With the entire machinery of his caretaker government set for performing its prime task, Chief Adviser Latifur Rahman yesterday urged voters to go to polling centres today without fear and vote freely for the candidates of their choice

"You should remain alert so that black money, illegal pressure and various evil propaganda cannot mislead you," he said in his address to the nation over Radio and Television last night.

Latif reminded that all the people of the country, irrespective of caste, creed and gender are citizens of Bangladesh. "We all in this country have equal rights.

"Let us make election to the 8th Parliament a success through the exercise of our voting right, which is a civic duty," he said calling upon all voters to cast their vote for the success of democracy and for future development of the nation.

As the election is being held against the backdrop of intense political rivalries, mainly between the two former ruling parties, the

Leaders promised us a lot, but not the two we wanted most

Throughout the campaign we eagerly waited to hear those promises. They did not come. They were not in their party manifestos either. Nor did they find any place in the last address to the voters by Sheikh Hasina and Khaleda Zia last Sunday night. We are of course referring to: 1) a promise not to boycott the parliament; and 2) not to call hartals in the future. Two simple but vital demands of the people.

What crippled our democratic experiment and our nascent parliament in the last 10 years? The boycott of the parliament by the opposition parties of the day - first the Awami League (AL) and then the Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP). What crippled our economy in the last decade? Continuous hartals, again by the opposition parties of the day - first by the AL and then by the BNP.

Both parties know fully well that their boycott and their hartals were extremely damaging to our country. Just recall what they said when they were in power. Khaleda Zia, as the prime minister, called the hartals and the boycott of the parliament as acts of the 'enemies' of the country and the people. Yet she relentlessly subjected the nation to both, while in opposition. Sheikh Hasina was full of condemnation for hartals and parliament boycott as the PM. conveniently forgetting that it was she and her party that subjected the nation to the longest and the most destructive hartal ever.

Forgiving as we are as a people we have been quite ready to overlook what happened in the past as the birth pangs of our own brand of democratic system. Wanting to look forward we had hoped that at least **SEE PAGE 11 COL 7**
