# Rahman tells all to wait

State Minister for Youth and Sports Fazlur Rahman said that the government would be making changes in the existing set-up of different sports federations.

But the new sports boss of the country did not want to define whether the changes would be qualitative or quantitative during his first formal encounter with the sports scribes at his National Sports Council (NSC) office on Sunday afternoon.

"Since the government has changed, Bangladesh sport will also see some changes. Our government has a definitive policy to run it, but we are taking our time to implement our plans," said Rahman in front of a packed audience.

Responding to a query on whether the government would abolish the present democratic process and revert to ad-hocism. which the BNP practised during its 1991-95 tenure. Rahman diplomatically remarked: "I have plenty of options to play with now...y wait and in time you will know everything."
