

Autorickshaw strike called off

Dhaka Autotempo, Autorickshaw and Autotruck Malik Sramik Oikya Parishad has called off its strike, said a press release of the communications ministry last night.

It said Convenor of the Parishad Nasir Ahmed Khan and member secretary Mokhlesur Rahman announced the withdrawal of the strike after a 'fruitful meeting' with the government, chaired by Communications Minister Nazmul Huda at his ministry.

State Minister for Communications Salahuddin Ahmed, Communications Secretary Syed Rezaul Hayat and other leaders of the Parishad were present in the meeting.

Huda called upon the leaders and workers of the Parishad to help implement the steps taken by the government to keep the capital free from air pollution and traffic jam.

The communications minister assured the transport owners and workers of extending necessary assistance to them for their rehabilitation.

Meanwhile, BNP-backed teachers of the university have expressed their dissatisfaction at the appointment.

Some of them, preferring anonymity, said the government has appointed a pro-Jamaat teacher as Vice-chancellor of the university.

'We cannot rely on him for a neutral role to end CU stand off,' they said.

Aedes, Culex breeding fast in 30 city wards

The breeding of Aedes and Culex mosquitoes has been increasing in an alarming rate in 30 out of 90 wards of Dhaka City Corporation (DCC).

This was revealed in a report prepared after a six-month field level study conducted by the DCC under its surveillance project on Aedes mosquito control.

The report was discussed at a seminar on the prevalence of Aedes mosquito in the city held at the Nagar Bhaban auditorium yesterday.

The seminar was presided over by Chief Executive officer of DCC, AZM Shafiqul Islam.

It was participated by secretary, chief health officer, consultant of Aedes mosquito control surveillance project and others concerned with the project.

Scientists at World Economic Forum paint a grim future

Scientists at the World Economic Forum predicted on Friday a grim future replete with unprecedented biological threats, global warming and the possible takeover of humans by robots.

"Extreme pessimism seems to me to be the only rational stance," said Sir Martin Rees, Britain's Astronomer Royal, at a session devoted to the future threats and opportunities presented by scientific advances.

He was especially concerned about the development of new biological weapons that could easily fall into the hands of dissonant groups or individuals and cause widespread devastation.

Even if governments tried to regulate and limit the spread of dangerous technologies, Rees said such efforts would probably be little better than current attempts to control the international drugs trade.

Aforetaste of what might lie ahead was provided by the anthrax panic that gripped the United States last year after several letters carrying the deadly germ agent were sent to political leaders and media figures through the mail. The perpetrator has not been found.

The forum, which brings together politicians, business leaders, academics and intellectuals, has presented a number of sessions devoted to science. However, few politicians have attended them, preferring to devote themselves to discussions of foreign policy.

At a session on climate change on Thursday, Robert Watson who chairs an international panel on the issue said the earth's climate would warm by at least 1.4 degrees centigrade in the next century even if urgent action was taken right now to stem emissions of carbon dioxide. If insufficient action was taken, warming could be as great as 5.8 degrees.

He predicted more droughts in some areas and floods in others, more intense cyclones and massive social and economic disruption especially in poor countries.

Peter Wadhams of Cambridge University in England said that while rich nations could and would protect themselves against flooding by building sea defenses, a nation like Bangladesh could expect ever more frequent and severe flood disasters.

Howard Ris, President of the Union of Concerned Scientists, said climate

Bush advisor on Asia quits ahead of trip to region

The top White House advisor on Asia has resigned from his post just weeks before President George W. Bush makes a major trip to the region, US officials said on Friday.

Torkel Patterson, who served as the National Security Council's senior director for Asian affairs for less than one year, left his position "for personal reasons" a week ago, an NSC spokesman said. The spokesman did not elaborate and Patterson was not immediately available for comment.

Although there was some speculation that Patterson might have had a policy falling out with the administration, several of his colleagues said they believed the motivation was indeed personal.

The resignation stunned many officials, especially because it came so close to Bush's planned trip later this month to China, Japan and South Korea.

"This makes planning for the trip a lot more difficult. He was really in charge of that," one senior official said.

