## Another UK minister due in city Jan 14

Another British minister is arriving in Dhaka on the heels of Prime Minister Tony Blair's just concluded visit to Bangladesh.

Hillary Benn is likely to arrive on January 14 on a four-day official visit. Benn is minister in charge of the Department For International Development (DFID) which oversees British development assistance programmes overseas.

During the trip, seen as a follow-up of the British premier's visit, the sides would work out a strategy for further expansion of investment and economic cooperation between the two countries.

DFID has large operational presence in Bangladesh. Britain funnels a lot of assistance for different programmes through DFID. It gives assistance of nearly Tk six billion in such sectors as poverty alleviation, with special focus on education, health care and infrastructure.

The minister is expected to sign an agreement on Financial Sector Reform in Bangladesh.

British investment in Bangladesh now stands at one billion pounds with some 55 major companies having holdings in the country.

The number of Bangladeshi expatriates in Britain is the highest compared to that in any European country.

## Industrialist murder DB men off to Magura to arrest suspected killer

A team of detectives left the city for Magura yesterday to arrest Dulal, brother of Farida, arrested in connection the killing of industrialist Alam and his three housemaids.

The team took along another brother of Farida, Yusuf, whose statement was recorded in the court on Sunday.

Following information provided by Farida, police recovered some bloodstained clothes from the house of Dulal on Sunday.

Sources in the investigation team confirmed Dulal's involvement in the gruesome killing. "The team was sent to Magura as we came to know that Dulal went into hiding in his village in Magura after the murders," said an official.

Unidentified miscreants slaughtered industrialist Alam and three of his maidservants, Rahima, Sakhina and Kamala, in his New Jurain residence on the night of January 2.

## 3 acid burnt in Khulna, Madaripur

A couple suffered serious burn injuries in an acid attack at Talimpur in Rupsha upazila on Sunday night.

Police said three unidentified youths hurled acid at Montu Kumar Dutta, 27, a day-labourer of a match factory, and his wife Jotsna Rani Datta, 22, in their house at about 11 pm.

The terrorists ran away as local people rushed to the house hearing screams of the victims. Previous enmity was thought to be the reason behind the heinous attack.

The victims were being treated at General Hospital.

BSS from Madaripur adds: Moina Begum, 32, a housewife, received serious burn injuries when her husband allegedly threw acid on her body in a remote village of the district on Thursday night.

Police said Moina, daughter of day-labourer Hafiz of Takerhat village under Rajoir upazila, became victim of acid attack by her husband following a family feud.

# Indian anti-dumping duty comes into force

India imposed anti-dumping duty on the country's lead acid battery export on January 1 ignoring repeated requests from Bangladesh to consider the issue.

Bangladeshi battery used to enjoy preferential tariff facility under the South Asian Preferential Trading Agreement (SAPTA).

The duty is likely to see an end to battery export to the next door neighbour as Indian importers now will have to pay as high as 131 per cent duty on the item from Bangladesh," said a local battery manufacturer.

Generally, battery import duty in India is 64.21 per cent, but under the preferential arrangement, the importers were paying 38.33 per cent duty, he said.

Indian authorities imposed anti-dumping duty at a rate of US\$2.53 per kg on Bangladeshi batteries, which weigh between 7kg and 30kg a piece. Last year, 61,203 pieces of batteries worth \$ 1,306,344 were exported to India,

which was only 0.63 per cent of the total Indian market share, exporters said.

Despite the government's requests, the Indian authorities took the decision based on fabricated figures and information on exports during January to September 2000, according to sources.

"According to Indian authorities, the country exported 275,480 pieces of batteries worth \$610,228 during the period while according to the Export Promotion Bureau, the actual export was 37,399 units worth \$728,325," said the manufacturer.

Commerce Minister Amir Khosru Mahmud Chowdhury on November 29 last year requested his Indian counterpart Murasoli Maran to drop anti-dumping case against lead acid battery exports from Bangladesh and resolve the issue under the provisions of SAPTA. But ignoring the request, India finally issued a notification imposing the duty on December 7 last year.

The Indian authority alleged Bangladeshi battery exporters had not cooperated with the anti-dumping investigation requirements. But

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## Police lack device to trace reckless highway drivers

Due to lack of vehicles and device to determine over-speeding, the traffic wing of police is unable to prosecute a driver of passenger bus for reckless driving, resulting in accidents like the one on Dhaka-Aricha highway at Salepur yesterday.

