

Real really confident

Real Madrid, buoyed by their 5-1 win against Espanyol at the weekend, seek to consolidate their flying European Champions League start at home to Anderlecht on Wednesday.

After their first win in four Spanish League games, a third straight Champions League victory in this 2001/2002 campaign should ensure Real of a second round spot as they chase their ninth European crown.

France's Zinedine Zidane, the most expensive player in the world after being signed in the summer for 66 million dollars from Juventus, is suspended for their fixture against the Belgian club.

Strikers Fernando Morientes and Guti are also doubtful with injury problems but it's not clear they would regain their places anyway because of the outstanding form of Pedro Munitis.

In the other Group A game, Fabio Capello's AS Roma host Lokomotiv Moscow and the Italian side are still winless following their first two fixtures.

Now Capello hopes for a first European victory following the 2-1 defeat by Real Madrid and the 0-0 draw with Anderlecht.

But he will be aware that Roma still have a lot of work to do if they are to recover their scintillating form of last season.

Of primary concern is the form of Argentinian striker Gabriel Batistuta who has not scored since the Super Cup win, equalling the worst period

of the 10 years in Italy that have seen him score 172 Serie A goals.

Against Anderlecht the Argentinian at least got into positions but spurned several chances against Fiorentina he never got a sniff.

Capello may well start the Lokeren match with Vincenzo Montella alongside Marco Delvecchio.

England's Liverpool go into their Group B match at home to Ukrainian side Dynamo Kiev at Anfield on Wednesday without in-form England striker Michael Owen. The frontman injured his hamstring in last weekend's 1-0 English Premiership victory over Tottenham.

Owen's place in the line-up is likely to be taken by Finnish international Jari Litmanen, who scored a superb solo goal against Tottenham although could Gerard Houllier could take England forward Robbie Fowler off the bench instead.

Kiev are languishing at the bottom of the pool after taking just one point from two matches and are desperate for a victory to relaunch their European campaign.

Dynamo are likely to be without injured defender Yury Dmitrullin and out-of-form Andrei Husin.

Borussia Dortmund are set to field the same team at Portuguese club Boavista as played in Saturday's 1-1 German League draw against Bayer Leverkusen.

Dortmund are still without long-term injury victims Jorg Heinrich, France's Guy Demel, Giuseppe Reina and Ghanaian international Otto Addo against the surprise group pacesetters from Porto.

Arsenal captain Tony Adams is ruled out of the Group C match against Panathinaikos in Athens on

Wednesday, adding to manager Arsene Wenger's defensive problems as England centre-back Sol Campbell is already out with a hamstring injury.

French midfielder Gilles Grimandi, an emergency defender against Bolton, is also out with a calf muscle problem.

But Arsenal do have England centre-back Martin Keown available after a one-match ban. He is likely to be partnered by 22-year-old Matthew Upson.

Group C clash at home to Real Mallorca. "If we don't win, the situation will have become critical," said coach Huub Stevens.

Stevens still has to make do in the absence of last year's German league top scorer Ebbe Sand of Denmark and Belgian international Marc Wilmots, both out injured.

New Lazio coach Alberto Zaccheroni has a lot on his mind as he prepares for their Group D clash with Dutch side PSV Eindhoven.

Before Sunday night's 2-0 defeat at the San Siro by his former club AC Milan in Zaccheroni's first game in charge things were bad enough for the coach who replaced the sacked Dino Zoff on Thursday.

Still winless in the domestic league Lazio are bottom of their first-round group and victory on Wednesday at the Phillips Stadium is a must.

But Sunday's match left four players with injuries that are likely to rule them out of the match with PSV. Club captain Alessandro Nesta injured ligaments in his right knee against Milan and Argentinian forward Hernan Crespo was replaced at the interval with a similar problem in his left knee.

Two other players - Giuseppe Favalli and Dino Baggio - also picked up knocks and all four are unlikely to play against the Dutch side.

Nantes striker Marama Vahirua returns in their Group D match at home to Turkish club Galatasaray but that will not compensate for the absence of Romanian front man Viorel Moldovan.

Moldovan suffered a muscular tear in their French League match against Lyon on Saturday and will be out for at least two months.

Putting up a brave face

South Korean World Cup organisers sought Tuesday to play down fears that the international terrorism crisis would hit attendances at next year's finals.

Although a security review has been ordered, Korean World Cup Organising Committee (KOWOC) co-chairman Chung Mong-Joon would not be drawn on whether the US terror attacks had slowed ticket sales.

But he indicated organisers were not worried.

