## Two good news for Kiwis

New Zealand's morale before the Test series against Australia improved on Saturday with Chris Cairns taking five wickets against Queensland and spinner Daniel Vettori indicating he would be fit for

Pace bowler Cairns, who has lacked rhythm with the ball following his return from a serious knee injury, took five for 71 from 22 overs in Brisbane to help dismiss Queensland for 347. Australia Test opener Matthew Hayden made 97.

New Zealand were 53 for three in reply, an overall lead of 150, at the close after the third and penulti-mate day of the touring side's final warm-up match.

The first game in the three-Test series against Australia starts in Brisbane on Thursday.

Vettori, stretchered off with a torn ankle ligament against an Australian Capital Territory Invitational side on October 21 and flown home to New Zealand, launched his comeback on Friday with four wickets for a New Zealand academy side against the State Auckland Aces in Christchurch.

He rejoined the team in Brisbane on Saturday and said he was confident of making the first Test. "There is a little bit of uncertainty in my head but I'm confident about

getting through the bowling, Vettorisaid. "It's the other things I have to be nervous about and the true test will be a full day in the field.

"But I would love to play and I'm reasonably confident."

The 22-year-old Vettori, only just with back problems, has taken 106 wickets in 31 Tests and has a good record against Australia, taking 20 wickets at an average of 26.40.

A New Zealand team spokesman said Vettori's progress would be monitored daily.

Nathan Astle, who made 223 in New Zealand's 444 for nine declared on Friday before suffering a groin strain, did not field on Saturday but an Australian Broadcasting Corp. (ABC) radio report said team officials were confident the 30-year-old would be fit to play in the first Test.

ABC Radio also reported Vettori looked tentative during some fitness drills on the ground during a break in play on Saturday. Mathew Sinclair, on 17, and

# Waugh means business

## South Africa the final frontier

Australia captain Steve Waugh, fresh from proving his fitness following months of injury prob-lems, says the series against South Africa starting next month will decide which team can call itself the world's best.

"Playing South Africa is obviously our biggest challenge," Waugh said after playing in a club game following calf muscle prob-

The 36-year-old, determined to lead his side against New Zealand prior to the arrival of the South Africans, made 84 for Sydney club side Bankstown against competition leaders Fairfield-Liverpool on Saturday in his first competitive match since the Ashes series ended in August. Waugh batted for 163

He showed no lingering effects of the torn calf muscle which dog-ged him at the end of the Ashes campaign in England as he struck 12 boundaries in his 113-ball innings.

Waugh said the wicket was very flat and good for batting. He gave himself an "eight or nine" out of 10 and said he felt he didn't do a lot

"The first hour or so, I was just

trying to get a bit of match practice," said Waugh.

"I've been in the nets but obviously haven't played for a while, so it was nice to spend some time in

the middle.

'After that, I thought I hit the ball pretty well, so I couldn't really be much happier.

Quoted in The Sydney Morning Herald newspaper, Waugh said of South Africa: "If we can beat them over the course of the next six Tests, home and away, people will definitely say we are the number one side."

Australia are ranked first in the world just ahead of South Africa but Waugh added: "At the moment the South Africans probably think their side is number one and we think we are number one. "The jury is still out."

Australia first have to deal with New Zealand in a three-Test series starting in Brisbane on November 8 but Waugh said his side would not be complacent. They then host South Africa for

three Tests in December and January, before a return series in February and March. Waugh said the South Africans, led by all-rounder Shaun Pollock,

were an extremely disciplined side and that Pollock ranked alongside Australia fast bowler Glenn McGrath as an outstanding, worldclass player.

"If you are going to beat them, you are not going to beat them convincingly," Waugh said.

"You'll have to wear them down. They play a tough brand of cricket and don't give much away. It's a big looking forward to it." Australia's world record win-

ning streak of 16 matches came to an end in their 2-1 series loss in India in March but Waugh's team got back on course with a 4-1 win in England, Australia's seventh successive Ashes series triumph.

#### Taj TV to get SL's broadcast rights

Sri Lanka's cricket control board Saturday announced it would award international radio and television broadcast rights to Taj Television of Sharjah in the United Arab Emirates.

The Board of Control for Cricket in Sri Lanka (BCCSL) said it would enter into an agreement with Taj Television giving them broadcast rights for a period of three years.

Details of the deal were not immediately announced, but BCCSL officials said it was replacing a December agreement with WSG-Nimbus that collapsed a monthlater.
