Real Madrid secured their 28th Spanish league title and their first since 1997 with an emphatic 5-0 win at home over UEFA Cup finalists Alaves on Saturday.

The win over Alaves gives Real 76 points and a nine-point lead with two weekends left to go but last year's champions Deportivo La Coruna, who lie comfortably in second place and play Valladolid on Sunday, are the only challenger capable of matching their tally and they have an inferior head-to-head record.

Two goals from Raul, and strikes from Jose Maria 'Guti' Gutierrez, captain Fernando Hierro and Ivan Helguera wrapped up the title.

Real's victory sparked wild celebrations, not only at their famous Santiago Bernabeu stadium where they were awarded the trophy after the game, but also by the Cibeles fountain in the centre of the Spanish capital, the traditional location where Real fans go to salute their heroes after a major triumph.

In anticipation of the victory, police had erected extensive scaffolding and barriers around the fountain on Saturday, but there were no early reports of violent confrontations with the police and damage, unlike after Real Madrid's Champions League wins in 1998 and 2000.

Fireworks had been exploding into the night above Madrid since Real's first goal and just 40 minutes after the game had finished, Spanish police estimated that 500,000 people had made their way to the Plaza de Cibeles.

Portuguese international Luis Figo, in many people's eyes the architect of Real's triumph after playing in 34 of the club's 36 league games since moving from bitter rivals Barcelona last summer, summed up the feelings of both the Real players and fans alike.

"I can't describe it. It's the best thing I've ever won," the world's most expensive player said, somewhat lost for words and conveniently forgetting his two league title with his former Catalan club.

Since their Champions League semi-final exit to Bayern Munich earlier this month, Real had looked increasingly out of touch with their domestic campaign, and there were suspicions that the championship

might go to the wire.

But they showed no signs of lethargy on Saturday.

Raul and Guti ran the Alaves defence ragged throughout the first 45 minutes and Alaves were clearly missing the suspended Romanian international Cosmin Contra as the hosts went into the break 2-0 up.

Raul opened the scoring after 21 minutes with a cheeky chip from the edge of the six-yard box, over the head of the advancing Alaves goalkeeper Martin Herrera.

Less than 60 seconds later, an unmarked Guti headed home a Raul cross from far out on the left-hand side.

Five minutes into the second half, Hierro put the game beyond reach with another header after the Alaves defence had been caught napping again.

The avalanche of goals continued when Helguera found the net after 66 minutes and then Raul headed home his 22nd league goal of the season with nine minutes left, to put him on top of the Spanish First Division goal scoring charts.

Schalke's solace in Cup triumph

Schalke 04 made up for the disappointment of being pipped to the German title by winning the German Cup with a 2-0 victory over Third Division minnows Union Berlin here on Saturday.

The match, in front of 73,000 spectators at the Berlin Olympic Stadium, was deadlocked until the 53rd minute when Jorg Bohme curled a spectacular free kick over the Union wall for the lead.

The club from the former East Germany suddenly appeared swamped against the powerful Ruhr-based team that only lost the German championship to Bayern Munich on the last day of the season and five minutes later Bohme converted a penalty after Belgian striker Emile Mpenza was brought down.

Despite their defeat Union Berlin are assured of a place in next year's UEFA Cup because Schalke's have automatically qualified for the Champions League by finishing second in the league.

Scottish Cup

Celtic's clean sweep

Celtic completed a domestic treble when they beat Hibernian 3-0 in the Scottish Cup Final here at Hampden Park Saturday as Sweden striker Henrik Larsson's double strike took his season's tally to 53.

Jackie McNamara's 39th minute opener had put the Scottish Premier League Champions and League Cup holders on track for all three major trophies in the same season for the first time since 1969.

Two-goal hero Larsson, who is in line to win the European golden boot awarded to the continent's top scorer, was all smiles as he accepted his man-of-the-match award.

"This is great, this is the one (title) I missed," he said. "I couldn't play in the final two years ago (a 1-0 defeat to Rangers), and obviously last year Rangers won again."

"The whole team played very well today again."

On his spectacular first goal he said: "It was a good goal, especially as I shot it with my left (foot)."

Strasbourg hail Chilavert

Strasbourg won the French Cup here at the Stade de France on Saturday, beating minnows Amiens 5-4 on penalties with goalkeeper Jose Luis Chilavert first saving and then converting the decisive spot kicks.

The dull match had finished 0-0 after extra-time.

