

Last minute door-to-door campaign as nation prepares for polls

Candidates across the country are bracing for tomorrow's polls by scaling up the door-to-door mass contact, with the curtain having fallen on the official electioneering at midnight last night.

The ban on election campaign like holding, calling and attending public meetings and bringing out processions will remain in force until midnight tomorrow, the Election Commission (EC) said in a press release yesterday.

Violation of the provision regarding violence and brandishing or using arms are punishable with rigorous imprisonment for a term extending up to seven years and will not be less than two years and also with fines, the EC said referring to the relevant article of the Representation of People Order.



The press release also said it is also an offence to campaign or begging votes or asking for not casting votes within 400 yards of a polling centre.

Campaigning reached a fever pitch in the city, with both Awami League President Sheikh Hasina and BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia on whirlwind visits to eight city constituencies gearing up the masses for voting for their party nominees. Excited supporters and activists of both the parties accompanied the leaders.

The parties, candidates and the Election Commission (EC) now are busy preparing for the election to the eighth parliament. The EC, according to officials, has been keeping a close contact with returning officers across the country to get up-to-the-minute information.

President asks CEC, army chief to ensure fair voting

UNB, Dhaka

President Shahabuddin Ahmed yesterday asked the Election Commission, chiefs of army and police to ensure peaceful atmosphere at all polling centres so that the voters can cast their voters freely and fearlessly.

"Full preparation must be made to ensure peaceful atmosphere in all polling stations," he told Chief Election Commissioner M A Syed, Army Chief Lt Gen Harun-ar Rashid and IG of Police M Nurul Huda who called on him at Bangabhaban.

They apprised the President of the overall law and order in the country ahead of the 8th parliamentary elections to be held on Monday.

There will be no problem at all in holding the general election peacefully, they assured the President.

They said that a total of 13 BDR, police and VDP members would be deployed in each polling station.

In addition, the members of the armed forces will be patrolling nearby polling stations and they will be available to interfere within a few minutes if the situation demands, they said.

Hasina's call for restraint

Awami League President Sheikh Hasina yesterday expressed deep concern at the pre-election violence across the country and asked the people to show maximum restraint in such situation.

Referring to the killings of an AL leader in Munshiganj yesterday and two others in Chittagong the day before, Hasina accused a certain quarter of conspiring to subvert tomorrow's election.

The AL chief was addressing an unscheduled public rally at Malibagh DIT Road crossing in the city at 9:30 p.m. yesterday, the last day for election campaign. The rally was organised to woo votes for AL candidate from Dhaka-6 constituency Saber Hossain Choudhury.

Urging the people to give her party a fresh mandate, the immediate-past prime minister also called upon the voters to see to it that their right to franchise is not snatched.

Khaleda ends campaign with call for tolerance

BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia yesterday called upon the people to "teach terrorist and corrupt Awami League a lesson" by voting for "sheaf of paddy" in tomorrow's general election.

"The Awami League is again begging vote as it did in the 1996 polls. But the people will not be misled this time because they do not want to return to Awami misrule," she said.

Tens of thousands of people from different parts of the city converged on streets in Naya Paltan, Kakrail, Fakirpul, Bijoynagar and adjoining areas. It was virtually a human

sea as crowds spilled over to nearby lanes and by-lanes. People were also seen on rooftops.

The All Party Action Council (APAC) of BNP-led four-party alliance organised the meeting. All alliance candidates in the city were introduced at the meeting.

Amid cheers, repeated claps and full-throated slogans, the BNP Chairperson said that AL came to power in 1996 through rigging and manipulating polls results by media

Preliminary observation report by Monday midnight: EUEOMB

Chief of European Union Election Observation Mission in Bangladesh (EUEOMB) here yesterday said it would reveal the preliminary observation report on the eighth parliamentary election around midnight on Monday.

The statement about how free and fair the election would be made available on Tuesday morning (at about 11am) followed by the most substantial report on Wednesday, EUEOMB chief Joaquin Miranda De Silva told the news agency at Hotel Sheraton.

Ban on vehicular movement, cities exempted

UNB, Dhaka

The Election Commission has banned movement of all types of motorised vehicle across the country barring the metropolitan and divisional towns from midnight tonight to midnight on the election day.

During the period, motorcycle, auto-rickshaw, microbus, jeep, pickup car, bus, truck, tempo, launch, engine-driven boat and speedboat would not be allowed to ply in the country, while motorbike and microbus in metropolitan and divisional towns.

The restriction would not be applicable to the vehicles to be used by the candidates, law-enforcers, authorised observers and election agents in addition to those plying on the national highways, and long-route river vessels.

Election observers and agents, if necessary, can use vehicles with stickers given by the Election Commission, said a press release.

'Accept with grace both victory & defeat'

Envoy of 13 western countries and chief of the European Union (EU) resident mission in Bangladesh have urged political parties to accept 'with grace both victory and defeat' in tomorrow's polls and not to 'engage in violent activities.'

They hoped that people of Bangladesh irrespective of sex, religion communities and groups will turn out in large numbers to exercise their franchise and further strengthen the democratic process in the country.

"As friends and well-wishers of Bangladesh, we make these urgings," they said.
