UNFPA releases State of the World Population 2001

An estimated two billion people in the developing countries already lack food security and the world would have to double food production and improve distribution for its nearly eight billion people expected by 2025.

This was stated in the "State of the World Population 2001' released by UNFPA at a press conference at the Jatiya Press Club vesterday

Income tax returns rise by 15pc this year

A total of 4,09,538 income tax returns have been submitted this fiscal year, which is 15 per cent higher than last year's figure, according to sources in the Internal Resource Division

The number of income tax returns submitted last year (fiscal) was 3,56,503.

The sources, however, said although the number of returns increased this year, tax collection might not rise accordingly

The last date for submission of returns is September 30 but the time limit this year was extended by one month due to the general election.

The returns were submitted in 15 income tax zones in the country with the highest 63,000 returns in Rajshahi zone

People who failed to submit returns within the stipulated time would be fined Tk 500 for the first month and thereafter Tk 250 for each month, according to rules.

Tax officials said the number of returns submitted this year was higher because of the government's efforts to expand the income tax network and bring more people under it.

Government officials also submitted returns but they are not required to pay income tax. The amount ould be adjusted with government funds.

Many individuals submitted returns but they might not have to pay tax because their earnings are less than ne taxable amount

On the other hand, many wealthy people take advantage of self-assessment system of tax, not showing their actual income, a senior official said.

"It is very difficult to catch them because according to rules, tax officials cannot question any figure if it is 15 per cent higher than the previous year's income," he nointed out. Tax officials should have powers to ques tion the figures whenever suspicion arises, he felt.

An Assistant Private Secretary (APS) to the Prime Minister is so powerful that he can get top bureaucrats and officials transferred and others appointed at various levels in the administration, sources alleged. He operates with the help of a group of young BNP men who sits at an office in a posh area in the city.

Sources at the Prime Minister's Office claimed that transfers, promotions and appointments take place as per the list provided by the APS and after his "clearance". The person has been attached to Khaleda Zia for over ten years now.

The sources said the recent changes in some posts of secretaries of different ministries, transfers and appointments were done as per the list of the APS.

The changes angered several senior ministers as they were not consulted or even informed earlier.

Senior BNP leaders holding important portfolios in the cabinet are very much annoyed at this.

Talking to The Daily Star yesterday, some of them said they would meet the prime minister together and suggest her to call an emergency extended meeting of the BNP National Executive Committee to discuss thesituation

They said they can not discharge their official duties smoothly due to the APS because officials holding important posts are being changed without them.

They said the image of the government will be tarnished and the administration will become hostile if this is not stopped immediately.

They said majority of the ministers, BNP leaders and MPs have become very much annoyed at the activities of the APS and the group of SEE PAGE 11 COL 7
