HEPM has told a delegation of business leaders on Saturday to face the challenges of global recession unit-edly. This statement by the PM of Bangladesh is both a recognition of reality as well as a call to face up to facts that will rule the international economic environment in the immediate to mid term future. The happy days when wealth could be ensured by simply organizing a set of stitching machine and women behind them is possibly over. This has to be recognized by the exporting community as quickly as possible.

The crisis is actually hitting the working class much more than others and that effect is immediate. The situation is bad enough to warrant a major NGO, BRAC, to start a rehabilitation programme for the newly unemployed women from the ready made garments sector. They have become victims of a major disaster, less dramatic than a flood but equally devastating. And we don't seem to have been prepared for it at all.

Our policy makers seem to be still pinning their hope on mercy from the US market but this isn't forthcoming. And it probably won't, because the US economy is ruled by the market and priorities of the US society and not ours. We should recognize that we went wrong through the absurd monodependence on a single sector, which again depended on the demand situation in only one or two countries.

While globalization is inevitable, it has pitfalls and we are observing that now. One hopes that the economic planners and wisdom providers can do something to create necessary cushions to absorb the shocks.

Begum Zia has said that Bangladesh should look into handicrafts and IT products to replace the declining garments market and has also announced 100-day programme to overcome the crisis. It may well take much longer and people will have to

But what they must learn to survive in the inter-linked global market that is heavily loaded against the developing world is the need for reducing economic dependence on any one country. Diversification is a natural tool of survival and the responsibility to ensure that is of the national government. That was

It's best not to chase a dead duck to find the golden egg. Much better if everyone took a long painful breath and started to plan economic activities not only geared for immediate wealth but sustainability as well. Nobody is going to bail us out unless we are ready to do it ourselves.

### War in Afghanistan entering a dangerous phase

Time for the UN to put together a solution

E wonder whether the world should derive a sense of triumph or one of foreboding from the fall of Mazari-Sharif to the Northern Alliance. After 35 days of an incessant US state of the art bombing in Afghanistan designed to soften Taliban positions which intermittently strayed offtarget killing civilians and sending numerous others scurrying for the borders, that Taliban-held strategic city has succumbed to the opposition advance. Needless to say, this couldn't be pulled off without the US aerial assault.

From this point on, the war in Afghanistan is set to be convoluted, intense and infinitely more costly in human terms. Whilst it seems fraught with dangers of escalation within Afghanistan, it can get no-holds-barred in terms of reprisals being threatened to go beyond the borders of that country. Osama bin Laden's latest disclosure that he not merely possesses nuclear and chemical weapons but would use them against the United States, if attacked, might add a dreadful dimension to the threat perception in the US. This also sits in with the apprehension in the western world that nukes could have surreptitiously reached the hands of their implacable enemies. At the other pole, the fall of Mazar-i-Sharif has opened up the border with Uzbekistan freeing up the military hardware supplies to the Northern Alliance. The latter are aiming to link up with Tajikistan as well, where Russian weapons are stockpiled waiting to be shipped to them. Those two states of former Soviet Union also have nuclear arsenal as dangerous vestigial

The strategic attainment in the north provides the coalition forces a foothold on the ground in addition to the fire power being rained on Afghanistan. But Northern Alliance -- they are helping to fight the Taliban -- lacks representative character besides being a medley of warlords, each with ambitions of his own. In terms of ethnicity, they are a minority in the demographic make-up of Afghanistan. The majority Pastuns are, by and large, Taliban. They have to be integrated into any future government for Afghanistan to be effective, if and when the Taliban will have been toppled from power. Russian Federation, India and Iran are opposed to the Taliban being included in any future set-up but Pakistan would like the 'moderate Taliban' to be part of it.

The most practical viewpoint to take under the circumstances would be to let the United Nations knit together the multi-ethnic divisions into a national government for the purpose of holding elections in order that the Afghans themselves can choose the leaders they would like to be governed by.

## 'Enduring Freedom' or enduring war?

HERE had always been an element of chivalry in a war. An enemy was seldom engaged in a conflict unless of comparable strength. Although many were non-plussed at the speed at which the blame was apportioned, even without a preliminary investigation, the powerful western media dutifully took the charge of making the world believe that it was unmistakably bin-Laden who committed the crime.

