Ruling party yet to create atmosphere for joining JS: AL

Deputy Leader of the Opposition in Parliament Abdul Hamid has said his party is keen to take part in parliament proceedings from its next session, but the ruling party's attitude is still unfavourable

"Although we are for joining parliament sittings from the second session, the ruling party is yet to create a congenial atmosphere for this as they feel comfortable in the House without the main opposition party," he thought.

The immediate past Speaker was briefing newsmen at an Iftar party hosted by him at the Sangsad Bhaban yesterday.

'We will continue to protest both in the House and in the streets repression by the ruling party as people have voted us to speak on the floor," he said. But the BNP-led ruling coalition has already created a situation so that 'we cannot get into the House.

Quoting from speeches of Prime Minister Khaleda Zia and her cabinet colleague Abdul Manna Bhuiyan in the House on the proposed ban on hartal and student politics, the Deputy Leader of the Opposition said these clearly indicated a design to infringe on people's democratic

He also referred to 'post election atrocities' on opposition activists and the minority community, harassment of opposition leaders by filing 'baseless' corruption cases, 'unabated' looting, rape and murders across the country by 'ruling party activists.

Women's seat in JS

However, the previous provision of choosing 30 women MPs through voting by the 300 directly elected lawmakers, a provision that virtually made women lawmakers a choice of the treasury bench, is still being favoured by most. A section of the government leaders insist on doubling the number of female MPs while others are opposed to the idea as the House, currently having a sitting arrangement for 358, cannot accommodate that many women

But, the number of women lawmakers is so far not a big issue. And most of the policy planners are unanimous about restoration of the previous system of indirectly electing women lawmakers apparently to have the entire quota at their disposal. They argue that direct election of women MPs would be a kind of general election, involving huge expenditures, and 'not practical' under the existing socio-economic and political realities.

The second option is that all the parties represented in the parliament will share the women's quota of 30 or more seats according to their respective strength. This will enable the main opposition party, AL, and the second largest one, Jatiya Party, to have a share of the the ruling coalition of a small portion of the quota.

The third arrangement being discussed by a section of the government leaders involves a radical change in both the number and the mode of election of the women MPs. It suggests that either geographical territories or the country's population determine the constituencies of women lawmakers and that such MPs be elected through a popular Nonetheless, chances are bleak

for the last two options, especially the third one, to be incorporated in the planned bill for the women's seats in the House The BNP in its election manifesto

"The planned bill may also provide for direct election of the women lawmakers and an increase in their number only to come into force from the next parliament," he

The issue of women's share in parliament gathered political debates during the tenure of the last AL government when the constitutional provision on the issue was about to lapse. Different political parties and women organisations came up with a wide range of suggestions. Direct election of such MPs and an increase in their number featured high in public debates and discussions at that time. The leading women bodies took to the streets to press their demand for direct election of the women lawmakers by raising their number to 64. one from each district. The AL government also had a

series of consultations with the agitating women activists who had their views incorporated in the parliamentary standing committee report on the bill introduced in the last parliament. However, such views did not get a place in the provision of the bill although the government agreed to accommodate any suggestions once the opposition had supported its move. But the opposition's reluctance about the crucial women issue had frustrated the government initiative to keep the women's quota in parlia-

ment alive. The AL bill requiring constitutional amendments fell flat due to lack of supports from the then BNPled opposition that was in a continuous boycott of the proceedings. causing a shortage of two-thirds members in the House, a strength needed to pass a bill of such a kind. Despite appeals from the women rights organisations, the BNP refused to help pass the ALsponsored bill, arguing that the opposition was not consulted with on the content of the bill. For a reminder, the past government kept the bill pending for more than a year in abortive bids to get support and incorporate views of the opposition.

terrorists have been killed.' Indian Vice-president Krishan Kant narrowly escaped being killed during the attack, a ruling party spokesman said.

A spokesman for the Hindu nationalist BJP party, V.K. Malhotra, said one of the gunmen who stormed the parliament complex managed to shoot through an open gate at an office inside the building where Kant was working.

"He ... managed to fire at the door of the vice president's office before he was shot down." he said. Before he died the gunman killed a parliamentary official named as

Jagdish Prasad Yadav. "Had it not been for Yadav who chased him he would have probably managed to enter the office and the vice president would have been killed," Malhotra said.

The gate was open as Kant was about to leave his office to go home. If he had left a couple of minutes earlier he would have been caught in the crossfire, officials said.

Police found explosives in the militants' car and in the turquoise knapsacks the young, cleanshaven, black-haired gunmen slung over their backs as they raced up the steps of the Parliament building firing their assaults rifles with one

Officials at nearby Ram Manohar Lohia hospital said 17 people 12 policemen and five civilians, were being treated for injuries, including six in critical condition.

After three hours, when the Parliament members had been evacuated, police found and set off a remaining bomb in a controlled explosion. Police said several grenades were also defused.

In what is being called the worst breach of government security since the assassination of prime minister Indira Gandhi in 1984, Police Chief, Ajai Raj Sharma, said six police officers and an army commando had been killed when the intruders first opened fire.

Videotape obtained by Associated Press Television News showed the body of the suicide bomber, without arms or legs, laying on a sunlit walkway in front of the sandstone building. The tape showed his five comrades, dressed in green sweaters, race toward the building, then back again behind a wall in the surrounding park, firing their rifles as they where shot by

The gunmen had driven through one of the Parliament complex's 12 gates in a white, Indian-made Ambassador car, of the kind used by government officials, said Doordarshan, A siren on the car was wailing and official stickers from Parliament and the Home Ministry were affixed to the windshield, the report said.

Indian Prime Minister Atal Behar Vajpayee later in a televised address to the nation, pledged to fight a "do or die battle" against terrorism following the attack.

"This was not just an attack on the building, it was a warning to the entire nation," he said.

"For the past two decades, we have been fighting terrorism, now the battle has reached its final phase," he said. "The fight has now

reached a decisive stage. It will be a do or die battle," Vajpayee added "We accept the challenge and we will blunt every attack." Parliament had just adjourned

agency reported that Vajpayee was just leaving when the attack occurred. Home Minister Lal K Advani said all lawmakers were

Journalists who were inside the building said there were bullet holes on the doorways inside. Bodies were laying on the lawns

and sidewalks near the gate as ambulances rushed to the scene. A television cameraman was also shot, and private Star News said police were firing indiscriminately including at journalists. Some started shouting, "terror-

ists, terrorists," said lawmaker Khara Bela Sain, I couldn't under-

Some of the gunmen were in civilian dress. "After three or four minutes of firing they started throwing grenades," and at least four exploded, Swain said. "I started to run to save my life." Hundreds of rounds were fired as police hid behind cards, trees and the corners of the building. The dramatic standoff was broadcast live on most television stations.

Advani had warned last week that a Bombay man had been arrested on October 2 and told police that he had trained under al-Qaida, he said the terrorism network had planned to attack Britain. Australia and the Indian parliament.
