





Message

A Glimpse into the Future: IUB Campus at Bashundhara

Independent University, Bangladesh (IUB) was established as an institution of higher learning in January 1993 with the goal to produce globally competitive graduates within the local environment. The University started with only six students in rented facilities in Baridhara, Dhaka and today can boast over 2000 students and about 225 faculty and staff. It comprises of 5 schools including the MBA programme and a number of administrative offices spread over different buildings. It is also the only private university to hold consecutive convocations since the first batch of students graduated in 1997.

The University envisioned a self-contained facility on a 21-acre site at Kaliakoir, on the out skirts of Dhaka. However, the distance and lack of supportive infrastructure prompted a change in plans and under the revised proposal the land at Kaliakoir will support off campus programmes of training, field research and extension work. To meet the growing needs of the students and the community IUB acquired 8 bighas of land at Bashundhara in 1999 and aspired to build a modern and functional urban campus, which would also intellectually stimulate students to strive for a higher goal. The architectural design has been finalised and the sentimental and educational needs of the students and the community alike have been emphasised.



The proposed campus will spread over 411,000 sq.ft with a ten-storied Academic building with 6 lifts and two basement parking lots with a capacity of approximately 350 cars. A state of the art IT centre of 15,000 sq.ft, a resource library with audio visual equipment of 20,000 sq.ft and science laboratories which will give students first hand opportunities in applied technology and research have also been provided for. The campus has been planned for central air-conditioning with more than 50 classrooms, 4 galleries and an auditorium that can seat about 750 people. It will be a self-contained facility with its own sub- station, water supply, state of the art security and fire extinguishing equipment. A Court of Knowledge connects the Academic and Administrative Buildings to promote a healthy educational atmosphere and encourage the students to mingle. A number of cafeterias, coffee shops, a gymnasium, medical clinic and bookstore are also planned to meet the recreational and daily needs of the students. A unique feature of this building is that the classrooms are serviced with split-level corridors and are handicapped accessible.

For IUB the students are its biggest assets and the continuing goal of the University is to prepare promising students for outstanding scholarly and professional achievement—by educating them in the technical skills of a discipline and in the moral values of intellectual life. This is reflected in the opinion of the students seeking admission and in a recent survey conducted by the University on freshmen students more than 42% said they chose IUB because of the "good education system" and around 41% said "one of the best private universities".

IUB's Planning and Development Department is responsible for the planning and construction of the campus and it has already taken concrete steps towards implementation and successful completion of the IUB campus at Bashundhara. When completed it hopes to be the first private university to have its own campus building in Dhaka city.

International Business. I was a part of the first batch to have graduated from IUB's MBA programme in collaboration with MSM, the Netherlands.