The Americans have, however, not been as lucky in physically hitting or apprehending bin-Laden or his associates as they were in pinpointing them as 'prime suspects'. Neither have the Talibans who protect them crumbled. The month-long Tomahawk strikes and ruthless bombing of both al-Oaida and Talibans positions based on the best of the intelligence information have failed to make a significant crack in their defence. But in the process the whole country has been torn asunder. Afghanistan was already a country ravaged by two decades of devastating war and internecine civil strifes. The cities were in ruin. the villages deserted and the countryside littered with deadly landland-locked resource-poor coundraconian sanction in December last year, any prospect of the country's recovery was bleak and there was a new spate of migration across its porous borders. According to World Food Programme (WFP) there were around one million people in Afghanistan at the point of starvation even at that time. Apart from millions of refugees in neighbouring countries there were 2,00,000 internal refugees within the country itself. The country was already pitted against the West by failing to comply with its demand to extradite Osama bin-Laden to the US for the latter's alleged involvement in a number of terrorist actions. Before the outbreak of the ongoing war the humanitarian crisis in Afghanistan was already causing concern for the international community. Now it has been pushed to the brink of a

Around the world those who were genuinely moved at the helplessness of the victims of the crumbling Twin Towers on September 11 are equally aghast at the blood soaked bandage wrapped around the head of a toddler in Kabul or Kandahar. It is sickening to watch the day out and day in the human tragedy perpetrated against a people just because they are in a wrong place under wrong system. Will it defeat terrorism? Or, will it breed more hatred, violence and a paranoia of its kind? Many might have hoped that the war would do the world a favour by bringing justice of a kind to Osama bin-Laden and the Taliban without creating the resentments capable of breeding further violence. That is a fantasy!

a matter of 'collateral damage'

The die of the disaster has already been cast for Afghanistan. Even if the war stops sooner or later the looming danger of famine, hunger and disease is going to be still more worrisome. The aidplace anytime. The start of the war on 7 October halted United Nations food deliveries for more than a month. The officials of the World Food Programme calculate the country's need at 52,000 metric tons a month. Even if there is plenty of food near the borders but getting them in before the winter closes the mountain roads this month is a nightmare. The United Nations forecast the death of at last 1,00,000 children during the ensu-

Even when the peace, if at all, descends on Afghanistan it will take long indeed to remove the scar of the war producing a lot of destitutes, orphans and crippled ones. The unexploded bomb and other explosives will be taking their toll. The presence in the atmosphere of Depleted Uranium (DU), now used in high-potential munitious, will play havoc with the health and hygiene of the population. Worse still, the disruption in social and ethnic equilibrium, inherent in an imposed dispensation brought about by the 'quislings' will destabilise the nation.

The region also cannot be without

its vicious fallout. The longer will be the duration of 'Enduring Freedom', the more complex will be the tangle in Afghanistan

However, the critics say that the US has missed a historic opportunity of earning, instead, worldwide goodwill. Barring diehard fanatics none regardless of one's colour, creed and nationality approves of wanton killing of citizens either in USA or elsewhere. The outpourings of the sympathy for the American people after September 11 tragedy would have erased the long standing image of an 'Ugly American'. The world would have forgotten many of the terrorist acts perpetrated by the US itself. It perhaps would have overlooked a million children killed in Iraq as a result of US-manipulated sanction or condoned thousands dead in West Asia. There are moments when hearts sparked by mere gesture expand to embrace everything. The world would have even buried in the past the memory of 2,20,000 dead in Hiroshima and Nagasaki. It would have liked to ignore even Vietnam and many other covert operations in Chile, Panama, Nicaragua, Iran, Indonesia and so on. Because, for a change America was the victim of aggression and its people were among the sufferers. They could have used this change as an opportunity to win friends and allies the world over for a rational, just and popular drive against terrorism.

But instead they opted for a show of force, an arrogance and vengeance that are too excessive, arbitrary, abrasive and indiscriminate. In the process it has thrown to the winds the strength of western liberalism -- its tolerance, humility and capacity of self criticism in an hour of crisis.
