

Asiatic Society team calls on President

Donors urged to help implement urban development project

Housing and Public Works Minister Mirza Abbas yesterday laid emphasis on development of a strategy for urban management to find out ways of dealing with urban problems with minimum resources.

A planned strategy for urban management is necessary to find out the problems and to solve them with minimum resources in shortest possible time," he said while addressing a seminar at Hotel Sonargaon on "Local Partnership, Approaches for Urban Development in Bangladesh: SINPA Bangladesh and other Experiences."

Lauding initiatives by the Netherlands government to launch "Support for the Implementation of National Plans of Action (SINPA), an action research project, the minister hoped that with the technical support of Institute of Housing and Urban Development Studies (HIS) and Rehabilitation and Development Organisation for Landless (RADOL), the SINPA will develop an innovative strategy to address the

urban problems.

The minister sought cooperation of foreign donors and international financial institution to extend their support in implementing the urban development projects.

Chaired by Housing and Public Works Secretary Syed Tanveer Hussain the seminar was addressed by Ambassador of the Netherlands JL Ijzermans, team leader of SINPA Hans Teerlink, SINPA Project Director Forbes Davidson and National Coordinator, SINPA and Secretary General of RADOL Syed H Loton.

The minister said Bangladesh is a densely populated country and the city life is getting miserable and unfit for human habitation.

One of the main reasons identified is that all the government and local government efforts are like a provider, he said. People's affordability and initiatives are ignored, the minister said, adding there is no coordination and cooperation among the development partners.

Abbas said an urban platform and various task forces were es-

tablished with the representatives of all stakeholders and elected representatives at the city level to ensure coordination and partnership.

JL Ijzermans said the Netherlands was among the first countries to recognise Bangladesh after its turbulent emergence as an independent state.

Ever since it has been involved as a development partner, and currently Bangladesh figures prominently on the list of some 20 countries that have structural bilateral development relations with the Netherlands, he said.

Ijzermans pointed out that over the years, the support from the Netherlands has exceeded three billion Netherlands guilders or six thousand crore taka.

He said the Netherlands has keen interest in issues of urbanisation and has developed internationally recognised knowledge centres on urbanisation based on the issues and problems generated by this high urbanisation especially in the western countries and realising the challenges facing developing countries as Bangladesh.

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
