

## AL-BNP clashes leave 50 killed in 19 days

More than 50 people have been killed and 3,000 others injured in clashes between the Awami League and the BNP over the last 19 days at more than 200 constituencies.

Ten candidates have also been attacked in this period, from the last day of withdrawal of candidature on September 6 till yesterday. Former AL ministers Tofail Ahmed, Abu Saeed, HN Ashikur Rahman and former BNP minister Colman (retd) Oli Ahmed are among those attacked.

Law and order continues to go out of the administration's control due to a gradual increase of political confrontations. With only five days left for the election, apprehension of violence is growing among the electorate and observers fear that it might affect voter turnout.

Incidence of murders, attacks on rallies and processions, and destruction of election camps have drastically increased over the last few days. The minority groups, especially the Hindu community, have also been targeted for harassment by a certain political quarter.

In each incident, huge illegal firearms have been used. It seems that intensified law enforcement activities and deployment of armed forces have had little impact on the terrorists and their patrons - the political parties.

At a meeting Monday, the council of advisors to caretaker government discussed law and order and later asked law-enforcing agencies to be on maximum alert.

Against such a grim backdrop, Abdul Mueeed Chowdhury, an advisor to the caretaker government, has nonetheless expressed optimism that the interim administration would hold the election in a peaceful environment.

"The situation did not improve immediately after deployment of army on September 22 as the forces were still being mobilised at different places. By today, however, they have taken their positions and we can expect the situation to improve from tomorrow."

Chowdhury said, "We are taking all possible measures to ensure a peaceful election."

These violent clashes are taking place between the AL and the BNP and the frequency of pre-election violence is much higher than that in the previous two Jatiya Sangsad elections.

The minority groups and tribal communities have become targets of repression and threats. Everyday there is one or two report in the newspapers on Hindu repression. Concerned by such atrocities, the AL has recently lodged complaints to

## Riyadh snaps ties with Taliban

Saudi Arabia said yesterday it had severed relations with the Taliban over their links to "terrorists" in a move that leaves Pakistan as the only country that now recognises Afghanistan's embattled rulers.

The kingdom made its announcement on the Saudi Press Agency just three days after the neighbouring United Arab Emirates, the only other state to have recognised the Taliban, cut ties to the hardline allies of Afghan-based dissident Osama bin Laden.

"Because the Taliban government did not pay attention to all the contacts and attempts made by the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia to persuade it to stop harbouring criminals and terrorists....the government of the Kingdom of Saudi

### AL complaint A certain group intimidating minority voters

The Awami League (AL) has alleged that a particular political group is intimidating the country's minority voters, known as its vote bank, into turning away from the October 1 election.

A six-member AL delegation lodged this complaint with the Election Commission (EC) at a meeting with Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) M A Syed at the latter's office yesterday.

"In this situation, the forthcoming election cannot be peaceful," delegation leader Mozaffar Ahmed Paltu told newsmen after the meeting.

The AL leader informed that the CEC assured them of immediate steps to ensure the franchise of the minorities.

The EC at the one-hour meeting decided to allow the candidates to give names of polling agents to respective presiding officers until

## Bagerhat blast: One more dies, 6 held, case against 166

A case has been filed accusing 166 persons including two four-party alliance candidates in Bagerhat-1 and 2 constituencies for their involvement in Sunday's bomb blast at Awami League's election meeting

at Bagerhat on Monday evening, police said.

Meanwhile, the death toll from the incident rose to nine yesterday as Romeza Kartoon, 45, succumbed to injuries at Khulna Medical College Hospital.

Romeza's husband Ismail, a day labourer at Kharpa village in Mollahat, alleged that his wife had gone to the election rally under pressure from local AL leaders.

Ziaul Islam Chowdhury, General Secretary of Mollahat upazila Awami League filed the case with Mollahat thana at about midnight Monday. He complained that the bomb was planted at the meeting venue -- KR

College ground -- to kill Sheikh Helal, AL candidate in the two constituencies.

The two alliance candidates named in the case are Bagerhat district BNP President AHM Selim who is contesting from Bagerhat-2 and Mollahat upazila president of the party Sheikh Mujibur Rahman in Bagerhat-1.


The accused also include sixty unidentified people and some local leaders of Jamaat-e-Islami and its student front Islami Chhatra Shibir.

The case was transferred to CID yesterday for investigation.

A home ministry team headed by Additional Secretary Rafique Bhuiyan and a CID team led by DIG (Headquarters) K N Chanda reached Mollahat on Monday to probe the incident. Army explosive experts are examining bomb splinters collected from the spot.

One of the army explosive experts said the powerful bomb was made of cast iron and it weighed not less than seven kilograms. It

War or Nobel  
Peace Prize, a  
choice for Bush

US President George W Bush should be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize if he manages to respond to the terrorist attacks on the United States without starting a war, 12 Norwegian academics, who nominated Bush, said yesterday.

"We hope that this will serve as a preventive alert, a change of tone from the simplistic talk of revenge and retaliation," Inge Nilsen, head of studies at Lofoten Islands University, told AFP.

## AL rebels still defiant, may escape harsh decision

The Awami League rebels are still defiant about contesting the October 1 parliamentary polls beyond party approvals.

None of the 26 rebels, whom party President Sheikh Hasina asked for the last time to withdraw from the race against party nominees three days back, responded positively till last night, the AL sources said.

With just four days to the election, the AL leadership is now trying to avoid taking the harsh decision of expelling the rebels.

An AL central committee leader told The Daily Star last night, "We are still hopeful that they (rebels) would eventually not run against the party candidates."

The rebels, campaigning in favour of their independent candidature till yesterday, had earlier twice

turned down requests from the party hierarchy urging them to stay off the race. Irritated by their continued defiance, the party chief issued the final letters on them last Saturday, sources said.

This is not the first time that the AL is facing such a delicate problem though; however, the party has so far showed much more restraint in terms of taking actions against the rebels compared what other major parties have done in such cases. Only last week, the BNP expelled half a dozen rebels from the party on charge of contesting the polls against the party nominees in different constituencies.

The AL central committee leader acknowledged that the party leadership had been under tremendous pressure from the different district units that had taken firm stands against the rebel.

## Bldg collapse kills 7 at Comilla BNP rally

At least seven teenage boys were electrocuted and more than 50 injured when a tin-shed building of Ershad Degree College collapsed under the weight of enthusiastic supporters of BNP attending a public meeting at Burichong yesterday afternoon.

The accident took place at 4 pm, about an hour before BNP chairperson Khaleda Zia reached the venue.

Witnesses said seven young boys died on the spot as they came in touch with live electric wire snapped after the collapse of the tin-shed building.

The boys were rushed to Burichong health complex where doctors declared them dead.

The dead were identified as Mamoon, 14, Joynal, 16, Majidul Islam, 18, Nazmul, 16, Monir Hossain, 15, Iqbal, 15, and Mazharul, 16.

Of the injured, four were admitted to Comilla Medical College Hospital and 32 to Burichong Health Complex. Condition of the seven were stated to be critical.

Khaleda Zia addressing the public meeting expressed her grief at the tragic incident.

JCD terrorists like Jasim, Bakkor, Habib and Shah Alam are also in the field to work for their party candidates.

Listed terrorists belonging to Jamaat-e-Islami and its student front Islami Chhatra Shibir -- Sajjad, Habib Khan, Gittu Nasir and Delwar -- were seen in the city on Friday night. They are working in different police departments.

BNP expels 2