Amiens' 22-year-old midfielder Oscar Ewolo was the unfortunate player who had his side's fourth penalty saved by Chilavert.

Chilavert, the charismatic Paraguayan who has a reputation for taking free kicks, then stepped up to convert the decisive penalty before charging turning joyously towards his teammates.

Strasbourg, relegated from the First Division this year, and Amiens, promoted from the third, will meet again in the Second Division next season - and Chilavert afterwards pledged to stay with the club and help them fight for promotion.

"I used all my experience for the penalties," he said. "Now I'm going to work to get Strasbourg back into

the First Division. I'm making the club my priority."

In a game that produced few goal chances Amiens' steely defence and Strasbourg's poor finishing had ensured the lottery of a penalty shootout was the only way to settle this grim affair.

The two coaches suffered on their benches during the tense and often clumsy opening spell. Amiens boss Denis Troch punched the dug out roof while his pale-faced counterpart Yvon Pouliquen trembled with stress.

Amiens captain Laurent Strzelczak man-marked Strasbourg star Pegguy Luyindula effectively, but was booked for a third foul on the Kinshasa-born 22-year-old just before half-time.

Strasbourg had the best chances in the first 45 minutes, shots from Pascal Johansen and journeyman Corintin Martins both skimming the Amiens post with Julien Laschuer beaten in the Amiens goal.

Claude Rivenet missed an open goal 10 minutes into the second-half but his scuffed shot woke up the 25,000 fans who made the trip from northern France to fill the 78,000-capacity stadium.

On the hour a defensive blunder from Pierre Njanka in the Strasbourg

area almost let in Amiens' giant striker Peter Sampil but Chilavert cleared his scrambled effort.

Sampil should have done better on 68 minutes when he shot straight at Chilavert when clean through on goal.

A five-minute Strasbourg onslaught on the Amiens goal almost bore fruit with 15 minutes remaining but defender Ludovic Leroy took the ball from Luyindula's toe as he teed up from close range.

Luyindula continued to break down either flank and a left-sided dribble set up a Rafik Mezriché shot that clipped the bar in the 80th minute as Strasbourg continued to threaten the disciplined Amiens back line.

A dull first period of extra time had only one only bright spot when Chilavert ran up the field to take a free kick, only to have to run all the way back after his soft lob went wide.

Sampil should have scored as he ran onto a through ball with only Chilavert to beat with eight minutes to go but the match's trademark shoddy finishing again left the scores at 0-0 with both sides visibly shattered.

Madrid party all night

Real Madrid celebrated their first Spanish league title for four years with champagne, smiles and even a spot of bullfighting on Saturday.

The players, determined to enjoy the club's first championship for four years, made the short trip from the Bernabeu to the city's Cibeles fountain to crown the moment in front of an estimated 400,000 delirious fans.

A 5-0 win at home to Alaves gave Vicente del Bosque's side a decisive nine-point lead at the top of the table and a record 28th championship trophy.

As the 75,000 full house at the Bernabeu roared with approval, the players took with them a giant mock-up of the league title on several laps of honour.

Goalkeeper Iker Casillas, who had to be content with a place on the bench on Saturday, livened up the celebrations still further by driving the players on the stretcher cart up and down the field.

And Raul, who took his tally for the season to 22 with two goals on Saturday, struck the pose of the "torero" as he paraded with a bull-fighter's cape in the centre of the pitch.

Thousands more supporters cheered the arrival of the team by open top bus at the Cibeles fountain, the traditional setting for Real Madrid celebrations.

The players danced and sang a chorus of "We are the champions" while the crowd cheered before a massive police presence, in attendance in an attempt to prevent the sort of violent scenes that marked the club's two recent European Cup wins in 1998 and 2000.

Spanish radio reported that their had been no such incidents on Saturday night.

"We wanted to win the league like this, in front of our own fans," said Raul, one of the survivors from the last title-winning team four years ago.

"It's been a complicated season but we've shown that we had the balls to finish off the league," a delighted Raul commented.

"We've done it in the best way possible." For England midfielder Steve McManaman, a first championship win of his career was a moment to savour.

"It's my first league title anywhere," McManaman said. "I never managed to win it with Liverpool and now in two years I've won the European Cup and the league."

"This country has been fantastic to me and I hope to win even more next year."

Real coach del Bosque said he was happy to let his players take centre stage.

"They're the ones who've played their hearts out," he said. "We've had some difficult moments this season but the players have coped tremendously and we've been solid throughout."