James Moriarity, a career foreign service officer with several tours in Beijing who worked under Patterson as the NSC China expert, will serve as acting senior director for Asia until a replacement for Patterson is named.

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Compaign on in Ctg to foil Shahriar's reception

A section of people reportedly supporters of the anti-liberation forces under the banners of some newly formed organisations are hell-bent on thwarting a scheduled reception for eminent writer and journalist Shahriar Kabir on February 5 on the Central Shaheed Minar premises here in the city.

These people are now campaigning against the reception, which was planned by members of the civil society here including academicians, professors, intellectuals, journalists, writers, cultural activists and others, said a co-ordinator of the reception.

They have even gone to the extent of declaring Shahriar Kabir *persona non grata* in the port city, vowing to resist him on his arrival here, he said.

Under the circumstances, police administration in Chittagong allegedly on January 30 refused permission to use any open space including the Shaheed Minar premises and microphone for the scheduled reception, sparking off tension in the city.

Programme co-ordinators Mafizur Rahman, Shawkat Bangali and Rashed Hasan met the Deputy Police Commissioner (North) of CMP Naba Bikram Kishore Tripura on the same day and sought permission to use the venue along with microphone.

Bail prayer of police SI rejected again

The Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court Dhaka, yesterday rejected the bail petition of Sub-Inspector of Police Mohammad Abul Bashar, arrested on charge of neglecting his duties that led to the suicide of Simi, 21, in Khilgaon area of the city on December 23, last year.

Judge Ahmed Jamil Mostafa passed the order following a criminal appeal, by the defence lawyers seeking his bail.

The court said the charges brought against Bashar were primarily proved and the case was at a primary stage of investigation. So, the petition for bail is rejected.

The defence lawyers had filed the appeal with the metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court on January 7 against rejection of Bashar's bail prayer by the CMM's Court.

Advocate Rani Akhter, legal adviser of Bangladesh Mahila Parishad and Court Inspector Shah Alam opposed the bail petition.

Bashar was arrested on December 29 last year following an order from Home Minister Altaf Hossain Chowdhury.

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Another forex smuggling case detected in N'ganj

The Bureau of Anti-corruption (BAC) has unearthed yet another case of smuggling of US\$ 1,47,000 by a businessman here in Narayanganj only a few days after the detection of three other similar cases of smuggling worth over \$1.4 million.

According to a case filed by BAC with the Narayanganj thana on Friday, Narayan Chandra Roy, owner of Loknath Traders of Nitaiganj of Narayanganj, smuggled US\$ 1,47,000 out of the country into India by opening fake L/Cs through the AB Bank here in the name of importing Indian yarn.

Roy followed the same fraudulent method as in the three other cases in which fake L/Cs were opened through the IFIC bank here.

Sources said Roy produced fake import documents to the AB Bank officials to open the L/Cs. The documents included false seal and signature of Hili Border officials.

The L/Cs were opened between November '99 and January '00, and AB Bank paid USD 1,47,000 against the L/Cs to the designated bank account in India. Only recently did the bank find out that the import papers were false.

As in the three previous cases, no yarn was imported.

Hearing on contempt petition against Hasina Feb 6

The High Court yesterday fixed February 6 for hearing on the contempt petition filed against Awami League President Sheikh Hasina for her reported remarks regarding the judiciary.

A division bench comprising Justice Syed Amirul Islam and Justice Sikder Maqbul Haque heard the matter.

Advocate Syed Ziaul Karim filed the petition. Counsel of the petitioner Advocate Zanol Abedin produced the copy of 'Weekly Thikana' which published the interview of Sheikh Hasina on December 21 before the court.

Earlier, on January 26 the same court directed the counsel of the petitioner to produce the same weekly before the court. Yesterday the court again directed the counsel of the petitioner to produce only those pages relating to the interview of Sheikh Hasina before the court with an affidavit.

Former prime minister Sheikh Hasina during her recent visit to the USA reportedly made some adverse comments in an interview with New York based 'Weekly Thikana' regarding judiciary on December 21, 2001. The contents of her interview were republished in some local newspapers in Bangladesh on December 22, 2001.

Police asked to keep vigilance on minority issues
