# Violent protests in Kathmandu

## 2 killed: Curfew imposed: Dipendra dead, Gyanendra new king

At least two people died in violent protests that swept the Nepalese capital yesterday, as demonstrators denounced the new monarch, King Gyanendra, and demanded an explanation for last week's massacre of

almost the entire royal family. One protestor was killed when police opened fire on a group who broke a curfew in the city, police sources said. Another was reported to have died before the curfew began when police armed with batons charged protesters. The curfew was ordered after tens of thousands of demonstrators took to

the streets to protest against Gyanendra being crowned king following the

death of his nephew, the former crown prince Dipendra. Police were given

orders to shoot violators who resisted arrest. Dipendra died on Monday, two days after allegedly killing his parents -King Birendra and Queen Aishwarya - and several other relatives and shoot-

The king is dead, long live the king," state radio said in announcing the death of the 29-year-old Dipendra, who had been on life support in hospital since Friday night's massacre at the royal palace here.

The late king Birendra's 53-year-old younger brother, Gyanendra, was crowned at the old palace here just hours after his nephew's death. Unlike the late king Birendra, who was revered by the population,

Gyanendra is not a popular figure and is suspected of favouring a return to the pre-1990 system of absolute monarchic rule in Nepal

The authorities announced the curfew as public anger, which has been swelling since the massacre, boiled over into violence.

The home inistry directive, broadcast on state radio and television, said the curfew also covered the neighbouring towns of Lalitpur and Bhaktapur. Anyone found on the streets would receive a police warning to stop before the police opened fire, the ministry said. Those arrested for violating the curfew would face a month in prison. The curfew will initially last until

5:00am today. The order meant people were not allowed to attend the state funeral of Dipendra, who was named king on Saturday despite the allegations he carried out Friday's massacre

Dipendra was cremated late Monday on the bank of the holy river Bagpati. after a funeral procession, which began at 4:00pm, with only senior

The bomb that went off at the Catholic Church in Baniarchar village under Muksudpur thana in Gopalganj Sunday morning was a 'powerful device' made in 'Chile', thoroughly 'improvised with deadly shrapnel' and planted as per a 'well chalked out plan', army bomb experts from Jessore Cantonment

They noted that planting of the device inside the church was not an easy task, particularly in a remote village like Baniarchar, without 'close liaison with some highly experienced people and links with at least one or more

"The bomb was similar to the Chilean-made live bomb recovered from the DC's office at Jessore three months ago," one of the bomb experts said while collecting evidences of the explosion on Sunday night.

It is suspected that the original bomb was wrapped with additional explosives, metal splinters and glasses to "give it maximum impact on explosion',

He also said that the bomb looked just like a pineapple and that such

## **AL** set to pass undemocratic law abusing power: BNP

BNP has strongly criticised the proposed law concerning special security and privileges for Sheikh Hasina and her family members as undemocratic, saying it will result in abuse of power ahead of the general election

Addressing a press conference at 29 Minto Road yesterday afternoon, Deputy Leader of the Opposition Prof AQM Badrudozza Chowdhury said the proposed law totally contradicts the spirit of the caretaker government by providing equal status to the former prime minister and chief advisor of the caretaker government.

He said the law would affect the neutrality and fairness of the ensuing general election, introducing a sort of a dual rule during the pre-election period as the ex-PM will have similar authority, status and image as the head of caretaker government.

## Move to shut 6 Shishu Academy branches

## Recommendations of two ministries ignored

The government is planning to close down six branches of the Shishu Academy at six thanas despite recommendations of the ministries of women and children's affairs and planning for their continuation and placement under the revenue budget, according to sources at the

The six branches, set up in fiscal 1996-97 to expand activities of the Academy, are at Parshuram thana in Chittagong division, Babuganj under Barisal, Kulaura under Sylhet,

Sreenagar under Dhaka, Keshabpur under Khulna and Mithapukur thana in Raishahi divi-

These were set up under a 6-year (1995-2001) 25.39 crore taka expansion project. The project is facing closure as there has been no allocation for it in the proposed Annual Development Programme (ADP) for the 2001-2002 financial year.

The annual budget for fiscal 2001-2002 will be placed in the Jatiya Sangsad on June 7. An inter-ministerial meeting held at the

Ministry of Establishment on May 27 endorsed closure of the six branches despite strong pro-

test by officials of the Academy and the Ministry of Women and Children Affairs, officials at the Academy told this correspondent.

The meeting also approved abolition of 18 posts of officials and employees at the six thana offices, six posts at the Academy headquarters in Dhaka and 44 posts of night guards at district offices. The Academy has also been asked to hand over its only minibus now being used for children's study tour, they said.

The officials said the decisions came at a time when the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Ministry of Women and Children Affairs recom
