### Voters' movement to be monitored

UNB, Faridpur Voters' movement and law and order situation will be monitored through video cameras during the polling.

#### Four injured in bomb explosion

Four people including two girls were injured critically in a bomb explosion at South Charnoabad village of Sadar upazila on Friday.

The explosion took place in a house owned by Abdul Hag Munshi in the afternoon leaving Mizanur Rahman, 20, Hanif, 14, Kohinur Begum, 9, and Sultana Begum injured. Of them, Mizanur's eyes were blown in the explosion and he was rushed to Barisal in a critical condition. According to Awami League sources Mizan was a BNP activist and the explosion occurred while making bombs. In another incident on the same day, the legs of a rickshawpuller were blown in a bomb explosion in front of district Chhatra League office in Sadar upazila. Besides, two activists of Jubo League Mujahidul Islam and Babul were injured critically in a bomb attack on a procession of Awami League near Pakhir Poll temple here on Thursday

#### CHTRC member arrested

Police on Tuesday arrested a member of Chittagong Hill Tracts Regional Council (CHTRC) suspecting his involvement with a murder.

The arrested, Mohammad Yousuf, was sent to jail hajat on the next day after a court rejected his bail petition. Police said they arrested Yousuf following the unnatural death of a young boy, Omar Faruq, employee of a petrol pump owned by Yousuf, last Friday.

## Eight arrested: 2 firearms recovered

Fight people were arrested and two firearms recovered from Khudra Gonalour and Syedpur villages of Santhia upazila on Tuesday-Wednesday.

On information, police and armymen jointly raided the house of Abdul Awal of Khudra Gopalpur village at about 1.30 am and arrested his wife Mamtaj Khatun, son Swapan and one Ranju. They later recovered a revolver loaded with bullets from Mamtaj and seized a mobile phone set and a stolen motorbike from Swapan. Meanwhile, the law enforcers in their joint drive arrested five people from Syedpur village of the upazila on Wednesday. A pipe gun and a sharp weapon were also recovered from their possession.

# RU library in a shambles

Rajshahi University (RU) library is in a shambles. As a result the students are sufferering a lot

The library has no collection of up-to-date books or journals. It has no recently published encyclopaedia, dictionary, yearbook, census report or other library materials

Such is the situation for the last 10 years. This is because of indifference of the library authorities.

Students, teachers, researchers and other faculty members come to the library for recent library collections for research and other academic purposes, but in vain.

The library has two management-committeesone Library Committee and the other Library Sub-Committee headed by the Vice Chancellor (VC) of the university while the Administrator in-charge of the Librarian is the Member Secretary.

The two committees decide different development policies of the library including purchase of library materials. The library administration sources said that the library administration can not hold the meeting of the committees regularly, which subsequently stands in the way of the development of the library.

As most of the books and journals in the present collection of the library numbering three lakh are either outdated or obsolete. This results in degradation of the standard of education of the university.

Pages of important books are most often seen to have been cut down.

Besides, nonsense words are also seen written in the books

The teachers borrow 'a good number of books' from the library, but they do not return those in time keeping those with them for years together. The library administration never dares to issue warning letters against

The library personnel do not pay adequate attention to the proper management of the library including the reading rooms. They do not check the arrangement of books whether those are in the proper order or not on the shelves according to the catalogue cards. Some 'unscrupulous' readers displace important books and keep them in other shelves depriving other users. Very often, the catalogue cards remain in a haphazard manner in the card-cabinet desk. When the readers seek their help in addressing the problems, some of the library personnel straightaway deny to help them.

Again, the library workers inside the reading rooms gossip among themselves loudly and create disturbances for the readers. The users do not get remedy to the problem even after lodging complaints to the library administration repeatedly, many of the readers have alleged.

Even some of the students practise private tuition inside the reading rooms. But the library administration does not take necessary measures to stop the trend.

However, when contacted, Prof Obaidur Rahman Pramanick, Administrator of the library, he said that the management of the library are aware of some of the problems. "Efforts are on to solve the problems of the library including up-gradation of the library", he added.

## Tk 4 lakh contraband destroyed

BDR battalion of Srimongol destroyed Indian contraband goods worth about Tk 4 lakh recently, seized during the last one month.

The goods seized while being smuggled into the country include huge bidi, two kgs of hemp, 79 bottles of phensidyl and 23 bottles of wine. The goods were destroyed on September 4 in presence of Upazila Nirbahi Officer and local journalists.

Meanwhile, the BDR jawans during their raids from January to August this year seized Indian goods worth over Tk 66.16 lakh while being smuggled into the

country and Bangladeshi goods wroth Tk 18.931 while being smuggled out to India. Another message from Kurigram

adds: Narcotics Control Department in separate drives here seized 3.25 kg of hemp and 21 bottles of phensidyl syrup recently

Acting on a tip-off, they raided the house of Nurul Islam of Bhadrapara in Ulipur upazila and seized one-kg of hemp and 11 bottles of phensidyl and in another raid at the house of Mahbub of Kazir Chak village in the same upazila recovered two kgs of hemp on August 27.

## Massive programme to grow more fruits

BSS, Thakurgaon

The government has taken up a massive programme to grow more fruits of different kinds with an aim to meet national demand and to earn foreign currency by exporting fruits, horticulturists here said.

To implement the programme, the Directorate of Agriculture Extension (DAE) will set up 100 mango orchards in five upazilas of the district (20 in each upazila).

DAE has distributed 5,100 Amrapali' variety of mango saplings among 100 marginal and small farmers this year to set up mango orchards. Each farmer planted 50 saplings on 15 decimals of land, a DAE source said.

The 'Amrapali' variety of mango is a high quality variety which can be planted in a gap of 10 to 12 feet only. The trees require less space in relation to other varieties due to their bushy nature. A total of 1,600 saplings can be planted on one hectare of land and the production is 15 to 16 metric tons per hectare.

Horticulturists say the characteristics of "Amrapali' is that there is no 'on' and 'off' year like other varieties. So, each and every year 'Amrapali' bears fruits. The fruit is medium in size with a weight of about 150 to 200 grams. A mango contains 70 per cent flesh and 30 per cent stone. Its percentage of sweetness is 23.3. It is a late variety which ripens along with 'Fazli' in the Bengali months of Ashar and Sraban. It requires five months from flowering to ripening.

Abdus Salam, Deputy Director, DAE told that besides setting up of mango orchards, the directorate has also taken up programmes to produce other fruits like Amra, Shaddock, Safeda, Kamaranga and other citrus fruits



## Weavers in miserv

two upazilas depend on weaving to earn their livelihood. But due to the price spiral of cotton, yarn, dice and other raw materials they are facing problems to continue their age-old occupation.

The easy availability of Indian clothes has considerably reduced the demand of the local handloom products.

The weavers said they are to buy the raw materials from the local markets at exorbitant prices and the cost of production goes high comparing to the prices of Indian clothes.

Once local handloom products like lungi sari, napkin and bed-sheet had a great demand in the markets as these products were comparatively cheap and of high quality.

But the aggression of Indian clothes damaged the market of indigenous products

The weavers urged the government to stop selling of Indian clothes in the market in order to save the local handloom industry from ruin-
