Uttara Telecom to launch pre-paid phone card soon

Uttara Telecom Ltd (UTL), an enterprise of Uttara Group of Industries, is going to launch pre-paid phone card service in the country shortly, says a press release.

The company recently got the licence to this effect from the government.

Finance Minister SAMS Kibria and Telecommunications Minister Mohammad Nasim handed over the licence to UTL Managing Director M A Motaleb at a function held recently at the Finance Ministry. Four more companies also received the licences for the purpose.

The company will invest about Taka 20 crore in this project. Three types of pre-paid cards worth Taka 100, Tk 200 and Tk 500 will be floated in the market.

The rate of each phone call using the pre-paid card will be equal to that of BTTB's call charge. The cards will be available at banks, post offices and retailers throughout the country.

SIA starts Online Flight Alert Service in Bangladesh

Singapore Airlines (SIA) has started its Online Flight Alert Service via SMS (short message service) mobile phone and message pagers to include passengers in Bangladesh with a local mobile phone subscription, says a press release.

Passengers in Bangladesh, with an existing subscription to any normal SMS service, can now opt to be alerted with any specific flight arrival and departure times.

Previously, this service was only available to phone subscribers based in Singapore.

Now all passengers in Bangladesh and around the world with subscriptions to any major mobile telecommunication companies would be able to use the service, said the statement.

Passengers who wish to avail this service can sign up on website www.singaporeair.com; via WAP at wap.singaporeair.com; the SIA AvantGo channel or the SIA Palm PQA channel.

GM offers to buy Daewoo Motor today

General Motors Corp will make an official proposal Wednesday to buy bankrupt Daewoo Motor, a senior official of South Korea's ruling party said yesterday.

"GM will present a proposal tomorrow to take over Daewoo Motor, and the talks to sell Daewoo Motor will continue for four days," Kang Won-Tae, top policy coordinator of the ruling Millennium Democratic Party said.

The talks will take place in an unspecified foreign country, Kang told a meeting of key party officials, quoted by a party spokesman.

Yonhap news agency said the talks would start June 4, and include representatives from GM, the South Korean government and Daewoo Motor creditor banks.

A spokesman of Korea Development Bank, the main creditor for the bankrupt car firm, confirmed the arrival in Seoul of a GM delegation but added creditor banks did not know when the talks would start.

GM formed a consortium with Fiat of Italy to take over Daewoo Motor after Ford Motor Co. abruptly pulled out of a deal worth 6.9 billion dollars last September.

BRAC, PKSF sign Tk 60cr loan deal

An agreement on Tk 60 crore loan was signed between Polli Karma Shishayak Foundation (PKSF) and BRAC on Sunday for BRAC's poverty alleviation programme, says a press release.

As first installment, BRAC received Tk 20 crore on that day.

Managing Director of the PKSF Dr Salehuddin Ahmed and the Deputy Executive Director of BRAC Aminul Alam signed the agreement at the PKSF head office in Dhaka.

BRAC also received Tk 60 crore from PKSF on the same day for its Participatory Livestock Development Programme under development.

BRAC has so far received Tk 212 crore soft loans from PKSF since 1996 for expanding its micro-credit programme for poverty alleviation.

Govt keen to reform labour laws to encourage investment

He said the present democratic government has already taken steps to finalise new Labour Laws to replace the old ones, which will eventually bring conducive environment to business. The government is determined to accelerate the economic growth of the country and to this end a series of reforms have been taking place to meet the requirements of the private sector for optimizing its efforts for enhancing contribution in the economy of the country.

DCCI acting president

Mahbub-uz-Zaman informed the gathering that the Dhaka Chamber of Commerce and Industry under the DCCI-CIPE ERRA Project has prepared 14 economic policy papers on different business sectors

to formulate recommendations and to lobby with the government organisations for policy reforms.

He also underscored the need for the government and the private sector institutions to work closely in an enabling environment to achieve faster growth of the national economy.

Mosharrif Hossain MP said the existing Labour Laws need necessary amendments and reforms. He said there should be a link between wages and productivity.

Regretting the issue of depriving the workers of provident fund and service benefits, Mosharrif recommended a single bargaining labour association for one industry.

Shahjahan Khan MP said Bangladesh workers are not given due benefits from the company.

Moazzam Hossain, Editor of the Financial Express, commented that wages are very low in Bangladesh.

He urged the government to enforce the existing laws first before going ahead for further new laws on labour.

Among others, past presidents of DCCI R Maksud Khan and M H Rahman, and Prof Syed Masuda Ali, Director, FBCCI, spoke on the occasion.