"In general, demand is 10 times higher than supply for tickets," Chung told a briefing for foreign reporters when asked about the threat. "Terrorist attacks should have no impact on our lives."

KOWOC and South Korean security authorities have already ordered an anti-terrorism review which will include extra security forces, heightened surveillance of people entering the country and a no-fly zone over stadiums.

President Kim Dae-Jung reaffirmed again Tuesday that the country had to be ready to confront any terrorist threat to the World Cup and the Asian Games, which will also be held in South Korea next year.

There are just over three million tickets for the World Cup matches which will be played in South Korea and Japan from May 31 next year.

South Korea is selling its final 300,000 tickets for matches in the country now.

Chung reaffirmed KOWOC estimates that 400,000 people would visit South Korea for the finals. "This is the largest event in the history of Korea in terms of impact. We want to show the new image of Korea that it is politically and economically different."

Despite his confidence, Chung will go to Europe next week to help with a World Cup promotion campaign. The KOWOC co-chairman will give a speech and give interviews in Paris on October 5.

The Korean authorities are sending three groups of musicians to Rome, Madrid, the German city of Cologne and Paris to promote the tournament for which South Korea has spent two billion dollars on new stadiums.

According to latest figures, the World Cup will also be the most popular television sports event ever.

Chung said there were 19.6 billion television viewers for the 1996 Atlanta Olympics. "For the 1998 World Cup in France there were 37 billion viewers and we expect 42 billion next year and if China qualifies 60 billion."

"I don't think it is necessary to talk publicly about the players' wages and bonuses, as those are the confidential issues of the club board. There are no disagreements between the club and Roberto, and he is going to please 'inchada' with his brilliant game," said Butragueno.

Overmars out for three weeks

Overmars has been replaced by Gerard Lopez in a match involving the two Group F table toppers, who both won their opening matches last week.

Lazio suffer double blow

Lazio's attempts to get their season back on course suffered a setback when Italy international Alessandro Nesta and Argentine striker Hernan Crespo were ruled out for six weeks with thigh injuries.

Lazio, pointless in Europe and winless at home, gave another abject display at the San Siro.

Crespo, who with 26 goals last season was Italy's top scorer, is yet to get off the mark this year but spurned two golden chances against Milan when the score was 0-0 although tellingly both came from horrendous errors by Milan's Georgian defender Kakha Kaladze.

But even more worrying was another poor display by Spanish midfielder Gaizka Mendieta, recruited for 41 million dollars from Valencia in the summer as a replacement for Argentinian Juan Sebastian Veron who joined Manchester United.

"We simply must have more courage when we go out on the pitch," said Zac. "Mendieta did not have a good game but I see him growing."

Zaccheroni will hope that progress starts on Wednesday as Lazio look to improve on the 1-0 defeat by Galatasaray in Istanbul and the 3-1 reverse at the hands of Nantes last week in Rome that cost Zoff his job.

They join five other probable absences on the treatment table. They are Dutch defender Jaap




Arsenal captain Tony Adams will miss his side's Champions League match in Athens on Wednesday, the English Premiership side confirmed Monday.

Adams' absence adds to Arsenal manager Arsene Wenger's defensive problems for their match against Panathinaikos. Adams' fellow England centre-back Sol Campbell is already out with a hamstring injury.

Adams, 34, was recalled for Saturday's 1-1 Premiership draw with Bolton after three matches out with a foot injury. But he struggled in that match and further foot and groin problems have ruled him out of Wednesday's Group C match.

Spurs, MU for Sept. 11 victims?

Benefit football exhibitions involving such teams as Manchester United and Tottenham Hotspur are being discussed as a fund-raiser for families of victims of the September 11 terrorist attacks.

The Washington Post reported here Monday that talks of matches are in very early stages, but that the two English Premiership sides might try to host exhibitions against US foes in November.

D.C. United of Major League Soccer has been mentioned as a possible opponent and the MetroStars, New York's MLS squad, is another likely squad in the wake of terrorist attacks that collapsed New York's World Trade Center and damaged the Pentagon.

European champion Bayern Munich has been discussed as a possible exhibition foe for D.C. United here next year.

The Washington club and its Women's United Soccer Association counterpart, the Washington Freedom, have agreed to play a pair of double-headers against New York rivals MetroStars and New York Power.

The matches are set for October 27 or 28 at East Rutherford, New Jersey and here on November 3. Two such man-woman double-headers drew more than 30,000 spectators to RFK Stadium here this year. The Freedom outdrew most MLS clubs.
