The first centre of Planet IQ was set up in Kolkata in 1997 and now there are 13 centres in four Indian cities. Six more centres will be set up before long in Dhaka.

Sources said the illegal practices have become a source of income for police as well as many corrupt employees and officials of BRTA. "In fact, every unauthorised

vehicle plying the city streets is regularly paying the law-enforcers for plying the roads. A section of government officials benefit from this illegality," said a source. There are 1,400 BRTA-

registered two-stroke tempos in the city. But in fact, about 2,000 more are operating in the city without any valid document whatsoever.

The government is now trying to phase out old vehicles from the city, considering severe environmental impact. But it would be impossible until there is any strict implementation of the decisions made at higher levels, the sources said

About two-stroke autorickshaws, the BRTA record shows that the BRTA has issued 39,000 permits to auto-rickshaws since 1960. In fact, there are an estimated 50.000 additional auto-rickshaws operating in the city.

A sergeant of the Traffic Department told The Daily Star that 99 per cent of driving licences, road permits and other documents of the auto-rickshaws are counterfeit. Every time the sergeant stops such a three-wheeler, the driver has two choices bribing the officer or getting a ticket and paying fines later.

"The illegally operating babytaxis(auto-rickshaws) go to the police station and the owner makes a declaration that he had lost his documents. Police acknowledge the declaration on a piece of paper and that very paper becomes a document for the owner," said a police source.

Fears of a last-minute cancellation of the summit also weakened after leaders of India and Pakistan said this week that they were looking forward to attending the summit.

Reuters adds: It was supposed to boost South Asia's shaky sense of community and help bring India and Pakistan closer together, but there are now doubts if next week's summit of regional leaders can go ahead.

Some analysts say if the summit does go ahead, it is likely to be overshadowed by the dispute between New Delhi and Islamabad, although they add it could provide a chance to defuse the tension.

"Let us hope the summit will somehow contribute to the lessening of tensions." a former Pakistani foreign secretary, Tanvir Ahmed Khan, told the news agency.

Pakistan savs it remains open for talks, but India has already called off a planned one-on-one meeting between Prime Minister Atal Behari Vajpayee and Musharraf on the delines of the Kathmandu meeting.

A former Indian foreign secretary S K Singh told Reuters he believed India and Pakistan could push aside their bilateral dispute for the summit but added the terrorism dogging most of the group's members could be a key topic.

"All of us, one way or the other. are unfortunately plagued by this horrendous thing." he said.


