Teenage American star Andy Roddick had to struggle mightily before beating Korean qualifier Lee Hyung-Taik 6-7, 6-3, 7-5 on Thursday to earn a place in the semifinals of the Sydney International tennis tournament.

Roddick, a 19-year-old who is one of the sport's brightest young hopefuls, rose from 160 to 16 in the rankings in 2001, winning three tournaments in his first full year on tour.

The third seed underlined his potential with an impressive comeback against 115th-ranked Lee, whose smooth and accurate groundstrokes were eventually worn down by the American's youthful power.

Lee matched Roddick shot for shot through the first set and the youngster threw his racket to the ground in frustration when he fell 3-6 behind in the tiebreaker.

Roddick gathered his composure, however, and broke for the first time at the start of the second set.

Lee injured his left thigh stretching in the third game of the second set -- and the injury had to be heavily strapped before he re-started. Roddick took the second set but the defiant Lee promptly broke and took a 3-0 lead in the third.

Roddick broke straight back and broke again but Lee refused to concede and got back on serve. Roddick broke again for 6-5 when the Korean spooned a forehand long and then served out for the match

Roddick who won in 43 minutes and dropped only four games against Bohdan Ulihrach on Wednesday, took 1 hour 58 minutes

to complete this dramatic victory. Lee, 26, has not qualified for next week's Australian Open and his only way into the first Grand Slam of the vear would be if a main-draw wild
