Office timing and

weekly holiday The present office timing and weekly holiday, although not ideal, could have been left undisturbed. First of all, let me say why the revised arrangement is not satisfactory. International communication problem, which is one of the main reasons for demanding change in weekly holiday, became even worse with offices closing at 2 PM on Thursday. In addition to Friday, Saturday and Sunday no on-line communication during office hours will be possible on Thursday also with countries 5 hours behind us in timing. It is true that the time difference is a problem we have to live with, but we must try to minimise it as much as possible. Reduction of the daily working time by one hour each day and three hours on Thursday will more than proportionately reduce productivity. Moreover, it will be difficult for the outsiders to visit offices on business within working hours after beating traffic jam, especially in Dhaka City. With an extra working day in a week there will be 20 per cent increase in office trips with resultant traffic congestion, additional burden on road capacity, more fuel burnt, more pollution etc. The pleasure and relaxation of a long week-end will be gone and most social functions will have to be held and pleasure trips made on Friday which has been declared as the weekly holiday for Jumma Prayer. Many officials will be forced to bring their family to cities where they work, as they will not be able to visit their families during the short weekends. This will increase the congestion of cities. Half an hour recess for prayer and lunch is hardly adequate. This existing deficiency in office timing has been addressed while revising the timing.

The following arrangement may be a good compromise addressing all the problems mentioned above:

- λ Office timing 9 AM to 5 PM with 1 hour break from 1 to 2 PM,
- except on Friday. λ Weekly holiday on Sunday
- Same office timing for Friday
- only with a longer recess of 2 hours from 12:30 to 2:30 PM. λ First and third Saturdays of the month closed (or second and

This arrangement will result in 41 hour longer weeks and 34 hour shorter weeks, that is an average of 37.5 working hours as at present and as also according to the revised timing announced by the govern-

Here is my reply to the letter "Is CNN Irrelevant?" (November 10). I agree with your observations on the role of CNN. Unfortunately, this malaise is not confined to

CNN; it extends in general throughout the US media. In fact CNN is generally less biased and has a broader coverage than other mainstream US media outlets. We are dismayed by the superficiality and utter lack of seeking "the story behind the events." CNN

seems to simply parrot official pronouncements from governments while doing little or no investiga tion into the background or causes of events and providing no analysis or context of its reporting. While CNN had never been "brave" in the past, at present it seems to have been completely muzzled due to wartime censorship. To see the extent of CNN's shallowness, one just needs to look at media outlets from the UK.

Though the British have the same cultural and social values as the US, the reporting in the UK is like a breadth of fresh air to a suffocating person compared to the US media. A case in point is the reporting of the UK newspaper "The Guardian."

On covering an Israeli siege of a Palestinian town, the Guardian (reporting surprisingly from a Jewish correspondent) talks about Israeli "brutality" in demolishing Palestinian homes, killing of Palestinian police officers (not accused of any crime even by Israel) in a surprise attack, internment of wounded Pâlestinians in a nearby illegal Jewish settlement without medical assistance and preventing ambulances from evacuating the wounded. In covering the same event what does CNN say? In its very sterile monotone, it quotes Israeli Army sources of an operation to eliminate terrorists and says there were Palestinian "claims" that ambulances were not allowed through.

Thus, even judging by the UK standards it appears that there is a well planned strategy in the US media of deliberately keeping the public uninformed of actual happenings in the Middle East in order to keep public opinion firmly biased against the Palestinians and against the seeking of justice.
