

Instead of the West Indies playing seven Test matches and 12 oneday games between February and early June against India and New Zealand, the players could look forward to being involved in many more, perhaps an additional six Test matches and maybe nine more one-

Sri Lanka and Pakistan especially would feel rather left out and let down, and I feel for them, but I still believe Sri Lanka touring the Caribbean from November and Pakistan from late January would be the perfect solution for all.

Haas makes no mistake

Tommy Haas, the German number one with the locally born father, atoned for his disappointment in losing in last year's final by winning the CA Trophy in front of his Austrian relatives here Sunday.

Haas' 6-2,7-6, 6-4 triumph over the unseeded Guillermo Canas earned him the fourth ATP title of his career and his third of the year, and carried him to within 50 points of the cut for next month's eight-man year-end finals in Sydney.

For Canas, the first Argentine in an indoor final since Guillermo Vilas 18 years ago, it was a great disappointment, but he was often out-hit by his sixth seeded opponent who had heavier weapons, a better allcourt game and considerable crowd support. "It's really nice to win here - I played great all week," said Haas, who had had to save two match points against Thomas Enqvist, against whom he was within a couple of centimetres of defeat in Saturday's semi-finals.

"As well as my coach I would like to thank all my family and the crowd here. The great support they have given me has helped me a lot," sai

Haas nevertheless had to survive he first crisis, two break points on his serve in the fifth game. but once Canas had missed the second of them with a backhand drive which was projected too wide the unseeded player's error ratio

The Argentine drove a forehand long on game point in the next game, dropping serve, and when he served to save the set at 2-5 he made two more uncharacteristic ground stroking errors, the second a backhand which slewed wide on

For a while after that it seemed Haas might trample all over Canas. He disconcerted the unseeded



player with some fierce flat ground strokes which pressured Canas into over-hitting and dropping serve, and advanced to 4-1.

But just when a two-set lead beckoned, Haas, perhaps tensing up, started to make hard work for

at 4-2 which allowed Canas to break back, made two forehand errors when he had Canas at 15-30 in the 12th game, and even squandered his first mini-break in the tiebreak when he chose to let go a ball

which dropped in. The penalty Haas suffered for this was to endure a set point on his serve at 5-6 in the tie-break. He saved it with a solid serve and a good forehand follow-up, but it was nevertheless with a very evident expression of relief that he squeezed out the set by snatching another mini-break on the final point, manoeuvring Canas into

driving a backhand into the net. After that Haas always looked to have the game to win the match, provided he had the temperament. The third set was a topsy-turvy affair, full of fine rallies and unexpected misses, with fully five breaks

The crucial moments came when Haas three times denied his opponent chances to serve for the set with a 5-3 lead. Canas made a big effort during the five deuces on Haas' serve in that vital game, and the disappointment may have contributed to the rapid loss of his own delivery in the following game.

"I am not out of it in the Champions Race, but I will have to play well," said Haas.


