Health minister assures restoration of previous status

A statement issued by the health ministry said the strike was called off following a consensus between the ministry and the SKSP over restoring the previous status of the hospital.

Sources said Health and Family Welfare Minister Dr Khandakar Mosharraf Hossain at a meeting with the SKSP leaders at his office yesterday morning agreed in principle to

revive the previous status of the hospital and shift BSMMUH to another place.

The minister called the meeting on the seventh day of the strike enforced by the entire BSMMUH nursing staff, backed by about 600 Class three and class four employees belonging to the SKSP demanding restoration of the hospital's previous status and protesting the death of a nurse due to 'wrong treat-

Not a single lawmaker was present in the House when the clock struck 12 noon, the schedule for beginning of yesterday's sitting of the Jatiya

Three minutes later, two lawmakers including LGRD and Cooperatives Minister Abdul Mannan Bhuiyan entered the empty House, At 12:10pm, there were 11 MPs and in the next 10 minutes seven more lawmakers turned up.

Even half an hour after the scheduled start, the 300-strong parliament had only 27 members, way short of the required number of 60 lawmakers needed for the business to start. Speaker Jamiruddin Sircar took

his seat at 12:40pm when the num-

ber of lawmakers rose to 47. At 12:47pm, the speaker took up the order of the day with just 60 members, including him, attending the

Delayed resumption of the session, the maiden one of the eighth parliament that began its journey on October 28, has become a regular feature. Sittings of the current session started half an hour behind the schedule in the past one week on average despite repeated appeals by the speaker to the lawmakers to be in the House on time

Police camp tragedy

Doctors put deaths to delay in treatment

The lives of 11 policemen, who died of food poisoning at the Paglipara Police Camp in Rangamati on November 18, could have been saved if they were quickly taken to the hospital for treatment, according

Soon after the members of the Eighth Armed Police Battalion fell ill after having iftar Sunday night, wireless message was sent to the headquarters of the battalion at Bilaichhari, 70 kilometre from the camp. Having received the message at 8:00pm, the officials at the headquarters were awe-struck and took time to assign the transit camp at

Kaptai to look into the matter. At the same time, message was also sent to the BDR camp at Waghagachhara.

It was almost two hours after the reporting of the incident when people from the two camps arrived at the hilltop outpost 400 feet above the sea level. By then, the ailing policemen were groaning in pain and almost fainted by the time. Moreover, they could not come down from the hilltop to avail themselves of medical attention, as the winding road leading to the Rangamati-Kaptai road is very steep

Defaulter ISPs given a second chance

Access lines of 10 restored on late payment of licence fees

The Ministry of Post and Telecommunications (MOPT) yesterday allowed defaulted Internet Service Providers (ISPs) to renew their licenses on pay ment of late fee, sources said. Access lines of 10 ISPs were restored last night as they paid renewal fees

with penalty, the source said. MOPT officials could not be contacted for comment despite repeated attempts until last night. The penalty was at the rate of Tk 1,000 for the first 15 days of failure in

renewing licence and an additional amount of Tk. 2,000 per day thereafter. "We were allowed to deposit the renewal fee for ISP license with a provision for payment of late fee," an official of a leading ISP told The Daily Star

Thousands of Internet users in the country are suffering as access lines of ISPs remained snapped since Monday.

The ISP officials hoped that the MOPT would now ask the BTTB to immediately restore access lines of ISPs which have deposited their renewal fees. BTTB snapped access lines of 59 ISPs as they failed to renew their licenses in time

The sources alleged that BTTB mistakenly snapped 150 access lines of Information Services Limited (ISN), a leading ISP, although its licence was valid. When the issue was raised to MOPT, it asked BTTB to restore the

Snapping of its lines caused huge loss to ISN and created mistrust with its subscribers, an official of the company told The Daily Star. "There is no way out but to go for legal action against the MOPT and the BTTB for compensa-

tion," the official said seeking anonymity.

In spite of the current low rate of HIV infection in Bangladesh, unsafe sexual practices still leave the country exposed to various Sexually Transmitted Diseases (STD) including AIDS caused by HIV, says a study by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare.

Results obtained by the third round of HIV surveillance in Bangladesh however showed that in central Bangladesh, HIV infection

users is 1.7 per cent, among sex workers about 0.5 per cent and among homosexual men 0.2 per cent, which are extraordinarily low by South Asian as well as global
