Two persons were shot dead when a gang of terrorists opened fire on villagers at village Shakharidah under Horinakunda upazila on

The dead were identified as Saheb Ali, 17, and Alamgir, 20.

Police and witnesses said a gang of 16 terrorists went to the village in search of Shariful Islam Khokan, leader of an outlawed party at about 8 pm.

As the villagers tried to resist the attackers, they opened fire, leaving Saheb Ali dead on the spot and Alamgir injured.

Alamgir succumbed to bullet injuries on way to Dhaka.

Police yesterday arrested one person, identified as Babul, for his alleged involvement in the incident

He said a section of media have published misleading reports involving him with alleged snatching of auction documents.

Pintu said he had gone to see the Receiver's office after a section of prospective bidders had complained to him that there had been some irregularities in the selling of bid documents.

Meanwhile, Md. Jahangir Alam Khan, receiver of the Bankruptcy Court, when contacted yesterday termed Pintu's statement 'absolutely false'. He said the BNP lawmaker and his accomplices came to his office at about 4:15 p.m. and

tried to grab bidding documents. Khan also alleged said Pintu and his accomplices had misbehaved with him and threatened him.

Asulia lake on the outskirts of the city is a popular recreation spot. People in their thousands flock there particularly in the wet season for a cruise in the vast

Addressing the rally BPA leaders said, to have clean and safe environment is part of human rights.

They leaders demanded a halt to encroachment of Asulia lake, immediate eviction of encroachers and their

They called for building a movement to save the lake. Prof Abdullah Abu Syed of Bishwa Sahitta Kendra termed the Asulia lake a blessing of god for the city dwellers. People go there with families for a respite from the polluted air and a breath in fresh air, he said

He said encroachers are grabbing Asulia lake; rivers like Burigonga, Turag and Kornafuli and others water bodies violating law but the government is doing nothing

There is a law prohibiting filling of any water body, but it is not being enforced, he said.

He urged the local people to join the movement to save the Asulia lake

He blamed RAJUK authorities for not taking necessary steps to save the Asulia lake from encroachers.

Noted economist Dr Atiar Rahman said vested quarters are grabbing public property in connivance with some unscrupulous government officials. He urged all political parties to come forward to

'Polybags to go by Feb next'



The government decision to slap ban on polythene bags in the city has plunged the businessmen into anxiety with huge polybags stockpiled in STAFF CORRESPONDENT

The government will do everything possible to ban thin polythene shopping bags in the capital from the first day of the coming year and in other parts of the country in the next two months. Environment and Forest Minister Shahjahan Siraj said yesterday.

"We also plan to launch a similar drive against emission of black smoke by motor vehicles from February (2002) to free the capital from environmental pollution," he told a press conference at the PID conference room of the National Secretariat.

Initially, the government would go on an extensive campaign spotlighting the environmental disaster caused by polythene bags and persuading the people to dispense with such harmful bags, the minister

To this end, his ministry would send teams to the city markets in a couple of days and sponsor media campaigns highlighting the harms by polythene bags and urging the people to use environment-friendly shopping bags made of jute, cloth, paper etc, he further said.

"We won't hesitate to enforce the existing environment preservation law for execution of the ban on polythene bags once our motivation campaign fails," the minister said.

Oil prices up from today

BPC move evokes questions

The government has decided to increase prices of petroleum products to huge proportions although oil prices in the international market have remained US\$5 to \$6 lower than the 1997 hike.

From today the petroleum prices will shoot up to significant proportions, as per a proposal by the Bangladesh Petroleum Corporation (BPC) -- which argued that otherwise, it would continue to incur losses.

Such a decision is being made in a context where the BPC incurs a loss of about Tk 400 crore due to the government's contradictory oil import tariff structure. The BPC pays the government over Tk 2,000 crore as oil import tariff, since the import tariff is as high as 70 per cent. To make things worse, the BPC has plunged into financial management problems, sources said.

The per litre octane will be sold at Tk 30, petrol at Tk 28 and diesel and kerosene at Tk 17 instead of the existing rates of Tk 25, Tk 23 and Tk 15.55 respectively. The price of jet fuel (JP-1) will increase by Tk 4 per litre and furnished oil hundred per cent fixing it at Tk 23 and

This hike would set a chain reaction in the country's economy as transport costs and even the power generation cost would be directly affected. With the increase in transport costs, the price of commodities will also

Oblivious to the impact on the economy, the government argues that the prices of petroleum products in neighbouring India, Sri Lanka and Pakistan have been increased. If the domestic petroleum prices were not increased, these would be smuggled out from Bangladesh. In the past, the government harped on the

same cause while hiking petroleum prices. The BPC has been incurring a loss of around Tk 400 crore annually since 1997 when crude oil price in the international market shot up from around 17-18 dollars

to 25-26 dollars per barrel, the government argues. However, for over a year, the price of crude had remained around 19 dollars to 22 dollars. Earlier, oil prices dipped to a record eight to ten dollars for some