As the law enforcers remain handicapped, there is a rise in the number of road accidents in the country, causing loss of so many lives. In less than two weeks, at least 66 people were killed in two bus

accidents and many were injured.

Traffic police sources admitted that police "never" prosecute any passenger bus driver for reckless driving or over speeding. But they said that due to lack of infrastructure support, they remain inactive as regards over speeding passenger buses.

"We do not have any vehicle to chase a reckless driver for over speeding," said a senior official of traffic wing of DMP. "We cannot also prosecute a reckless driver because we are not equipped with required tools like speedometer for scientific evidence of over speeding. And We

have never been told to check whether a vehicle is over speeding or not."

He also said, "We have no way to determine if a driver is driving under the influence of alcohol or any other drugs because we do not have any drug tester."

Another official said there is no record that a bus driver has been fined or prosecuted for reckless driving. "A driver is prosecuted, fined and even jailed only when an accident kills people. Otherwise, he is never asked to follow the rules."

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## AL set to enforce hartal tomorrow

In protest at the price hike of fuel, the Awami League (AL) will observe a six-hour countrywide hartal tomorrow, as part of a series of agitation programmes beginning on Sunday.

To drum up support for the half-day shutdown beginning at 6.00am, the opposition will bring out a procession from in front of the party's central office this afternoon. The AL is also scheduled to organise demonstration at each of the wards in the capital today.

As part of its four-day agitation programme, the party yesterday staged demonstration at the district headquarters across the country, demanding withdrawal of the hiked fuel prices that pushed the price curve of other essentials up.

Meanwhile, the AL has finalised its hartal strategies and assigned its front organisations to make the hartal a success. It will be the AL-sponsored second hartal against the BNP-led alliance government and the third one since the new government's take-over in October last year.

The first AL-sponsored half-day hartal was called on November 15 in protest at the atrocities on the religious minorities and the AL activists across the country. Before the AL's hartal, left-leaning parties called a half-day hartal in early November, with the AL supporting it.

In late December, the government increased the fuel price.

## Cox's Bazar BCL activist stabbed to death

Armed assailants abducted and stabbed to death a Chhatra League activist here Sunday night, official sources said.

Witnesses said a gang of about seven armed men kidnapped Sujon Barua, 20, from Baidyerkhola area in the evening and took him to a nearby hill.

"The killers tortured him, stabbed him in the chest and back and threw him from the hill," says a spot account of the incident.

Locals took Sujon to hospital where he succumbed to his injuries at 8:30 pm.

Family members of the victim accused the SI of local thana of misbehaving with Sujon's brother after he went to the police station to seek help.

Sub-Inspector Shahjahan, however, admitted that he did so without knowing the actual situation. A case was registered.

Meanwhile, district Chhatra League leaders held a protest rally on Bangabandhu road in the town yesterday and demanded immediate arrest of those involved in the killing. They also demanded action against the SI.

former dean of the Bangladesh Agriculture University for Rangamati and Mamaching Marma, a BNP leader for Bandarban, have been enlisted as chairmen, the sources added.

Another source said former chairman of the Khagrachhari district council Samiran Dewan and former PCJSS leader Saktipada Tripura are also lobbying for the post of chairman.

## Jute mills workers protest sell-off

Several hundred workers of Daulatpur Jute Mills and Star Jute Mills held a demonstration yesterday protesting against the government move to bring the mills under privatisation, and threatened a greater movement from January 15 if the tenders are not cancelled by then.

The government has invited international tenders for selling these two jute mills to private parties as part of its denationalisation programme.

Yesterday was the last day for submission of tenders. It could not be known how many tenders were submitted for purchase of the two mills.

Six of the 15 jute mills under Khulna zone of BJMC have already been privatised; the rest nine will also follow suit, sources said.

These jute mills have become losing concerns of the government due to the huge burden of debt. Production cost is higher than market price, and dull marketing coupled with unbridled corruption in the management for years together have made the jute mills

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## Combing operation Arms, ammunition recovered, 1403 held

Police recovered 12 firearms and 107 rounds of bullet during a 24-hour countrywide combing operation that ended at 6 am yesterday, a police headquarters press release said here yesterday.

Police also arrested 1403 alleged criminals including five identified terrorists from across the country. Of them, 662 people were arrested against warrants, 722 under various investigation charges and 14 in connection with the arms recovery.

The identified terrorists arrested during the drive included Sahmim of Norail, Robi and Kalam of Jessore, Nurul Islam Mondal and Abul Bashar of Chittagong.
