When Finance Minister Shah A M S Kibria walks into the Sangsad Bhaban today to place his sixth and the incumbent government's last budget in the parliament, he will have a lot of figures to serenade with. Low inflation now less than two per cent will surely top the list. Export boom, industrial recovery, revenue upturn and crop-sector

growth will follow. But in the shadows of such successes lurk some unpleasant facts. The state of the economy, underpinned by a fragile macro balance both on internal and external sides, in fact, provides him thin ice to walk on.

The ice will look more slippery if one travels five years back and checks what the finance minister said in his first budget speech in 1996. "We will determine our strategies for development taking into

account our supreme goal of poverty alleviation. The present government is determined to transform the poor and unemployed into dignified and self-reliant manpower." he had said. The goals remain illusive five

years down the line. With 4.5 million new faces queuing up for and only about a million of them getting job every year, the finance minister's maiden budget sounds more like a satire

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No headway in probe into bomb blasts in last 2 yrs

The law-enforcing agencies have failed to unveil the cause of a series of bomb explosions in the country in last two years that left 48 people killed and more than 200 others injured.

The bomb blast at a cultural programme of Udichi Shilpa Gosthi on Jessore Town Hall pre-

eople killed and more than 100 others injured on March 6, 1999. Police submitted the charge sheet nine months after the incident.

Seven people were killed and ten others injured when a "grenade" went off inside Ahmadiya (Kadiani) Mosque in Khulna on October 8, 1999. In the following year, four people were killed in a bomb blast at a Darbar Sharif at

Seven more people were slain and over 50 others were injured in twin bomb explosions at Paltan Maidan and Bangabandhu Avenue in the city on January 20, 2001.

And on April 14, 2001, a powerful explosion during the Chhayanaut's traditional Bengali New Year function at Ramna Batamul left 10 people killed and more than 20 others injured.
