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Cold wave claims 7 in **Panchagarh**

At least seven elderly people died in severe cold, sweeping the district since Thursday.

There is no weather office here, by an NGO says the mercury oscillates between 9 and 7 degrees Celsius.

The victims are Veua, 70, of Boda, Bewa, 90, of Balavir, Phuljan, 75, of Jharbaripara, Budu Mohammad, 70, of Dangapara, Samatu, 80, of Islampur, Bidraha, 80 and Yusuf Ali, 85, of Brahmatal.

Deputy Commissioner Aftab Hasan denied any death from cold. No winter clothes have so far been distributed among the poor and destitutes. The district administration has sent a fax message to the Relief Ministry requesting immediate supply of 10,000 rugs and 20,000 warm clothes for distribution among the poor.

Inhabitants of this district close to the Himalayas have been experiencing a mild cold wave since Thursday with the intensity rising

Indo-Pak troops trade fire along Kashmir border

Indian and Pakistani troops traded fire over their disputed Kashmir border yesterday, a Pakistani military spokesman

The two neighbours also exchanged fire Wednesday, in the first such incident after New Delhi accused Islamabad of instigating last week's attack on the Indian parliament.

'There have been some mortar shells and artillery fire across the


Line of Control and the Siachen border from the Indian troops," a Pakistani military spokesman told AFP.

"Pakistan troops retaliated, causing damage to the Indian bunkers," he added.

Tension has mounted between the nuclear-armed rivals since December 13 when the Indian parliament was attacked by five suicide gunmen. India says the attackers were Pakistani citizens from two militant outfits battling

India announced Friday it was withdrawing its ambassador from Islamabad and closing cross-border transport links in a bid to pressure Pakistan into cracking down on the militant

During a visit to China yesterday, Pakistani President Pervez Musharraf slammed India's "very arrogant and knee-jerk' response, but said his government would not retaliate. SEE PAGE 11 COL 4

Hamid Karzai was sworn in as prime minister of Afghanistan's new interim government yesterday amid hopes he can help heal a nation torn apart by decades of war. Karzai signed the oath of office

before Chief Justice Mohammed Qasim in the country's first peaceful transfer of power in decades. He then embraced outgoing President Burhanuddin Rabbani to applause from foreign diplomats and tribal leaders who swarmed to the capital. Kabul, from every province

The miscreants also damaged valuables worth about Tk 50 lakh during the rampage that lasted for over three hours.

The country's textile entrepreneurs have taken a move to file an antidumping suit against the Indian textile industry for selling their products in Bangladesh at throwaway prices.

The Bangladesh Textile Mills Association (BTMA), the apex body of the country's textile entrepreneurs, has taken the decision in the face of an uneven competition against the Indian products.

According to local industry sources, India is selling yarn (30s counts) to Bangladesh at US\$1.80 to US\$1.90 per Kg while the freight on board (FOB) price of the same in the international market is US\$2.50. On the other hand, local spinning Kg, BTMA officials said. "In the face of unethical practices

Move to file anti-dumping suit

by the Indian textile industry, we have been left with no other option but to go for anti-dumping suit," A Matin Chowdhury, chairman of BTMA, told The Daily Star yester-

Local industry sources said the Indian textile industry is dumping products in Bangladesh at lower than production cost with the aim to 'capture the market and ruin the local industry'.

As a result, many local textile units are unable to sell their yarn. The BTMA said at least 25 per cent of the total industry production of 400 million Kg yarn has been stock-

Bangladesh imports about 15 per cent of its readymade garment (RMG) fabric requirement from

Matin Chowdhury said many Indian textile units have been doing such dumping for the last few months. "But now, it has crossed all limits. We are discussing the issue with legal experts before formally filing the suit. It could take a month or more to go for legal action." Matin Chowdhury said, hoping active support from the government.

The country's leading economists cautioned that the textile entrepreneurs have to be very care