"With their strength and quality, the players have managed to add a page to the glorious history of this club."

"As I've said before, though, I've just been lucky to be the coach at a time when I've got great players with me."

Saturday's timely display showed they can still rise to the occasion when needed but this season consistency has been a bigger factor in Real's success, with the stellar trio of Raul, Luis Figo and Roberto Carlos all being available to play in 34 of the 36 games so far this season.

Injuries this year, despite the absence for long periods of Spanish international striker Fernando Morientes and Brazilian midfielder Flavio Conceicao, have also affected the side less so than in the four fallow years since their last league title in 1997.

Del Bosque should also take a substantial part of the credit for his role in Real Madrid lifting the title.

Whenever there has been a potential problem that could sour the dressing room atmosphere, Del Bosque has smoothed out the trouble swiftly and with aplomb.

He overcame the potentially destabilising effects of Figo's world record transfer from

bitter rivals Barcelona last sum-

Del Bosque was also man enough to admit that he had made a mistake in leaving English international McManaman on the sidelines, and almost out of the squad, during the first two months, and managed to quickly quell the occasional bouts of public discord by players like Spanish internationals Michel Salgado and Jose Maria Gutierrez.

As the party went on, there were no reports of the violence. Instead, there was an almost palpable sense of relief at the end of a season that had promised even more success.

Real are worthy winners of the championship having shown a

been able to match.

Del Bosque's side have lost just six games -- Deportivo lost 11 in their title-winning campaign last year -- while they have scored 78 goals and conceded 38.

"We've demonstrated all season that we're the best team," said Brazilian winger Savio, who has won back a place in the side after being strongly linked with a transfer earlier in the season.

"That's why we've taken the title and it's time now for us and the fans to enjoy the success."

After an hour spent lapping up the applause at the Bernabeu, the team took the open-top bus down the Castellana, the central Madrid thoroughfare, to the Cibeles fountain.

An estimated 400,000 fans cheered as the players climbed atop the fountain to "crown" the statue.

Such delirious celebration was at odds, though, with the widespread feeling that the current Real side have, if anything, underachieved slightly this season.

The team that swaggered throughout the two group stages of the Champions League and swept past Galatasaray in the home leg of their quarter-final had been tipped for even greater things.

Four chances of silverware had already been squandered by the time the team took the league title, though.

The season started with defeat to Galatasaray in the European Supercup match in Monaco, the World Cup championship was also lost to Boca Juniors and the side made a limp exit to Third Division Toledo in the King's Cup.

There then followed home and away defeats to Bayern Munich in the Champions League semifinal before del Bosque lifted his players again for the title run-in.

Del Bosque begrudgingly admitted to some less partisan Spanish reporters on Sunday morning that they could have lifted more silverware during the course of the season.

"It has been a year when there have been difficult moments, complicated, because it's being like part of a family," he said.

"Thankfully, the players have habitually demonstrated their professionalism. Whatever you say, winning this league title has added to the glory of this club."

At the heart of Real's improvement this season -- they have played much, much better than in last year's successful Champions League campaign -- has been the irrepressible Figo, their controversial 56 dollars million capture from Barcelona.

And it was fitting that he was once again the outstanding player in Saturday's 5-0 stroll past Alaves, the beaten UEFA Cup finalists.

While some criticism has been levelled at the Portuguese international's inability to dominate games in Europe the way he did last year for Barca, there is little doubt that he has been his new club's best player in the domestic game.

He ran the Alaves defence ragged on Saturday, skipping inside to thread balls through to Raul and Guti or heading straight for the byline to whip over crosses in the manner of David Beckham.

After Raul and Guti had set Real on their way in the first half, it was Figo who set up all three second-half goals for Fernando Hierro, Ivan Helguera and again Raul.

"With respect to Real Madrid, it was the individual qualities of Figo that did for us," said Alaves coach Mane. "He was the one who created almost all their chances."

Real have been so much better with Figo and unsung French midfielder Claude Makelele at the heart of the side that there will remain a nagging sensation that this year could have been even better.

But no-one was dwelling on what might have been after the Alaves victory, least of all del Bosque, who has now won Champions League and Spanish title honours in a year-and-a-half in charge.

"You can't say we failed in the Champions League," he insisted. "We played 16 out of 17 possible games, showing great form and giving the fans something to cheer about."

"We finished the last century as rulers of Europe and we start this one as rulers in Spain."

"Long may it continue."
