

Deaths in countrywide political violence double in last 75 days

At least 131 people were killed in political violence across the country during the last 75 days of the caretaker government against 68 in the previous 75 days of Awami League government.

Most of them were killed in shooting during clashes between activists of Awami League and the BNP-led four-party alliance.

During the periods, the number of victims belonging to Awami League and its front organisations was more than double that of BNP and its fronts, according to newspaper reports.

Of the 131 killed during the tenure of the caretaker government, 69 were leaders and activists of Awami League and 29 of BNP and its front organisations.

More than 600 political clashes took place during the period, in which several hundred people were also injured.

Killings and incidents of violence increased despite an ongoing special drive involving police and BDR to recover illegal arms and arrest terrorists. Army deployment across the country also began on September 22 to ensure peaceful holding of election.

Even after reshuffle in the police administration, satisfactory progress could not be made in arresting listed terrorists and criminals.

Moscow airport detains plane with explosives

A cargo plane carrying eight tonnes of explosives and hundreds of detonators was detained at a Moscow airport on Thursday night, an airport spokesman said yesterday.

Russian news agencies said the An-12 plane, making a scheduled stop at Domodedovo airport, was held when customs officials noticed its permits were printed on Soviet-era notepaper. They said the aircraft's licence to fly the goods over Russia had expired in August.

The airport spokesman said the explosives were part of the regular cargo flown to the Kazakh mining town of Dzhezkazgan and the plane was due to fly out later in the day. "We expected the plane to land in Moscow, it is a regular flight," he added.

The incident took place amid heightened security at Russian airports after the suicide attacks in

Families of six war heroes urge people to elect pro-independence forces

Family members of six 'Bir Shrestha' heroes of the Liberation War, yesterday made a fervent appeal to the people to vote on 'Boat,' the symbol of independence, to defeat the razakars and their associates once again like in 1971.

In a passionate appeal, they said the identified anti-liberation forces and collaborators of Pakistan -- razakar, Al-Badr, Al-Shams -- are trying to capture state power in the name of four-party alliance.

"If these forces are voted to power, the lives sacrificed by the Bir Shrestha freedom fighters will be meaningless," they said in the joint appeal for rejecting those "identified enemies" of the country.

There were remarkable crowds at the railway station and bus and launch terminals.

The number of homebound passengers at Kamalapur railway station was significant yesterday. The rush of people was similar to that of Eid festival, said a railway official.

Many people of southern districts connected by river routes were also found at the Sadarghat launch terminal yesterday.

There was also heavy rush of passengers in the bus terminals and some buses bound for Tangail and Mymensingh were overcrowded.

As many city dwellers want to include their names in the voter list of their own constituencies, they

Road accident kills 7 in Trishal

At least seven people were killed and 51 others injured in a road accident at Bagan Raghmara on Mymensingh-Dhaka highway near Trishal upazila headquarters yesterday, police and hospital sources said.

The accident took place when a Netrokona bound passenger bus from Dhaka skidded off the road and fell into a roadside ditch at about 11 am.

Five passengers died on the spot while the rest succumbed to their injuries at Mymensingh Medical College Hospital (MMCH). Of the injured, 45 were admitted to the MMCH.

Of the dead, three were identified as Parveen, 30, Shahanah, 55, and Idris, 30, the driver of the ill-fated vehicle. The bodies were sent to MMCH for autopsy.

Jubo Dal activist shot dead at Barisal

Unidentified assailants shot dead a BNP youth front activist at BSCIC road in the town last night.

Miscreants fired at Muhammad Kamaluddin alias Police Kamal at about 8:30 pm. He succumbed to his injuries soon after admission to a hospital.

Police said 'Police Kamal' was a listed terrorist and accused in several cases.

BNP blamed Awami League for the killing. Awami League denied the charge.

BNP expels Nabiullah Nabi

BNP has expelled another dissident candidate contesting the election from Dhaka-4 constituency despite repeated directives from party central committee to withdraw his candidature.

The candidate, Nabiullah Nabi, was expelled and his primary membership was cancelled for violating party discipline, a press release said yesterday.

Khaleda Zia spoke for about 40 minutes amid thunderous slogans and applause. People of all ages, both male and female, were seen in large numbers listening to the BNP chief standing on roof-tops and balconies of high-rise buildings on both sides of Bangabandhu Avenue, DIT Road, Tanibazar Road, Sirajuddowla Road, Kalibazar and Chashara.

As her motorcade passed through the area, she was greeted by the crowds and the entire city wore a festive look. The traffic in the city was very thin and shopping establishments were kept mostly closed as people started reaching the venue since noon with banners and posters in their hands chanting various slogans in favour of BNP and

C'wealth summit postponed

The Commonwealth summit scheduled next month in Brisbane, Australia has been postponed, the group's secretary-general said yesterday. It was feared many leaders would have stayed home following the terrorist attacks in the United States.

A statement from the Commonwealth Secretariat in London said the international meeting had been postponed due to the "likely absence of a significant number of leaders, due to unforeseen circumstances."

In the written statement, Secretary-general Don McKinnon said he had been in consultation with leaders of countries across the Commonwealth, including Canada, Britain, India, Jamaica and Nigeria, as well as the host Australia. He said the meeting had been deferred "purely for practical reasons."

"It is with a huge feeling of disappointment that I announce this decision, a feeling that I know will be shared right across the Commonwealth and beyond."

McKinnon said.

"In these uncertain times it is easy to understand the desire of political leaders to be with their own people, in their own countries," he said, in an apparent reference to the global political situation in the wake of the Sept 11 terror attacks on the United States.

McKinnon said the Australian Prime Minister John Howard had
