Nepal and Bangladesh meet on Wednesday with Australia and the West Indies battling it out for a place in the final of the main competition on the same day.



The government finally yesterday reinstated the elected committee of BFF (Bangladesh Football Federation), a first step towards lifting the FIFA ban on Bangladesh.

The government on December 20 dissolved Harunur Rashid's executive body to form an ad-hoc committee with Anwarul Haq Helal as the new general secretary.

Asian Football Federation did not take the change lightly as it was a clear violation to the FIFA statutes. AFC then recommended FIFA, the game's world governing body, to suspend Bangladesh from international football. Acting on the recommendation, the Zurich-based FIFA suspended Bangladesh on January 9. FIFA, in a letter to the BFF, clearly stated that the suspension would not go unless Bangladesh reinstated the democratically elected committee.







"Finals situations bring out the most amazing results - anything can happen," he said.


Cairns did not train Monday as he rested the back problem that kept him out of Friday's loss to South Africa in Perth but he had little doubt he would play - and bowl.