The purpose of the group meeting was to strengthen business advocacy efforts in Bangladesh and to help legislators and government officials formulate policies, laws and regulations to promote a more open economic environment in Bangladesh.

Bangladesh hopes to join middle-income group by 2021

Finance Minister Shah A M S Kibria yesterday said Bangladesh would be able to upgrade itself to the middle income group by 2021 for which upgradation of its human resource is a must.

The finance minister was speaking as the chief guest at the launching ceremony of Deltisoft Limited, an IT education institute, a city hotel yesterday. State Minister for Foreign Affairs Abul Hasan Chowdhury urged the private banks to help the IT sector.

Prof Jamilur Reza Chowdhury, who is also the Vice Chancellor of BRAC University, observed that the absence of adequate infrastructure facilities have been

hampering the IT growth in Bangladesh.

He emphasised exploring alternative technologies like access to the internet without telephone connection.

He identified absence of adequate skilled human resources as the major barrier to software export. He also stressed the need of community access facilities like cyber cafes in Bangladesh.

While delivering the welcome speech, Azam J Chowdhury, Chairman of Deltisoft Ltd, said the newly launched company is going to focus on three things -- IT education, software development, and ISP service.

Toyota recalls 31,115 cars for emission-control defects

Toyota Motor Corp recalled on Tuesday 31,115 vehicles, all sold in Japan, for defects in an exhaust-control device that could cause gas emissions to exceed standards.

Recalled were 30,307 Harrier sport utility vehicles, a model sold as the Lexus RX300 in the United States, and 808 Windom sedans, called the Lexus ES300 in the United States, manufactured from December 1997 to December 1998.

There were no reported accidents related to the recall, but six cases of emission levels exceeding standards were reported. Toyota spokesman Shigeru Hayakawa Md Zubaid, and other officials of BTI at the launching ceremony.

Allow micro-financing instts in remittance collection

Workshop on migrant workers says

Non-resident Bangladeshis (NRBs) use illegal *hundi* system to remit money home mainly due to poor quality banking and postal services, a workshop was told yesterday.

The official channel has failed to check *hundi* business and micro-financing institutions (MFIs) may be allowed to receive remittance to improve the situation, it was recommended.

The two-day workshop on 'Migrant Worker Remittances and Micro-Finance in Bangladesh' organised by the International Labour Office (ILO) in Dhaka began at Sonargaon Hotel in the city yesterday.

Judith Van Doorn, Social Finance Programme of ILO - Geneva, AMM Reza-e-Rabbi, Joint Secretary of Labour and Employment Ministry, Shengji Li, Officer-in-Charge of ILO Area Office in Dhaka, Kazi Saifuddin Ahmed, Labour Advisor of Bangladesh Employers Federation (BEF), and Mahtab Uddin, Deputy General Manager of BASIK Bank, took part

in the discussion of the workshop.

Tasneem Siddiqui of Dhaka University while presenting a study said the senior management of two of the largest micro-finance institutions (MFIs) -- Grameen Bank and BRAC -- expressed that the organisations have potentials of receiving remittance by developing correspondence relationships with banks and exchange houses abroad.

She said once remittance is transferred to Bangladesh, the MFIs can distribute it through their wide network at the grassroots level.

Around 46 per cent of the remittance are channelled through official sources, around 40 per cent through *hundi*, 4.61 per cent through friends and relatives, and about eight per cent is hand carried by migrant workers themselves.

Tasneem said while it takes 12-83 days to receive remittance through the formal channel, the same can be received in three days through *hundi* channel.

Shengji Li, Officer-in-Charge

of ILO Area Office in Dhaka, said remittance is one of the major sources of family income. He said the families covered under the study receive an average of Tk 72,800 per annum, making up of 51.12 per cent of total family income.

Remittance constitutes almost one quarter of foreign exchange earnings, Li said, adding that it has a strong impact on the GDP, consumption and investment.

Kazi Saifuddin Ahmed, Labour Advisor of the Bangladesh Employers Federation, said for Bangladesh, both migrant workers and micro-finance institutions have been playing a crucial role in development.

In the 1999-2000 financial year, remittances totalled US\$1.92 billion, 4.1 per cent of the GDP, he added and suggested that the micro-financing institutions may be involved in transferring remittances.

Mahtab Uddin said MFIs should come forward to improve the quality of services in transferring remittances.

He also mentioned NIIT centre at Narayanganj is in line with his long-term ambition to bring the international quality education facility even in the remote areas.


BIA course on life insurance begins in Rajshahi today
