

**JS elections  
55,000 troops  
leave barracks  
today in aid of  
civil admin**

UNB, Dhaka

More than 55,000 members of the armed forces leave their barracks today in aid of the civil administration to maintain law and order across the country for peaceful holding of national elections.

Contingents of the armed forces have already been deployed since last week in some trouble-torn districts like Feni, Bhola, Laxmipur, Narayanganj and Munshiganj.

Army Chief Lieutenant General Harunur Rashid said their main task is to work in aid of the civil administration and extend ground support through their presence.

For the first time, armed forces on election duty have been defined as law-enforcing agencies vesting in them the power to make arrests on the polling day. They can arrest any miscreant from the spot on the day.

General Harun assured that the elite troops would take all necessary steps to clear any obstacles to holding a peaceful election.

"Anyone trying to intimidate the voters or obstruct the polling process would be resisted by officers and soldiers," said the army chief in an observation on their special assignment.

**Kuwaiti emir  
suffers brain  
haemorrhage**

The emir of Kuwait has suffered a brain haemorrhage and will be flown to London for treatment, Kuwaiti television said yesterday.

The ailing emir, Sheikh Jaber Al Ahmed Al Sabah, will be out of the country at a time when the United States is looking to one of its closest allies in the Gulf to help build a coalition against terrorism.

The emir, reported in stable condition Friday, had offered strong words of support to the United States after the Sept. 11 attacks on New York and Washington, but in Kuwait and throughout the region there is wariness about a US-led campaign likely to target Muslim and Arab extremists who have been lauded on the streets and in the coffee shops of the Mideast.

State-run Kuwaiti television, quoting a statement from the 75-year-old emir's office, said a plane would fly him to London within hours. Sheikh Jaber was not known to have any serious illnesses. He has ruled the small, oil-rich state since Dec. 31, 1977.

The government appeared to take the news calmly. There was no deployment of security forces on the streets of Kuwait City, and only a few police cars outside Al-Amiri Hospital, where the emir was being treated.

Brain haemorrhages are often caused by strokes, which can effects ranging from mild to devastating.

**Businessman  
gunned down  
in Kushtia**

A businessman was shot dead by unidentified assailants at village Baradi in sadar upazila at midnight on Thursday.

The victim was identified as Ratan Chakraborty, 35, son of Tripura Chakraborty.

Police said a gang of 15 entered Ratan's house and demanded Tk 50,000 as toll. As Ratan refused to oblige, one of the gang members shot him point blank. Ratan died on the spot.

Police recovered the body yesterday morning and sent it to sadar hospital for autopsy.

Businessman in the town held a protest rally yesterday and demanded immediate arrest of the killers.

A case was filed with sadar thana in this connection.

**Don't be misled by  
AL's false promises,  
Khaleda tells rally**

BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia has called upon the people to vote for BNP and four-party alliance candidates and not to be misled again by Awami League's "false promises".

The alliance has been formed not out of greed for power, but to free the country from AL's misrule and corruption" and to protect its sovereignty and ensure peace and security of life and property of people, she said.

She was addressing a series of election meetings in different constituencies in Joypurhat and Naogaon districts yesterday, the second day of her three-day tour of northern districts.

"Time has come to give a befitting reply to their corruption and acts of terrorism through ballot in the October 1 parliamentary election", the former prime minister said.

"You have seen how Awami League ministers and their sons and relatives killed people. Even women were not safe from their hands.

That's why I believe people will not cast vote for Awami League again to return to the dark chapter," she said.

She addressed four mammoth public meetings on the premises of Joypurhat Circuit House, Mofizuddin Degree College and Badalgachhi High School and at Naogaon town.

Khaleda was greeted by thousands of jubilant party supporters everywhere. At every meeting, thousands of people waited for hours defying the scorching heat to listen to her.

She said the October 1 election is crucial because sovereignty, peace and development of the country depend on it. "You have to take the right decision. There is no alternative to sheaf of paddy (BNP's election symbol)."

The BNP chief said 'sheaf of paddy' is the symbol of farmers, service holders and the masses because it signifies peace and prosperity.

On Thursday night, the BNP chairperson addressed half a dozen rallies at Fulbari, Birampur, Hilly and Panchbibi.

At Fulbari, addressing a crowd that was waiting for more than five hours, Khaleda alleged that the AL government did not give due prices

**Speculations  
over Laden's  
whereabouts**

Speculation mounted yesterday that Osama bin Laden may already have left Afghanistan if so, the breadth of his global terrorist network offers numerous safe havens.

A Pakistani daily, The News, reported that the Saudi-born militant had left the country on Monday, ahead of a meeting of Afghan Islamic clerics to discuss US demands for his extradition.

The meeting ended on Thursday with the adoption of an edict asking Afghanistan's Taliban rulers to persuade bin Laden, chief suspect in last week's attacks on New York and Washington to leave the country voluntarily.

The News said former interior minister Naseerullah Babar had also claimed that bin Laden had left four days ago.

Speculation about bin Laden's whereabouts has been rife since

**2 killed, over 60 hurt

At least two persons were killed and over 60 injured in pre-election clashes involving activists of rival political parties in different parts of the country yesterday and on Thursday night.

Rustom Ali was shot dead in a clash between AL and BNP activists at Maghbazar in the city on Thursday night.

Rupak Chakma was gunned down when gunmen opened fire on the activists of United People's Democratic Front (UPDF) at Madhumongal Hedmanpara village in Panchbari upazila of Khagrachari district yesterday.

**Jayalalitha resigns  
as SC invalidates  
her appointment**

The Chief Minister of the southern Indian state of Tamil Nadu, Jairam Jayalalitha, one of the most mercurial lady politicians of the country, yesterday resigned after the Supreme Court struck down her appointment to the post as "unconstitutional" for her conviction in a corruption case.

A five-member bench of the apex court unanimously ruled that her appointment as Chief Minister in May this year was not in accordance with the Constitution.

The bench said any one who has been convicted in a corruption case and sentenced to more than two years of imprisonment is not eligible to occupy the post of Chief Minister.

Jayalalitha, the chief of Tamil Nadu's ruling AIADMK party which won landslide victory in state assembly poll in April this year, could not contest in the assembly elections as her nomination papers were rejected by the Returning Officer because of her conviction in a corruption case.

Under Indian law, a person who is not a member of the legislature can become a minister but has to get elected within six months of becoming the minister. Jayalalitha had to get elected as a member of Tamil Nadu assembly
