marine Engineering Co. is ready to deliver a frigate to Bangladesh and become the first South Korean shipyard to export a naval battle ship, a company spokesman said Friday.

The shipyard is also holding talks with Malaysia to export a submarine, the spokesman said.

"We plan to deliver the 2,300 tonne frigate to Bangladesh next week," he said.

The 100 million dollar ship is 103.7 meters long and 12.5 meters wide at her widest point.

Armed with one 76 millimeter main cannon and two 40-millimeter support guns and ship-to-ship missiles, the frigate can move up to 25.3 knots an hour.

Daewoo Shipbuilding and Marine Engineering has become profitable again since becoming independent from the bankrupt Daewoo Group last year.

Two more murders in city

Two more persons were killed in last 16 hours ending at 3:30 p.m. yesterday in the city.

Fazlu, 24, a member of Mia Bahini, was shot dead by his rivals at Bhuiyanpara under Khilgaon thana at about 3:30 p.m.

Witnesses said an armed gang of four led by local terrorist Mithu swooped on Fazlu, brother of Mia, a top terrorist and leader of 'Mia Bahini', near Minar Mosque.

They fired several shots at him from behind and took him to a nearby lane where they stabbed him indiscriminately.

The critically injured Fazlu was rushed to the Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) where doctors declared him dead. The body was sent to the hospital morgue for autopsy.

The duty officer of Khilgaon thana said last night that Fazlu was involved in criminal activities in the area and accused in three cases: murder, robbery and looting. He was

PDB staff threaten agitation unless reforms stopped by June 17

Engineers, officials and workers of Power Development Board (PDB) have urged the government to stop donor-prescribed "unilateral" reforms in power sector by June 17.

Otherwise, they threatened a tougher agitation including a 24-hour work abstention.

Eight unions of PDB in a joint meeting yesterday strongly opposed the process of corporatising Ashugan Power Plant and handing over transmission to Power Grid Company of Bangladesh (PGCB).

They also urged the government to stop indiscriminate transfer of PDB lines and establishments to REB.

Chaired by Hydroelectric Engineers' Association leader Mizanur Rahman, the meeting demanded implementation of recommendations of a committee involving power-sector trade unions to save PDB from destruction.

Central leaders and representatives of eight trade unions of engineers, employees and workers were present in the meeting.

Both individuals, social bodies have role in curbing corruption

Individual effort coupled with socio-cultural movement has become a must to curb corruption, which has become a chronic disease in the society.

Participants at a seminar titled The role of civil society in curbing corruption and Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB) in Mymensingh yesterday also observed that the state was not doing enough to check corruption.

Chairman of TIB Board of Trustees Prof. Khan Sarwar Murshid attended the seminar as chief guest while Shamsul Islam, convenor of the CCC, presided over. Organised by the Committee of Concerned Citizens (CCC), Mymensingh Sadar, the seminar was held at the Mymensingh District Council Auditorium.

According to TIB officials, six such CCC units comprising conscious people in the locality have so far been formed in greater Mymensingh area with technical and logistics support of TIB to fight corruption at the local level. It has been decided that the CCC, Mymensingh Sadar will initially combat corruption in primary education and health sectors, according to Shamsul Islam.

Prof. Muzaffar Ahmad of Dhaka University presented a paper on 'Corruption in Bangladesh and Good Governance' while Prof. Jatin Sarkar presented another on 'Corruption: Society: Socio-cultural Movement'.

Former comptroller and auditor general (CAG) M Hafizuddin Khan attended the programme as special guest. Representatives of different professional groups in the locality, a number of diplomatic missions in Dhaka

All for giving peace a chance

The initial wave arising out of Indian Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee's invitation to Pakistan's military ruler Gen Pervez Musharraf is slowly giving way to a more realistic assessment of the possible thaw in relations between India and Pakistan.

With Vajpayee's invitation having been delivered to Pakistan, the stage now appears set for a renewed summit-level engagement between the two countries since Vajpayee had met the then Prime Minister of Pakistan Nawaz Sharif, a democratically-elected head of government, in Lahore in February 1999.

Sources here say the Musharraf visit to New Delhi may take place either in the last week of June or early July.

In agreeing to engage Musharraf, India has, no doubt, moved quite a distance from its reluctance to interact with a person who overthrew a democracy. Delhi did this in the hope of giving peace a chance. But officials are still skeptical about Musharraf's intentions.

In sharp contrast, observers say, is the dignified and reconciliatory tone of Vajpayee's letter to Musharraf which was released to the press here on Friday. In his letter, the Indian Prime Minister made no mention of the Pak intrusion in Kargil in 1999, soon after Vajpayee's historic bus ride to Lahore.

Instead, Vajpayee's letter said "our common enemy is poverty. For the welfare of our people, there is no other course" but pursuit of "the path of reconciliation, engaging in productive dialogue and building trust and confidence."

The Indian Prime Minister chose not to rake up the memories of Kargil and instead asked Musharraf to "pick up the threads" again and "walk the high road" to peace and prosperity in the Subcontinent.
