

HE enthusiasm that evolved around the recently concluded short film festival is once again certain to re-emerge among the cine-goers. The 7th Dhaka International Film Festival, organised by Rainbow Film Society, is scheduled to kick off at the auditorium of Central Public Library at 4 o'clock this afternoon. Exhibition of local and foreign films will also take place at Goethe Institut, Indian High Commission Cultural Center, Russian Cultural Center and at five other public cinema halls in the city. This year's festival theme reads, 'Cinema: Endorsement of Values'.

Justice Habibur Rahman, a former Chief Advisor of Care-taker Government, is expected to attend the ceremony as Chief Guest. Kishwar Kamal of Rainbow Film Society will preside over the session. Marghub Morshed, Secretary to the Ministry of Information will be present as Special Guest.

A number of delegates from different countries have already arrived in the city and rest of the total of 45 renowned film critics and related personalities are on their way to Dhaka to participate in the weeklong extravaganza. Five Seminars, to be held at the Liberation War Museum at 3 p.m. daily from January 21 till 25, would focus on various aspects and issues of cinema and video technology, trend of Bangladeshi and Asian cinema, genocide and repression on women during our War of Liberation and so on. Local and foreign guests would act as discussants in

This year's festival is expected to feature at least 100 films from Australia, Iran, India, Japan, Sri Lanka, Egypt, Germany, Britain, United States, Croatia, Latvia,

Switzerland, France, Russia, Hungary, Rwanda, Bhutan and Bangladesh. The films comprise of a variety of themes, broadly divided into 7 categories those of World, Asian Community, Children's', Retrospective, Tribute, Genocide and Focus. Most of the films to be exhibited in the festival

have reached the city with a few

more to arrive within a day or two.

A special session on genociderelated films from various corners of the globe would be a highlight. US, French, German and Bangladeshi filmmakers are to present their production on mass murder and war crime and reveal the past harrowing tales of cruelty and injustice done to the people of these countries

It would be a huge assemblage of films yet one could remain certain of the fact that some outstanding presentations by renowned filmmakers of Russian, Iranian and French origin would steal the show. Sisters, a Russian story of two

Renowned French director Jean-Luc Godard would be among the viewers through several of his films some of which include AlphaVille, Little Soldier, Betty, Death is my Trade among other retrospectives

In the highly interesting synopsis of AlphaVille, Lemmy Caution is sent on a mission to meet and set free Professor Von Braun and if he refuses to kill him. Computer-run humans inhabit AlphaVille, the city of future. A Technological tyranny is on the throne of dominance and words like 'I Love You' is strictly prohibited there.

Indian films of recent appraisal include Lagaan, Zubeidaa, Asoka, all of Hindi origin while Bengali filmmakers Buddhodev Das Gupta and Rituparna Ghosh are to present their production of Uttara and Bariwali. Around 18 films of different types from India

Jesus Goes to India, a highly

acclaimed production from Switzerland would find place in the festival directed by Indian-born Swiss filmmaker Preeti Chandrakant. From Briarwood to Barishal to Brick Lane, a docufilm done by Sanchita Islam, a British-Bengali videographer-cumpainter, would also be shown besides 10 superb entries from Iran, directed by renowned Iranian film personalities Mohsen Makhmalbaf and Jafar Panahi, a former assistant to Abbas Kiorostami. The White Balloon. a much-talked film by Panahi is a

notable entry from Iran.

Among the genocide-based cinemas. 100 Davs is a significant number that has been jointly made by UK and Rwanda showing the barbarism that took place in the Rwanda during recent wars in the



Poet Shamsur Rahman speaks at the inauguration ceremony


and compact disk of classical songs composed and sung by Kafil Ahmed, at the 'Naatmondol' of Dhaka University on January 17.

S part of Nrityanchal Festival-2002, Nrityanchal dedicated an evening to the world class actor and cultural personality Soumitra Chattapadhaya of West Bengal to show him heartfelt regard and honour through a reception held at Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy auditorium.

The evening opened with screening of some film clippings like Aupur Songsar, Saatpakev Bandha. Monihar, Parmitar Ekdin, Lathi -- a number of remarkable films which Soumitra acted in and left a lasting impression on the audience's mind.

Shamim Ara Nipa, one of the founding organisers of Nrityanchal, greeted this actor of legendary stature with flower bouquet on the stage. Muhammad Jahangir. Nrityanchal Coordinator, received the silver screen hero with a crest accompanied by huge applause in the audience gallery. Another founding organiser of Nrityanchal, Shibli Mohammad followed next to honour him with a gift. During these formalities in an informal mood of atmosphere, all the admirers and audience as a whole, poured their adoration in silence. While handing over the crest to Soumitra, Jahangir said, "We, on this occasion, would like to honour this extraordinary actor on behalf of all the cultural activists of the country."

Several cultural bodies of the country availed an opportunity to shower their tributes to this giant figure of the sub-continent's cultural arena. Golam Kuddus of Sammilita Sangskiti Jote; M. Hamid of Group Theatre Federation; Prabir Sirker of Udichi; Anwar Hossain Pintu of Satyajit Charcha Kendra in Chittagong; and many more paid their tributes on behalf of their respective organisations.

Soumitra launched a commemorative book published to mark the occasion.

In a brief complimentary note, country's noted TV and film personality Golam Mostafa remarked, "I envy Soumitra Chattapadhaya for reaching such a height of excellence as an actor. He has avail himself of opportunities to have worked with almost all the front ranking film directors of the 20th century. On the other hand, I am proud of him as he is a Bangalee actor and I myself too am a Bangalee.'

A warm love, honour, enthusiasm and compliment poured by his Bangladeshi admirers on the occasion, it was evident, emotionally stirred him. Soumitra was so gladdened that he could hardly express himself when invited to make a response to the reception evening which the organisers termed as 'Soumitra Evening.'

Though emotionally imbibed, a composed Soumitra raised to the dais and spoke, "Very naturally, I am taken by overwhelming honour and warmth of your heart. It is pretty difficult to put myself under restraint having been accorded such warm and hearty tributes. I have received many things from you for last couple of days. My noblest gift is to get recognition from those whom I act for. But I feel indented to the regards you have shown to me. I have ardently been longing to serve the humanity since my childhood. I will be making my best efforts to give

you pleasure as long as my physique and mind permit me and thus I'll try to lessen my indebtedness."

What enthralled the audience most was perhaps Soumitra's powerfully impressive solo poetry recital. Recital opened with 'Banalata Sen' -- a very popular romantic poem by Jibanananda Das. The audience got swept away with reverberation of a powerful manly vocal of the performer to the world of a tranquil nature which evolves around a peace giving beloved depicted in the piece. Soumitra went performing a couple sonnets from Rupashi Bangla, last being Aabar Aashiba Fire .. Dhanshiritir Teerey in which the poet eloquently glorifies the universal beauty of riverine Bengal that he can not part with.
