Top level changes involving major generals are being made in Bangladesh Army, sources said.

Major General Jalal Uddin, Military Secretary to the President, is being appointed Adjutant General of the Army.

Major General A M Mansur Ahmed, Director General of Bangladesh Institute of International and Strategic Studies (BIISS), is being made Military Secretary to the President.

Major General Tareq Ahmed Siddique, Adjutant General of the Army, would take over as Engineer-in-Chief of the Army.

Major General Sikder Shahbuddin, who was chief of the Special Security Force (SSF), is taking over as DG of BIISS.

Major General Mahmud-uz-Zaman, Commandant of the Ordnance Factory at Gazipur, is being appointed PSO in the Armed Forces Division.

near NY, nuclear power stations

US aviation authorities on Tuesday introduced new restrictions on flights near nuclear power installations, and baseball's Yankee sta-dium in New York, following a FBI warning that new terror attacks may be imminent.

The Federal Aviation Administration slapped restric-tions on airspace around 86 sensitive nuclear sites and ratcheted up security in New York, where President George W Bush was due to throw out the first pitch in game three of baseball's World Series.

"All general aviation flying is prohibited within a radius of 10 nautical miles and below 18,000 feet (5,480 metres) of the 86 sites," the FAA said in an advisory known as a "Notice to Airmen"

The restrictions will remain in force until midnight eastern time on Tuesday, November 6, FAA

Afghan cities and Taliban militiamen suffered under an intense wave of US bombing yesterday as US officials scrambled to head off the danger of a renewed terrorist onslaught on their homeland.

Washington banned planes from flying near US nuclear power stations as a manhunt was launched for six "Middle Eastern" men seen with maps of a power plant and box-cutters and as another US citizen died of anthrax

US warplanes pursued the relentless battering of Taliban strongholds and frontline positions, preparing the ground for a threatened opposition offensive but also increasing the misery of Afghanistan's longsuffering civilians.
