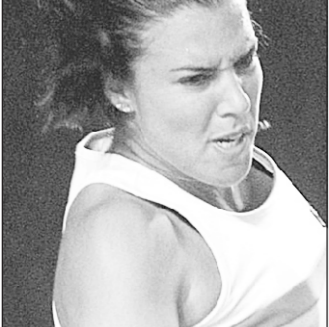

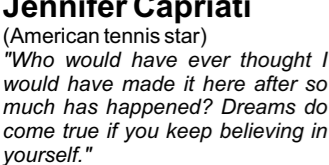

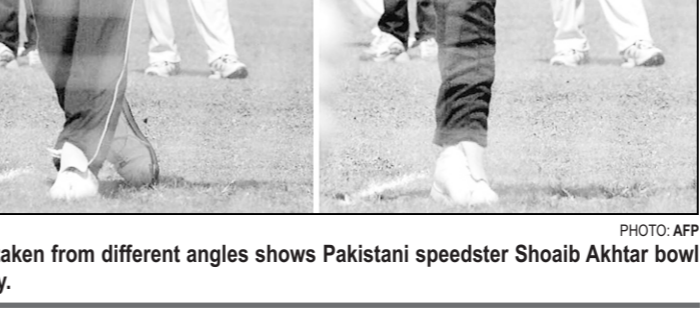

Handle with care

Young paceman Mashrafe-bin-Mortuza's prospect of playing in the first Test against Pakistan hangs in the balance as he faces a fitness test on January 6.
The 19-year-old, after suffering a back injury during the New Zealand tour last month, has been advised to go on a complete rest immediately after Bangladesh returned home on Tuesday night.
Considered as the fastest bowler of the country, Mashrafe, who is now resting at his hometown Narail, will return to the city on Sunday to go through a fitness test under national team physio John Gloster.
"He tore a back muscle which needs some time to be healed. I am not very sure whether he can recover in time to be considered for the match. I'm not going to take any chances," said Gloster while talking to this correspondent during a reception in honour of the Pakistan team at the Pakistan High Commission in the evening.
"You see, it was too early for Mashrafe to play international cricket. It would have been better had he played in two more domestic seasons before walking into the senior team.
"He needs more time to get physically fit for Test cricket," said the Australian.
Meanwhile, chief selector Mainul Haq in the morning said that they were still keen to play the young right-arm seamer against Pakistan in Dhaka and later send him to New Zealand for the World Youth Cup.
"I don't know how serious his injury is. Neither have I talked to him nor I got the report from the physio. Let me talk to them first before making a decision," said Mainul to a group of reporters at the Bangabandhu National Stadium.
The chief selector also revealed that he would name the Test squad on January 7 and announce the Bangladesh A team, which will take part in the Busta Cup in West Indies later this month, shortly afterwards.
But observers believe that Mashrafe's injury is picked to over-bowling since being due for the A

team's tour of India in October.
Besides, his captains have always tried to get the dividends of his pace when others should have shared his burden.
"I still can remember Andy Robert telling him (Mashrafe) not to bowl more than six overs at a time even if the Board president himself

said so. But what a pity he has been overworked," said coach of the Bangladesh Under-19 team Jalal Ahmed Chowdhury.
"Definitely Bangladesh is blessed to have such a talent. So, the message should be 'Handle him with care'."

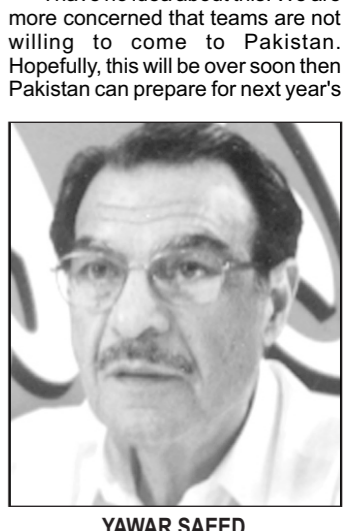

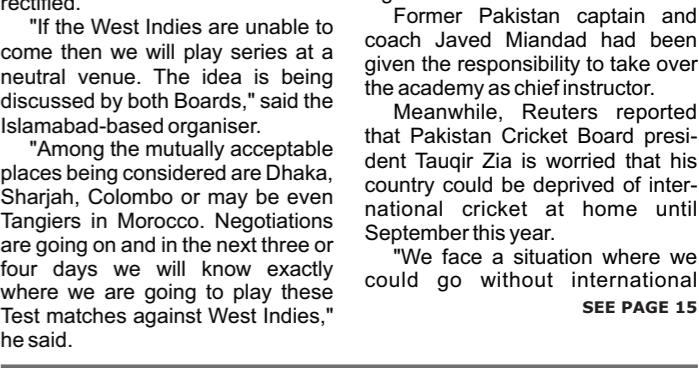
Pakistan manager Yawar Saeed considers the refusal by West Indies to tour Pakistan later this month as yet another setback for the game in his country.
The West Indies Cricket Board (WICB) does not want to allow the national team tour from January 25 after expressing fears over Indo-Pak tensions. Last year New Zealand and Sri Lanka called off visits following the September 11 attacks on the United States and military action in Afghanistan.
In light of the current situation, the son of former Pakistan cricket captain Mian Mohammed Saeed, has called for cooperation from the international cricket community to prevent it from sliding into a prolonged isolation.
"It is very sad that we are not playing cricket as per the programme which was agreed earlier," said Saeed who spent two years in Rangpur, Thakurgaon and Kustia in the sixties while working for the British American Tobacco company.
Despite the gloomy picture, Saeed told The Daily Star Sport at Bangabandhu National Stadium on Thursday that things can still be rectified.
"If the West Indies are unable to come then we will play series at a neutral venue. The idea is being discussed by both Boards," said the Islamabad-based organiser.
"Among the mutually acceptable places being considered are Dhaka, Sharjah, Colombo or may be even Tangiers in Morocco. Negotiations are going on and in the next three or four days we will know exactly where we are going to play these Test matches against West Indies," he said.

Changing the subject, the Pakistan manager refused to speculate the reasons for some teams wanting to visit neighbours India in these tense times.
"I have no idea about this. We are more concerned that teams are not willing to come to Pakistan. Hopefully, this will be over soon then Pakistan can prepare for next year's

World Cup.
"One can only prepare for such a big event by playing international cricket," added the former director of PCB.
He also revealed that Pakistan will produce more exciting cricketers in the future as the National Cricket Academy will begin functioning from next March.
Former Pakistan captain and coach Javed Miandad had been given the responsibility to take over the academy as chief instructor.
Meanwhile, Reuters reported that Pakistan Cricket Board president Tauqir Zia is worried that his country could be deprived of international cricket at home until September this year.
"We face a situation where we could go without international
