Larma vows to 'resist' polls in CHT

President of Parbattya Chattagram Jano Sanghati Samity (PCJSS) and Chairman of CHT Regional Council Jyotirindriyo Bodhipriyo Larma (Santu Larma) has vowed to resist the coming general election in the three hill districts and said the caretaker government is "imposing" the election on the hill people.

"We have to resist the election because the caretaker government, violating the peace agreement, has taken the decision to hold election with an illegal voter list. The hill people will never accept this voter list," Santu Larma said while addressing a gathering at Rangamati Stadium.

Rupayan Dewan, International Relation Secretary of PCJSS, chaired the rally. Gano Forum leader Pankaj Bhattacharya, Ajoy Roy, PCJSS Law Affairs Secretary Saktiman Chakma

EC warns Hasina, 16 others for violating code

The Election Commission yesterday warned 17 more candidates including Awami League Chief Sheikh Hasina for violation of the election code of conduct.

The EC served warning notices to these candidates following confirmation by District Electoral Enquiry Committees regarding their violation of the election code during campaigning.

The commission earlier served such notices to some 67 other candidates including BNP Chairperson and Chief of the BNP-led four party alliance Khaleida Zia for misconduct as regards electioneering.

The existing rules provide for a maximum fine of Tk 20,000 as punishment for violation of the code of conduct. None of the violators has received any punishment so far.

The candidates served with the notices are as follows:

Awami League: Sheikh Hasina (Narail-2), Mahbubul Alam (Bogra-6), Mohammad Nasim (Sirajganj-3),

Campaigning rife with violation of election rules

EU-EOMB report

UNB, Dhaka

The European Union Election Observation Mission in Bangladesh (EU-EOMB) is concerned by politically motivated violent incidents and their effect on overall atmosphere of the electoral campaign.

"It notices that the political parties also bear a significant responsibility in spreading election-related violence," says a report on the first findings of the EU-EOMB released here yesterday.

The EU-EOMB has deployed 31 long-term observers (LTOs) in 14 regional offices since August 30. They have visited 63 districts and will be joined by 30 short-term observers (STOs) today and remain in Bangladesh until after the election day.

The release of the EU-EOMB said it is preoccupied by the practice of smear campaigning, the usage of inflammatory language and brutal electoral campaigning material.

USS Kitty Hawk sails out of base

Led by a tugboat and paced by Japanese escort vessels, the aircraft carrier USS Kitty Hawk sailed out of its base near Tokyo yesterday along as US naval forces in Japan continued to redeploy ahead of an expected campaign of retaliation against terrorists.

It was a departure without fanfare for the 40-year-old carrier, which left Yokosuka Naval Base under overcast skies shortly after 7:00 am Friday morning local time for an undisclosed destination.

India may halt talks with Pakistan

India's prime minister said he was halting dialogue with Pakistan, accusing the president of the neighbouring country of promoting terrorism, according to an interview published yesterday.

"How can he be concerned about terrorism? He has promoted it," Atal Behari Vajpayee said of Gen Pervez Musharraf in an interview published in The Times of India.

Officials in the foreign ministry and the prime minister's office, including the prime minister's spokesman, Ashok Tandon, said he could not immediately confirm the quotes, carried in a major Indian

newspaper.

Vajpayee reacted strongly to Musharraf's speech on Wednesday accusing India of offering to help the United States fight terrorism to profit from the international crisis and get Pakistan declared a terrorist state.

Vajpayee said he was halting the dialogue process with Pakistan, the Times said.

Neither he nor Foreign Minister Jaswant Singh will honour invitations to visit Pakistan in the foreseeable future, the newspaper quoted Vajpayee as saying. He said Musharraf's remarks were "a serious setback to the India-Pakistan dia

Afghanistan's ruling Taliban yesterday rejected an ultimatum from President Bush to surrender Osama bin Laden and said a US military strike on the country would be a "showdown of might". "We are not ready to hand over Osama bin Laden without evidence," Kabul's ambassador to Pakistan, Mullah Abdul Salaam Zaeef, said in Islamabad.

He said the government was not bound by an edict from leading Afghan clerics on Thursday declaring bin Laden should be persuaded to leave the country "whenever possible."

Girding his nation for a long "war on terrorism" after last week's hijacked airliner attacks on America, Bush earlier warned the Taliban to turn over the Saudi-born Islamic militant and his

Arabs won't join coalition if Israel is there

Arabs will not play a role in any campaign of retaliation for last week's attacks on the United States should Israel take part in such an effort, Arab League Secretary-General Amr Moussa said.

"It is not possible that Arab states join a regional or an international effort joined by Israel, because Israel is slaughtering (Palestinian) people," he told al-Jazeera satellite television in interview broadcast early on Friday.

Several Arab states have expressed backing for the United States in its call for an international

High-rises on Panthapath raise fears of urban nightmare

Panthapath, one of the major roads in the city, will become an urban nightmare, once construction of several high-rise commercial buildings there is complete, fear experts.

Total number of floors, currently under construction, along the 1.5-kilometre stretch from the Russell Square up to the intersection near Sonargaon Hotel is 250.

Most of the tall buildings along the road, which is less than 100 feet wide, do not have proper parking facilities. Even if they did, it would not have made much difference.

"The sheer number of commercial buildings and the traffic circulation they are expected to generate on the narrow stretch of driveway would choke the entire area," said Ashikur Rahman, a traffic engineer

of the Dhaka City Corporation (DCC).

Rahman blamed the Rajuk for indiscriminately allowing commercial structures on busy intersections all over the city in total disregard for traffic engineering.

"These tall commercial buildings lack adequate parking facilities. The approaches, inlets and outlets of the buildings are faulty and bound to give rise to various problems including traffic circulation," he said.

An architect of the Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (BUET) agreed to Rahman's views. "Just off the Panthapath, there are such crowded residential areas as Rajabazar, Kathal Bagan and Tejgurbazar. Several hundreds of thousands of people in these areas will face more load shedding, scar-

city of water and traffic problems when commercial activities begin at these high-rise buildings."

What's worse, expansion work of dozens of old buildings along the road, which do not have any parking facility in complete violation of construction rules, is underway. There are already over a hundred so-called shopping centres on the Panthapath without parking facilities.

Samorita Hospital, one of the largest private hospitals in the city with more than 400 beds, does not have adequate parking facility as well. There is a car park in the basement that only accommodates less than half a dozen vehicles.

5 killed, 100 hurt as trains collide in Sreepur

At least five people were killed and 100 others injured when a passenger train collided with a cargo train at Izzatpur Railway Station in Sreepur upazila yesterday afternoon.

Joydevpur Railway Station sources said the Dhaka-bound Balaka Express from Bahadurabad ghat rammed the cargo-train at the station at about 5.30 pm.

Two bogies and engine of the passenger train and four wagons and engine of the freight train went off the tracks, killing five people on the spot and injuring around 100, said a passenger of the train, Haider Ali.

The identity of the victims could not be known till writing of this

Hasina urges business community

Immediate past prime minister and Awami League (AL) chief Sheikh Hasina yesterday urged the business community to give her party another chance to make the country a model of development, based on the foundation laid by her government in the last five years.
