

No solution to Kashmir dispute without plebiscite: Pak envoy

A stable solution to the vexed Kashmir dispute with India could not be found without a plebiscite in the region, Pakistan's envoy to India reiterated Monday.

"We believe that, ultimately, issues concerning the people must be resolved in accordance with the wishes of the people," the Pakistan high commissioner to India, Qazi Ashraf Jehangir, said at a seminar in New Delhi.

"Otherwise, the solution will not be a stable one, as we have seen for the past 50 years."

Jehangir was repeating Paki-

stan's position to adopt a long-standing United Nations resolution seeking a plebiscite in the dialogue.

Hailing Vaipavee's decision to invite Musharraf as a "good opportunity," Jehangir said the summit should not be approached with cynicism.

"We know that our views are mutually exclusive on most issues but don't push your scepticism to cynicism. It doesn't lead to anywhere," Jehangir said.

"Despite all the obstacles, we will be able to make some progress. There is no scope for cynicism, which is a barren attitude."

Analysts on both sides of the border have approached the proposed summit with guarded optimism, saying the risk of the talks derailing is very high.

Taliban launch fresh attacks

The Taliban launched fresh attacks against opposition forces in northeastern Afghanistan Monday, using heavy weapons including tanks and artillery, resistance sources said.

The Islamic militia again drove towards opposition lines around Chal district in Takhar province, which was left evenly divided between the warring parties at the end of last summer's fighting, they said.

A spokesman for opposition commander Ahmad Shah Masoud said Taliban soldiers struck in the early hours of the morning, backed by heavy artillery, rockets and tanks.

"The Taliban launched a three-pronged attack on our defensive strongholds in Chal district early in the morning at 4:00 am (2300 GMT Sunday), but couldn't advance," spokesman Mohammad Habi said.

A few hilltop posts had changed hands several times in the course of the battle, which was still raging, he told AFP by satellite phone.

The Pakistan-based Afghan Islamic Press said some 300 Taliban soldiers were involved in the attack.

Megawati stands by sacked police chief against Wahid

In a further display of discord, Indonesian Vice President Megawati Sukarnoputri on Monday stood by the national police chief who is resisting his sacking by embattled President Abdurrahman Wahid.

An official with Megawati's Indonesian Democratic Party of Struggle dismissed Wahid's allegation that General Suryo Bimantoro had shown discord between the president and his estranged deputy.

Wahid is to face a special session of the national assembly on August 1, during which he must account for his rule so far. A rejection of the account by lawmakers would spell the dramatic end of Wahid's term as Indonesia's first democratically elected president.

There has been speculation that Wahid tried to remove Bimantoro for failing to support his plan to impose a state of emergency, which would allow him to dissolve parliament before it can impeach him.

In his reshuffle, Wahid also dismissed top security minister Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono and Attorney General Marzuki Darusman, who had also resisted any declaration of a state of emergency.

Wahid, who is battling impeachment moves by parliament, on Friday sacked five cabinet members and "non-activated" Bimantoro, relieving him of his duties.

But the police chief has refused to resign, and his defiant stance has won the public support of more than 100 fellow police generals.

Child mortality jumps amid worst drought in Afghanistan

Child mortality rates have reached alarming levels in northern Afghanistan where a three-year drought has pushed many to the brink of famine, a relief group said yesterday.

People were at risk of starvation and were running out of ways to survive, a report released by the US-based Save the Children organisation said after a survey in the Kohistan district of Faryab province.

"People are running out of survival strategies," Save the Children field office director Andrew Wilder said.

The ongoing drought has decimated the local economy, severely weakened the health and nutritional status and forced increasing numbers to join the huge numbers of Afghans displaced by conflict and now drought."

The assessment conducted in

April revealed that the "mortality rate had reached alarming levels in the four former months, with the crude mortality rate 2.6 per 10,000 a day and the under-five mortality rate 5.9 per 10,000 a day."

Acute respiratory infections, measles and diarrhoea were the common causes of deaths, it said. Half of the reported deaths during the survey period were of children under five.

"Nutrition is a serious problem, with acute malnutrition highest among children under 30 months."

Due to non-availability of fruit and vegetables and even wild food, residents in a number of villages are afflicted by scurvy, or vitamin C deficiency, it said.

Most families in the remote mountain district of Kohistan had used their supplies of grain and sold most of their livestock.

FAO warns of malnutrition among urban poor

The urban poor in most developing countries face an increasing threat of malnutrition and health risks linked to unsafe food, the UN Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) warned yesterday.

Improving urban food security is essential for attaining a safer and more stable social climate in developing countries," the agency said in a statement.

"Feeding cities means that more food needs to be produced, moved to cities and distributed within the expanding urban areas," it said.

"This in turn means more lorries, greater market congestion, higher piles of garbage, greater risks of food contamination and greater soil, water and air pollution," it added.

FAO official Olivio Argenti said that many cities were rapidly losing urban and suburban land suitable for food production and had insufficient and inefficient transport, markets and slaughter-houses.

"Urban planners and managers

rarely take these issues into consideration," he said. "Governments, mayors, urban planners and the private sector need to pay more attention to the problems of increasing food insecurity and malnutrition in cities."

FAO is to hold a seminar on "Food for the Cities: Urbanisation, Food Insecurity and Urban Management" jointly with the UN Centre for Human Settlements (Habitat) in New York Wednesday.

The food agency said that food insecurity was becoming an extremely pressing social and political issue as the number of unemployed people, poor women, the elderly and children was growing fast.

"These people do not have their own homes, live in areas at risk where access to safe food becomes more and more difficult and costly," Argenti said.

Around 50 percent of the urban population in Africa live in poverty and in Latin America around 40 percent of all urban households are poor.

The population living below the poverty level in Sao Paulo, Brazil, is estimated to be between

60 and 70 percent of the total population.

In Calcutta, India, the proportion of urban poor is around 70 percent, and 45 percent in Karachi, Pakistan.

"Feeding the cities means estimating how much food will be consumed by people in the cities tomorrow and making it easier for food products to arrive in the city and be distributed where poor households live, at the lowest possible cost and in hygienic conditions," Argenti said.

"It also means improving the access of poor households to food."

In particular, FAO voiced concern over the alarming state of food wholesale and retail markets in many developing countries.

They are poorly maintained and managed and are often too old and too small to meet the food needs of the growing population."

In many cities, markets are chaotic, congested and unhygienic. They are rarely well equipped with water, electricity or drainage.
